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

Date: January 7, 2013

Please find appended to this memorandum a proposal for the creation of a new semester course for juniors in the Staples High School Social Studies Department; namely, Contemporary World Studies. This course is intended to replace the current Area Studies requirement.

This course is the final piece of a revision of the social studies curriculum based on alignment with state and national standards. Prior to this course, students will have completed Global Themes, which provides them with knowledge and the ability to analyze the influence of geography, religion, culture, intellectual movements, and technological development in the world as well as U.S. History, in which they study the development of the United States as a modern nation. This new course is anchored in the concepts of conflict and cooperation and factors that drive change in the modern world.

For our meeting of January 7, James D'Amico, Department Chair of Social Studies, Grades 6-12, will be present to elaborate on this proposal and respond to questions that may be raised by members of the Board.

This course proposal is being presented to the Board at this time for review and discussion purposes only. It will be presented to you for approval at our meeting of January 14.

**Credit:** .25 Quarter

**Credit Area(s):**

The credits for this course would go toward satisfying a required credit in Social Studies. This course would replace the current Area Studies requirement.

Course is open to juniors only

Students must have passed United States History (A or H)

Course is a graduation requirement

**I. Rationale:**

This course is the final piece of a revision of the social studies curriculum based on aligning to state and national standards. The course is the culmination of our vision of a sequence of required courses at the high school level. Prior to this course, students will have completed Global Themes, which provides them with knowledge and the ability to analyze the influence of geography, religion, culture, intellectual movements, and technological development in the world as well as U.S. History, in which they study the development of the United States as a modern nation. The course is anchored in the concepts of conflict and cooperation and factors that drive change in the modern world. This course will also provide the social studies department with a common course in which the skills necessary for the Smarter Balanced Common Core State Standards assessment can be addressed.

**II. Staples Expectations for Student Learning Alignment:**

**III. Westport 2025**

How does the course provide opportunities for students to develop specific capacities on the Westport 2025 lens?

This course addresses the Critical Thinking domain through the focus on interpretation and analysis of historical and other social science content, and the connections between United States and world issues. The final assessment stresses students' ability to synthesize information from the course and apply it to real-world situations. Creative Thinking is fostered by students' using course content by exploring possibilities for approaching non-routine problems. As there will be an emphasis on collaboration and using a range of media options, several aspects of Communication Capacities will be addressed in the course. Global Thinking is addressed in the course through the analysis of political, cultural, economic, and social developments, and the multidisciplinary nature of the content.

#### IV. Course Catalogue Description

Contemporary World Studies is a required, one-semester course that examines global conflict and cooperation since the Second World War. Students will examine the emergence of new nations and the nature of international power, responses to humanitarian crises of the 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> Centuries, and the challenges of addressing conflict over the world's resources, including the role of the United States and its citizens. The course brings together students' knowledge, and research, writing, and problem solving skills developed in Global Themes and U.S. History.

#### IV. Course Content (Themes, topics)

#### V. Educational experiences in this course will assure that students will:

- Access and gather information from a variety of primary and secondary sources including electronic media (maps, charts, graphs, images, artifacts, recordings, texts)
- Interpret information from a variety of primary and secondary sources including electronic media (maps, charts, graphs, images, artifacts, recordings, texts)
- Create various forms of written work to demonstrate an understanding of history and social studies issues
- Demonstrate an ability to participate in social studies discourse through informed discussion, debate, and effective oral presentation.
- Create and present relevant social studies materials using both print and electronic media
- Use evidence to identify, analyze, and evaluate historical interpretations
- Analyze and evaluate human action in historical and/or contemporary contexts from alternative points of view
- Apply appropriate historical, geographic, political, economic and cultural concepts and methods in proposing and evaluating solutions to contemporary problems

#### VI. Student Assessment

Students will be assessed in multiple forms, both individually and collaboratively, including but not limited to: multiple-choice tests, document-based and free response essays, researched papers, Socratic seminars multimedia and oral presentations. The final assessment for the course will require students to develop well-researched and presented solutions to achieve effective change addressing a current crisis.

#### VII. Materials/Texts:

Materials for this course will be generated by the teachers of the course upon approval. All resources will be organized and available online. The department will utilize the Atlas Curriculum Mapping Software to create the curriculum guide and materials, resources from school database, and create an electronic "textbook" for use when the district fully implements a 1:1 personal technology model.

#### VIII. Required Resources and Budget:

The primary cost to develop this course is curriculum development time, to take place primarily over the summer of 2013. These funds have been requested as part of the 2013-14 Curriculum Center budget. Should funds be available for professional development prior to the summer, the department will work with the Director of Secondary Education to provide curriculum writing time during the school year.

Subject: Class Size History

The members of the Board of Education, as part of our Goals and Objectives for the 2012-13 school year, requested an analysis of class size history in the Westport Public Schools.

At my request, Nancy Harris has created a spreadsheet that compares class size enrollments in second grade for the 10 year period from 2003-2012 using a maximum class size guideline of 25 students per class v. 22 students per class, making use of present breakpoints. The effect of such a change in guidelines would create a maximum class size guideline of 22 for all classroom sections in Kindergarten, Grade 1 and Grade 2.

As you can see from the analysis, were we to change our maximum class size guidelines at the second grade level to 22 from the current 25, with retention of the current breakpoints, on average we could expect to add 2 full-time teachers to our budget, at a projected cost of \$140,000 to include benefits. Additionally, at a cost of \$70,800 we would be required to add 0.8 special area teachers and 0.4 paraprofessionals.


Based on projected enrollments, were we to implement a reduction in the maximum class size guidelines for grades 3-5 in the 2013-14 school year, similar to the reduction shown for grade 2 and retaining the current breakpoints, the impact would require us to add 5 full-time teachers in grades 3-5: 1 at grade 3; 1 at grade 4; and, 3 at grade 5. The total estimated cost of this increase in staff, with benefits would be \$350,000. Additionally, we would be required to add 2.0 special area teachers at a combined cost of \$140,000 and 0.2 paraprofessional for the third grade class at a cost of \$7,400.

Thus, for the upcoming 2013-14 school year, any reductions to current elementary school maximum class sizes from 25 to 22 in grades 2-5, would require us to add 7 teachers, 2.8 special area teachers, and 0.6 paraprofessional to our 2013-14 proposed operating budget at an average net cost of salaries and benefits of \$708,200.

Such a change in maximum class size guidelines also would impact our space needs, requiring us to modify the interiors of certain of our schools to accommodate the increase in classes, where possible; place students in sub-standard spaces for instruction; or, re-district in an attempt to balance enrollments in a concerted effort to equitably re-distribute students throughout our schools.

The issue of class sizes is not applicable to the middle schools, where our teaming structure continues to be able to accommodate groups of 80-110 students. For Staples, with approximately 1,900 students expected in the next school year in a building constructed for only 1,800, without any change in class size guidelines, space limitations prohibit us from reducing our class size guidelines below their current maxima.

I have included for your review a listing of current class sizes at Staples for full year and all semester courses, both Fall and Spring.

The Westport/Weston Foundation was created in May 1948 as a charitable community trust for public purposes, with the scope of its activities restricted to individual residents and charitable organizations located in, or providing direct services to, citizens of the Towns of Westport and Weston, Connecticut.


The Foundation makes grants available to the following: (1) scholarship help to persons attending accredited undergraduate academic institutions, nursing schools, trade schools and other post high school training facilities; (2) direct distributions to or on behalf of persons who, because they lack financial resources, are unable to afford essential goods or services necessary to maintain a basic standard of living; and (3) grants to "human service" charities for projects or special uses.

Funds of the Foundation are distributed through its Distribution Committee. The Distribution Committee consists of one member appointed by the Judge of Probate for the District of Westport, one member appointed by the Board of Selectmen, one member appointed by the Board of Education, and two members appointed by the Trustee (People's Savings Bank).

Alice Czuzka was last appointed to the Distribution Committee by the Board of Education for the period January 1, 2007-December 31, 2012. With the expiration of her term the Foundation has asked the Board to re-appoint her for another five year term.

The Board previously has approved calendars for the 2012-13 and 2013-14 school years, with the latter having been approved in December 2011 and modified as a result of the school closings associated with Hurricane Sandy. It has been the Board's practice to have on file approved calendars for two upcoming school years.

Should the Board approve the school calendar guidelines for the 2014-15 school year at our meeting of January 7, I will be presenting for your consideration and approval a calendar for the 2014-15 school year at one of our upcoming meetings in January. Traditionally, we have sought input from representatives of the Westport Education Association and the Intermediate Administrators' Association prior to presenting a final calendar to the Board for its consideration. Before participating in those discussions, we have each year sought guidance from the Board as to its priorities with regard to the construct of the school calendar.

Over the past several years, the Board has agreed that: (1) our schools should not be closed on Veteran's Day, recognizing that the day has greater meaning for students when schools are in session and activities related to Veteran's Day are presented to them within their individual school environments; and, (2) the last day of school each year, always shortened for students, is more productive for end-of-year "wrap-up activities" when it remains at full length for teachers and support staff. The Board also has acknowledged the contractual requirement that single day holidays and extended vacations for teachers shall be the same as for students, except as negotiated with the Association.

As we prepare to discuss the 2014-15 school calendar, and based upon our weather-related experiences of this school year and the previous one, I propose that the Board give consideration to accepting the following additional **permanent** guidelines to assist the Administration in developing school calendar recommendations to the Board of Education:

1. The first day of school for students shall be prior to Labor Day.
2. Where possible, Columbus Day is to be a regular school day for teachers and students.
3. Both a February and April recess for students and teachers shall be retained.
4. Where weather-related or emergency conditions make a 182 day school year for students impossible to achieve, make-up days shall begin with the first day of the April recess and continue to progress to each day thereafter, until no longer needed.

Appended to this memorandum are a number of school calendars for the 2014-15 school year to enable the Board to make a more informed decision as you consider adopting guidelines, as follows:

1. Current model, with the guidelines outlined above.
2. Post-Labor Day start for students; schools closed on Columbus Day; February and April recesses
3. Post-Labor Day start for students; schools open on Columbus Day; February and April recesses
4. Post-Labor Day start for students: schools closed on Columbus Day; no February or April recesses; four day weekends abutting President's Day and Good Friday.
5. Post-Labor Day start for students; schools closed on Columbus Day; no April recess; four day weekend abutting Good Friday
6. Pre-Labor Day start for students; schools closed on Columbus Day; no February recess; April recess; four day weekend abutting Martin Luther King's Birthday and President's Day.
7. Pre-Labor Day start for students; schools open on Columbus Day; no February recess; April recess; four day weekend abutting Martin Luther King's Birthday and President's Day.
8. Pre-Labor Day start for students; schools open on Columbus Day; February and April recesses
9. Pre-Labor Day start for students: schools closed on Columbus Day; no February or April recesses; four day weekends abutting President's Day and Good Friday.
10. Pre-Labor Day start for students; schools closed on Columbus Day; no April recess; four day weekend abutting Good Friday

The establishment of permanent guidelines by the Board in anticipation of the preparation of the 2014-15 school calendar will be for discussion purposes only at our meeting of January 7, with the establishment of a 2014-15 school calendar to be approved subsequently.

Each Connecticut school district must notify the Connecticut State Department of Education (“CSDE”), no later than January 15, 2013, as to whether they intend to implement the Connecticut SEED (“System for Educator Evaluation and Development”) model for teacher and administrator evaluation, a district-designed alternative, or a hybrid model for the 2013 - 14 school year. Districts that choose to implement their own evaluation plan or a hybrid model must submit that model to the state for approval no later than April 15, 2013. Districts may make changes to their selection at any time prior to the April 15 deadline. It is my understanding that the January 15 selection is intended to provide the CSDE with an estimate of the number of school districts that will be submitting evaluation plans *other than* the SEED model, since those other plans must be reviewed by the CSDE.

Westport is committed to its current Professional Development and Evaluation Plan (“PDEP”) and we believe that, with some minor adjustments in order to conform to the new state requirements, our PDEP document will satisfy the requirement that 40% of both teacher and administrator evaluations be based on “performance and practice.” We are in the process of revising our plan now and will submit that to the CSDE for feedback as soon as possible.

In addition, we have been advised that it may be possible to use portions of the School Climate Survey that was sent to parents, staff and students earlier this year, to satisfy both the parent and student feedback requirements of the new system. We are still researching these options.

Finally, a district wide committee, comprised of Central Office Administrators and representatives of both the Intermediate Administrators Association and the Westport Education Association, will develop a complete evaluation plan, which we will present to the Board of Education prior to the April 15 submission deadline.

At this time, I am recommending that we notify the CSDE that we plan to submit our own, district-designed evaluation plan, one that retains as much of our current PDEP document as possible and incorporates the new state requirements in a way that is tailored to the specific needs of our high-performing school district. A copy of the selection form is attached to this memorandum.

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Attached is the December Quarterly Report for the 2012-13 fiscal year which reflects a potential fund shortfall of \$276,623 through the end of the year. The potential deficit represents a 0.276% budget variation to the \$100,226,554 Board of Education adopted 2012-2013 budget.

You will note that we have completed 6 of the 12 months of the fiscal year with six months of school expenditures left in the year. This means that many of our expenditure projections continue as preliminary. The differences between the "Adopted Budget" column and the "Adjusted Budget" column reflect the administrative transfers made within each "line item" of the budget as the year has progressed and specific expenditures have been modified.

We encumber salaries for all full time employees and expenditures for anticipated purchases. Those encumbrances and expenditures account for 97.4% of the total budget. Actual expenditures made to date are 43.9% of total budget with encumbrances representing 53.5% of total budget. The remaining 2.9% of the budget projection represents my best estimate of expenditures to be made during the six months remaining in the fiscal year.

Salary accounts reflect several basic structural changes made to this budget. Five additional elementary sections were opened in August to accommodate last minute student registrations, in accordance with the class size guidelines, which allocated the budgeted three reserve teachers as well as two additional regular education teacher positions. We also added additional teachers (1.8 FTE) to the Staples teaching staff to accommodate the additional enrollment at the high school.

The use of long term substitute teachers has been high this fall although we have not yet seen staff savings that are traditionally used to offset these costs. The current potential deficit balance of \$91,219 represents a (0.14%) variation from the total salary budget.

The greatest unknowns at this time are the projected substitute and overtime costs (objects 150 – 156) through the end of the year. I am currently projecting a deficit of \$65,325 in this account grouping. These accounts have the highest rate of volatility since staff attendance, workers compensation injuries, overtime, illness, and pregnancy cannot be definitively estimated. A review of the prior three years' actual expenditure data reveals no pattern whatsoever.

The final cost of heating fuel (natural gas & oil) and electricity, which creates a potential fund balance of \$42,828, is still an unknown since the total projections are based on consumption through

November. As the Board is aware, the Board of Education and the Town purchase oil collaboratively, with the Board of Education negotiating a BTU contract locking in oil/natural gas prices of \$1.44506 per gallon equivalent through June 30, 2013. We continue to project burning natural gas for the fiscal year. Electricity generation rates were stabilized until December 2012 under the "all in" electric consortium contract we entered into at \$0.0973 per kilowatt hour. Our costs dropped to \$0.0767 per kilowatt hour effective January, 2013 through December, 2014 as part of the updated "all in" electric consortium contract. The final fund balances depend on our actual natural gas and electricity consumption which will be impacted by the winter/spring temperatures and the extended use of our buildings. I am projecting a deficit of \$234,310 in Building Projects (account 435), however that amount may change as the year progresses.

The special education tuition accounts currently reflect a potential fund balance of \$78,000 net of the Special Education Excess Cost Grants from the State Department of Education. The cost of placing special needs students into out of district placements includes tuition costs of \$2,721,980 and transportation costs of \$385,940. These costs will be reduced by the current year payment of the Excess Cost Grants to offset extraordinary education costs for many of our special needs students. The grant has not yet been calculated by the State Department of Education. I have estimated approximately \$530,000 of reimbursement for this grant. Once we have received the actual February grant calculation, we will have a better estimate of the state support for these high cost student placements. The actual amounts will change if additional special education students are placed out or received back during the balance of the year.

This projection reflects a possible fund shortfall of \$276,623 (\*\$3 rounding error). Please note the following as you review the projections (object code provided for reference):

***Salaries:***

- ♦ A variety of certified and non-certified staff have been on paid and unpaid leave throughout the first half of the year. Substitutes filling in have been charged to the certified and non-certified substitute accounts (object 151 - 155). Overtime to compensate for additional work at Kings Highway Elementary School, other school projects requiring additional custodial time and coverage for custodial staff out ill has been charged to the overtime account (object 156)

***Benefits:***

- ◆ Our Unemployment costs continue to run higher than budgeted (object 250), a reflection of the layoffs to personnel we have been required to make over the past several years.
- ◆ Our Workers' Compensation (object 260) experience reflects several costly work related accidents.

***Contracted Services:***

- ◆ We continue to use technical experts in the Other Professional Technical Services (object 330) to assist in ongoing mold remediation and testing.
- ◆ The deficit projected in our legal fees account (object 331) reflects an extended negotiation, mediation and arbitration with the WEA. In addition, we have had extensive use of legal support for other pending legal matters.

***Property Services:***

- ◆ We are closely monitoring the costs and consumption of electricity and fuel oil/natural gas as noted above. (objects 413, 414 & 415)

***Other Purchased Services:***

- ◆ Special Education transportation and tuition expenditures have been reduced to reflect receipt of the estimated State Excess Cost Grant funds. (objects 513 & 560) and reflect the reduction in state funding for the high cost student placements made to public and private educational institutions.

I welcome the opportunity to review this projection with you.
