IV. COMMUNICATIONS

BOARD MEMBERS AND SUPERINTENDENT

Irene Hernandez-Blair thanked Superintendent Joseph for the brighter lights and clean (ceiling) tiles in the Board room; acknowledged Canyon Hills JHS AVID teachers attending the meeting; spoke about the opportunity some AVID students had to attend a college football game; expressed that she is wanting and expecting that all school sites be treated fairly and that similar opportunities be afforded to all campuses; said October is Cancer Awareness and Anti-bullying Month; spoke about wearing purple in support of LGBT youth; thanked Dan Mellon for the Safe School Ambassador Program, but said it is not working well for the majority of our schools; said we need to have programs to address racial discrimination; said the California Department of Education offers school climate and California Healthy Kids surveys, and said we need to hear from teachers and students in this regard; and expressed gratitude to Costco for their donation of backpacks to students at Dickson ES, and to Pete and Corinne Pariah for donating a pallet of paper to Rhodes ES.

Vice President Cruz asked for and received consensus to extend the meeting beyond 10:00 p.m.

James Na asked Greg Stachura to provide an update to parents who expressed campus safety concerns; acknowledged the supporters of Grandpa Ortiz; attended Mrs. Yi Eubanks special education class and said he learned a lot; said our school District and teachers are doing a great job; encouraged CVLA students to never give up; attended the Veterans Tribute Dinner; thanked CSEA members for maintaining District campuses; spoke about Mark Goldband's legacy of helping others; emphasized character building; and thanked students for attending the meeting as part of their assignments.

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Pamela Feix acknowledged the 40 years of volunteering that Grandpa Ortiz contributed, said we have an amazing community; recognized the teaching community and said it is impressive to see all teachers from Buena Vista HS supporting the program and administrator; and said she spent half a day at Boys Republic last week, commented on the culinary arts program, and said now is the time to order wreaths.

Sylvia Orozco spoke about suicide and bullying; acknowledged the retirement of Cheryl Aguilar for 35 years of service; said she is still hopeful of a formal retirement event; spoke about Grandpa Ortiz; commended Ayala HS vocal students' performance; reminded everyone about the Madrigal Feast; said that Canyon Hills JHS is holding a spaghetti dinner concert on November 14; spoke in support of teacher-to-parent communication programs; and said she attended the SANDABS meeting last week and advised that information would be forthcoming regarding the 2015 Federal Legislative Platform.

Superintendent Joseph said it was a heart rending night; said that he doesn't want to minimize bullying, but at the same time we shouldn't lose site that our teachers, administrators, and classified employees have daunting tasks every day because of society's expectations of them; and said our people day in and day out do the very best they can for our children as evidenced by the success of our students.

Andrew Cruz said he attended a school Smarts training at Briggs K-8 this week; commended Ramona JHS for encouraging students to do random acts of kindness; and said the Ayala Band and Color guard did a spectacular job at the football game on Friday.

The MOU will give authority for the member districts to begin the application and grant writing process. The CTEIG application is due to the California Department of Education on November 18, 2015.

The MOU will become effective upon Board approval of each of the participating district's and will extend through the duration of the State Career Technical Education Incentive Grant funding, or until revised or disbanded by the participating LEAs.

For JPA's:

- 1. As the administrative agency for the JPA, Baldy View Regional Occupational Program will receive and administer the JPA's allocated funds, and submit the necessary plans, applications, and all fiscal claims to the California Department of Education (CDE). Each of the LEAs participating in the JPA will cooperate in the development of these documents and will provide timely responses to the JPA fiscal agent's request for information and data.
- 2. Each member of the JPA will allocate the Average Daily Attendance (ADA) of their students in their district that will participate in the JPA's CTE programs to determine funding for this specific CTEIG funding structure. The JPA will report only those students' ADA that the member has allocated for the purpose of determining the grant allocation award. Each member and fiscal agent will submit data on CTE students according to what they are claiming or releasing of ADA for the grant funding structure of ADA, as outlined in Education Code (EC) Section 53071, (B), i-v.

Each member of the MOU and fiscal lead agency will sign all grant assurances and comply with all requirements as a grant recipient for the CTEIG funding, as outlined in EC Section 53071.

In accordance with the CTEIG program, EC Section 53070, (b) Of the amounts appropriated in paragraphs (1) through (3), inclusive, of subdivision (a), 4 percent is designated for applicants with average daily attendance of less than or equal to 140, 8 percent is designated for applicants with average daily attendance of more than 140 and

less than or equal to 550, and 88 percent is designated for applicants with average daily attendance of more than 550. For purposes of this section, average daily attendance shall be those figures that are reported at the time of the second principal apportionment for the previous fiscal year for pupils in grades 7 to 12, inclusive. For any applicant consisting of more than one school district, county office of education, charter school, or regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority, or of any combination of those entities, the sum of the average daily attendance for each of the constituent entities shall be used for purposes of this subdivision.

No funds will be redistributed to individual members of the JPA for purposes or programs that are not available to all members of the JPA.

Baldy View Regional Occupational Program may claim indirect costs incurred based on the approved state rate.

A student may be expelled only by the Board of Education. The Board shall expel, as required by law, any student found to have committed certain offenses listed in Education Code 48915.

As revised, the policy provides that the UCP be used to investigate all instances of bullying, but that conduct determined to be nondiscriminatory bullying then be resolved in accordance with the district's student discipline policies and procedures. This item was presented to the Board of Education on October 15, 2015, for information.

New language is provided in UPPER CASE while old language to be deleted is lined through.

Students

BULLYING

The Board of Education recognizes the harmful effects of bullying on student learning and school attendance and desires to provide safe school environments that protect students from physical and emotional harm. District employees shall establish student safety as a high priority and shall not tolerate bullying of any student.

No INDIVIDUAL student or group of students shall, through physical, written, verbal, or other means, harass, sexually harass, threaten, intimidate, RETALIATE, cyberbully, cause bodily injury to, or commit hate violence against any other student or school personnel.

Cyberbullying includes the CREATION OR transmission of harassing communications, direct threats, or other harmful texts, sounds, or images on the internet, social media, or other technologies using a telephone, computer, or any wireless communication device. Cyberbullying also includes breaking into another person's electronic account and assuming that person's identity in order to damage that person's reputation.

Strategies for ADDRESSING bullying IN DISTRICT SCHOOLS prevention and intervention shall be developed with involvement of key stakeholders, INCLUDING STUDENTS, PARENTS/GUARDIANS, AND STAFF, AND MAY BE INCORPORATED INTO THE in accordance with law, board policy, and administrative regulation governing the development of comprehensive safety plans, THE LOCAL CONTROL AND ACCOUNTABILITY PLAN, and OTHER APPLICABLE DISTRICT AND SCHOOL shall be incorporated into such plans.

AS APPROPRIATE, THE SUPERINTENDENT OR DESIGNEE MAY COLLABORATE WITH LAW ENFORCEMENT, COURTS, SOCIAL SERVICES, MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES, OTHER AGENCIES, AND COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS IN THE DEVELOPMENT AND IMPLEMENTATION OF JOINT STRATEGIES TO PROMOTE

SAFETY IN SCHOOLS AND THE COMMUNITY AND TO PROVIDE SERVICES FOR ALLEGED VICTIMS AND PERPETRATORS OF BULLYING.

Bullying Prevention

To the extent possible, district and schoolS strategies shall focus on prevention of bullying by establishing clear rules for student conduct and IMPLEMENTING strategies to PROMOTE establish a positive, collaborative school climate. Students shall be informed, through student handbooks and other appropriate means, of district and school rules related to bullying, mechanisms available for reporting incidents or threats, and the consequences for ENGAGING IN perpetrators of bullying.

AS APPROPRIATE, the district SHALL may provide students with instruction, in the classroom or other educational settings, that promotes effective communication and conflict resolution skills, social skills, character/values education, respect for cultural and individual differences, self-esteem development, assertiveness skills, and appropriate online behavior.

School Staff shall receive related professional development, including information about early warning signs of harassing/intimidating behaviors and effective RESPONSE prevention and intervention strategies.

Based on an assessment of bullying incidents at school, the Superintendent or designee may increase supervision and security in areas where bullying most often occurs, such as classrooms, playgrounds, hallways, restrooms, and cafeterias.

Intervention

Students are encouraged to notify school staff when they are being bullied or suspect that another student is being victimized. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall develop means for students to report threats or incidents confidentially and anonymously.

School staff who witness AN ACT OF bullying shall immediately intervene to stop the incident when it is safe to do so. (Education Code 234.1)

WHEN As appropriate BASED ON THE SEVERITY OR PERVASIVENESS OF THE BULLYING, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of victims and perpetrators AND MAY CONTACT LAW ENFORCEMENT. He/she also may involve school counselors, mental health counselors, and/or law enforcement.

THE SUPERINTENDENT, PRINCIPAL, OR PRINCIPAL'S DESIGNEE MAY REFER A VICTIM, WITNESS, PERPETRATOR, OR OTHER STUDENT AFFECTED BY AN ACT OF BULLYING TO A SCHOOL COUNSELOR, SCHOOL PSYCHOLOGIST, SOCIAL WORKER, CHILD WELFARE ATTENDANCE PERSONNEL, SCHOOL NURSE, OR OTHER SCHOOL SUPPORT SERVICE PERSONNEL FOR CASE MANAGEMENT, COUNSELING, AND/OR PARTICIPATION IN A RESTORATIVE JUSTICE PROGRAM AS APPROPRIATE. (EDUCATION CODE 48900.9)

REPORT AND FILING OF Complaints and Investigation

ANY COMPLAINT OF BULLYING, WHETHER IT IS DISCRIMINATORY OR NONDISCRIMINATORY, SHALL BE INVESTIGATED AND RESOLVED IN ACCORDANCE WITH LAW AND THE DISTRICT'S UNIFORM COMPLAINT PROCEDURES SPECIFIED IN AR 1312.3 - UNIFORM COMPLAINT PROCEDURES.

ANY STUDENT, PARENT/GUARDIAN, OR OTHER INDIVIDUAL WHO BELIEVES THAT A STUDENT HAS BEEN SUBJECTED TO BULLYING OR WHO HAS WITNESSED BULLYING MAY REPORT THE INCIDENT TO A TEACHER, THE PRINCIPAL, A COMPLIANCE OFFICER, OR ANY OTHER AVAILABLE SCHOOL EMPLOYEE. WITHIN ONE BUSINESS DAY OF RECEIVING SUCH A REPORT, A STAFF MEMBER SHALL NOTIFY THE PRINCIPAL OF THE REPORT, WHETHER OR NOT A UNIFORM COMPLAINT IS FILED. IN ADDITION, ANY SCHOOL EMPLOYEE WHO OBSERVES AN INCIDENT OF BULLYING INVOLVING A STUDENT SHALL, WITHIN ONE BUSINESS DAY, REPORT HIS/HER OBSERVATION TO THE PRINCIPAL OR A DISTRICT COMPLIANCE OFFICER, WHETHER OR NOT THE ALLEGED VICTIM FILES A COMPLAINT.

WITHIN TWO BUSINESS DAYS OF RECEIVING A REPORT OF BULLYING, THE PRINCIPAL SHALL NOTIFY A DISTRICT COMPLIANCE OFFICER IDENTIFIED IN AR 1312.3.

Students may submit to a teacher or administrator a verbal or written complaint of conduct they consider to be bullying. Complaints of bullying shall be investigated and resolved in accordance with site-level grievance procedures specified in Administrative Regulation 5145.7 - Sexual Harassment.

When a student is reported to be engaging in bullying off campus, the Superintendent or designee shall investigate and document the activity and shall identify specific facts or circumstances that explain the impact or potential impact on school activity, school attendance, or the targeted student's educational performance.

When the circumstances involve cyberbullying, individuals with information about the activity shall be encouraged to save and print any electronic or digital messages sent to them that they feel constitute cyberbullying and to notify a teacher, the principal, or other employee so that the matter may be investigated. WHEN A If the student USES is using a social networking site or service TO BULLY OR HARASS ANOTHER STUDENT, that has terms of use that prohibit posting of harmful material, the Superintendent or designee also may file a REQUEST complaint with the NETWORKING SITE internet site or service to SUSPEND THE PRIVILEGES OF THE STUDENT AND TO have the material removed.

WHEN A REPORT OF BULLYING IS SUBMITTED, THE PRINCIPAL OR A DISTRICT COMPLIANCE OFFICER SHALL INFORM THE STUDENT OR PARENT/GUARDIAN OF THE RIGHT TO FILE A FORMAL WRITTEN COMPLAINT IN ACCORDANCE WITH AR 1312.3. THE STUDENT WHO IS THE ALLEGED VICTIM OF THE BULLYING SHALL BE GIVEN AN OPPORTUNITY TO DESCRIBE THE INCIDENT, IDENTIFY WITNESSES WHO MAY HAVE RELEVANT INFORMATION, AND PROVIDE OTHER EVIDENCE OF BULLYING.

INVESTIGATION AND RESOLUTION OF COMPLAINTS

ANY COMPLAINT OF BULLYING SHALL BE INVESTIGATED AND, IF DETERMINED TO BE DISCRIMINATORY, RESOLVED IN ACCORDANCE WITH LAW AND THE DISTRICT'S UNIFORM COMPLAINT PROCEDURES SPECIFIED IN AR 1312.3.

IF, DURING THE INVESTIGATION, IT IS DETERMINED THAT A COMPLAINT IS ABOUT NONDISCRIMINATORY BULLYING, THE PRINCIPAL OR DESIGNEE SHALL INFORM THE COMPLAINANT AND SHALL TAKE ALL NECESSARY ACTIONS TO RESOLVE THE COMPLAINT.

Discipline

CORRECTIVE ACTIONS FOR A Any student who COMMITTS AN ACT OF engages in bullying OF ANY TYPE MAY INCLUDE COUNSELING, BEHAVIORAL INTERVENTION AND EDUCATION, AND IF THE BEHAVIOR IS SEVERE OR PERVASIVE AS DEFINED IN EDUCATION CODE 48900, on school premises, or off campus in a manner that causes or is likely to cause a substantial disruption of a school activity or school attendance, shall be subject to discipline, which may include suspension or expulsion in accordance with district policies and regulations.

CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT

The Board of Education desires to provide child care and development services which meet the developmental needs of children and offer a convenient child care alternative for parents/guardians in the community.

The Board of Education desires to provide BEFORE-SCHOOL AND/OR after-school enrichment programs that support the regular education program and provide safe constructive alternatives for students. In order to increase academic achievement of participating students, the content of such programs shall be COORDINATED aligned with the District's vision and goals for student learning, its curriculum, and district and state academic standards and shall be integrated with other learning support activities.

Early education programs should provide developmentally appropriate activities in a safe, adequately supervised, and cognitively rich environment. This item was presented to the Board of Education on October 15, 2015, for information.

New language is provided in UPPER CASE.

Approval of this item supports the goals identified within the District's Strategic Plan.

THE BOARD ENCOURAGES THE DEVELOPMENT OF A COMPREHENSIVE DISTRICTWIDE AND/OR COUNTYWIDE PLAN TO INCREASE CHILDREN'S ACCESS TO HIGH-QUALITY PRESCHOOL PROGRAMS.

DISTRICT PRESCHOOL PROGRAMS

WHEN THE BOARD DETERMINES THAT IT IS FEASIBLE, THE DISTRICT MAY CONTRACT WITH THE CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (CDE) TO PROVIDE PRESCHOOL SERVICES IN FACILITIES AT OR NEAR DISTRICT SCHOOLS.

THE BOARD SHALL APPROVE FOR THE DISTRICT'S PRESCHOOL PROGRAM A WRITTEN PHILOSOPHICAL STATEMENT, GOALS, AND OBJECTIVES THAT REFLECT THE CULTURAL AND LINGUISTIC CHARACTERISTICS OF THE FAMILIES TO BE SERVED AND ADDRESS THE PROGRAM COMPONENTS SPECIFIED IN 5 CCR 18272-18281 AND THE ACCOMPANYING ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATION. (5 CCR 18271)

THE BOARD SHALL SET PRIORITIES FOR ESTABLISHING OR EXPANDING SERVICES AS RESOURCES BECOME AVAILABLE, GIVING CONSIDERATION TO THE BENEFITS OF PROVIDING EARLY EDUCATION PROGRAMS FOR AT-RISK CHILDREN AND/OR CHILDREN RESIDING IN THE ATTENDANCE AREAS OF THE LOWEST PERFORMING DISTRICT SCHOOLS.

UNIFORM COMPLAINT PROCEDURES

The Board of Education recognizes the District has the primary responsibility to ensure compliance with applicable state and federal laws and regulations governing educational programs. The Board encourages the early, informal resolution of complaints whenever possible and appropriate. To resolve complaints which cannot be resolved through such informal process, the Board shall adopt a uniform system of complaint processes specified in 5 CCR 4600-4670 and the accompanying administrative regulation

- 6. Any complaint alleging retaliation against a complainant or other participant in the complaint process or anyone who has acted to uncover or report a violation subject to this policy.
- 6. Any other complaint as specified in a District policy.

The Board recognizes that Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) can, depending on the nature of the allegations, offer a process to reach a resolution to the complaint that is

agreeable to all parties. One type of ADR is mediation, which shall be offered to resolve complaints that involve more than one student and no adult. However, mediation shall not be offered or used to resolve any complaint involving sexual assault or where there is a reasonable risk that a party to the mediation would feel compelled to participate. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the use of ADR is consistent with state and federal laws and regulations.

THE DISTRICT SHALL PROTECT ALL COMPLAINANTS FROM RETALIATION. In filing and investigating complaints, the confidentiality of the parties involved shall be protected as required by law. As appropriate, for any complaint alleging retaliation, OR unlawful discrimination, SUCH AS DISCRIMINATORY HARASSMENT, INTIMIDATION, or bullying, the Superintendent or designee shall keep confidential the identity of a complainant and/or the subject of the complaint, if he/she is different from the complainant, as long as the integrity of the complaint process is maintained.

When an allegation that is not subject to the UCP is included in a UCP complaint, the District shall refer the non-UCP allegation to the appropriate staff or agency and shall INVESTIGATE AND, IF APPROPRIATE, resolve the UCP related allegation(s) through the District's UCP.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training to District staff to ensure awareness and knowledge of current law and related requirements, including the steps and timelines specified in this policy and the accompanying administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain records of all UCP complaints and the investigations of those complaints. All such records shall be destroyed in accordance with applicable state law and District policy.

Non-Uniform Complaint Procedures Complaints

The following complaints shall not be subject to the District's UCP but shall be referred to the specified agency: (5 CCR 4611)

- 1. Any complaint alleging child abuse or neglect shall be referred to the County Department of Social Services, the County Protective Services Division, and the appropriate law enforcement agency.
- 2. Any complaint alleging health and safety violations by a child development program shall, for licensed facilities, be referred to Department of Social Services and shall, for licensing-exempt facilities, be referred to the appropriate Child Development regional administrator.
- 3. Any complaint alleging employment discrimination shall be sent to the California Department of Fair Employment and Housing and the compliance officer shall notify the complainant by first class mail of the transfer.
- 4. Any complaint alleging fraud shall be referred to the California Department of Education.

In addition, the District's Williams Uniform Complaint Procedures, AR 1312.4, shall be used to investigate and resolve any complaint related to sufficiency of textbooks or instructional materials, emergency or urgent facilities conditions that pose a threat to the health or safety of students or staff, or teacher vacancies and misassignments. NONDISCRIMINATION IN EMPLOYMENT

The Board of Education desires to provide a positive work environment where employees and job applicants are free from harassment and are assured of equal access and opportunities AND ARE FREE FROM HARASSMENT in accordance with law. The Board of Education prohibits any District employees from harassing or discriminating against OR HARASSING any other District employee or job applicant on the basis of the person's actual or perceived race, religion, CREED, color, national origin, ancestry, age, marital status, pregnancy, physical or mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, MILITARY AND veteran status, gender, gender identity, gender expression, sex, or sexual orientation.

Prohibited discrimination consists of THE TAKING OF any adverse employment action AGAINST A PERSON, including termination or denial of promotion, job assignment, or training, OR IN DISCRIMINATING AGAINST THE PERSON IN COMPENSATION, TERMS, CONDITIONS, OR OTHER PRIVILEGES OF EMPLOYMENT based on any of the prohibited categories of discrimination listed above. Harassment consists of any unwelcome verbal, physical, or visual conduct that is based on any of the prohibited categories of discrimination listed above and that is so severe and pervasive that it adversely affects an individual's employment opportunities, has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with the individual's work performance, or creates an intimidating, hostile, or offensive work environment.

THE PROHIBITION AGAINST DISCRIMINATION BASED ON THE RELIGIOUS CREED OF AN EMPLOYEE OR JOB APPLICANT INCLUDES ANY DISCRIMINATION BASED ON THE PERSON'S RELIGIOUS DRESS OR GROOMING PRACTICES OR ANY CONFLICT BETWEEN THE PERSON'S RELIGIOUS BELIEF, OBSERVANCE, OR PRACTICE AND AN EMPLOYMENT REQUIREMENT. THE PROHIBITION AGAINST DISCRIMINATION BASED ON THE SEX OF AN EMPLOYEE OR JOB APPLICANT SHALL INCLUDE ANY DISCRIMINATION BASED ON THE PERSON'S PREGNANCY, CHILDBIRTH, BREASTFEEDING, OR ANY RELATED MEDICAL CONDITIONS. (GOVERNMENT CODE 12926, 12940)

HARASSMENT CONSISTS OF ANY UNWELCOME VERBAL, PHYSICAL, OR VISUAL CONDUCT THAT IS BASED ON ANY OF THE PROHIBITED CATEGORIES OF DISCRIMINATION LISTED ABOVE AND THAT IS SO SEVERE OR PERVASIVE THAT IT ADVERSELY AFFECTS AN INDIVIDUAL'S EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES, HAS THE PURPOSE OR EFFECT OF UNREASONABLE INTERFERING WITH THE

INDIVIDUAL'S WORK PERFORMANCE, OR CREATES AN INTIMIDATING HOSTILE, OR OFFENSIVE WORK ENVIRONMENT.

The Board also prohibits retaliation against any District employee or job applicant who complains, testifies, assists, or in any way participates in the District's complaint procedures instituted pursuant to this policy.

Any District employee who engages in prohibited discrimination, harassment, or retaliation or who aids, abets, incites, compels, or coerces another to engage or attempt to engage in such behavior in violation of this policy shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

Any employee or job applicant who believes that he/she has been or is being discriminated against or harassed in violation of District policy should, as appropriate, immediately contact his/her supervisor, the Coordinator, or the Superintendent who shall advise the employee or applicant about the District's procedures for filing, investigating, and resolving any such complaint.

COMPLAINTS REGARDING EMPLOYMENT DISCRIMINATION OR HARASSMENT SHALL IMMEDIATELY BE INVESTIGATED IN ACCORDANCE WITH AR 4031 – COMPLAINTS CONCERNING DISCRIMINATION IN EMPLOYMENT.

ALL OTHER EMPLOYEES ARE TO REPORT SUCH INCIDENTS TO THEIR SUPERVISOR IMMEDIATELY. Failure of a District employee to report discrimination or harassment may result in disciplinary action.

NOTIFICATIONS

Any supervisory or management employee who observes or has knowledge of an incident of prohibited discrimination or harassment shall report the incident to the coordinator or Superintendent as soon as practical after the incident. All other employees are encouraged to report such incidents to their supervisor immediately.

Complaints regarding employment discrimination or harassment shall immediately be investigated in accordance with Administrative Regulation 4031 - Complaints Concerning Discrimination in Employment.

(cf. 4031 - Complaints Concerning Discrimination in Employment)

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly publicize, within the District and in the community, the District's nondiscrimination policy and the availability of complaint procedures. Such publication shall be included in each announcement, bulletin or application form that is used in employee recruitment. (34 CFR 100.6, 106.9)

The District's policy and administrative regulation shall be posted in all DISTRICT schools and offices including staff lounges and student government meeting rooms. (5 CCR 4960)

Other Remedies

An employee may, in addition to filing a discrimination complaint with the District, file a complaint with either the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) or the California Department of Fair Employment and Housing (DFEH). The time limits for filing such complaints are as follows:

- 1. To file a valid complaint directly with EEOC, the employee must file his/her complaint within 180 days of the alleged discriminatory act(s). To file a valid complaint with EEOC after filing a complaint with DFEH, the employee must file the complaint within 300 days of the alleged discriminatory acts(s) or within 30 days after the termination of proceedings by DFEH, whichever is earlier. (42 USC 2000e-5)
- 2. To file a valid complaint with DFEH, the employee must file his/her complaint within one year of the alleged discriminatory act(s) unless an exception exists pursuant to Government Code 12960. (Government Code 12960)

Employees wishing to file complaints with the DFEH and EEOC should contact the nondiscrimination coordinator for more information.
