

SEAL OF BILITERACY

Over 100 students were awarded the State Seal of Biliteracy by having proficiency in a world language and English.

AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination)

AVID, a structured and rigorous college preparatory program for self-motivated, potential college-bound students serves over 245 Foothill students across grades 9-12. Nationally, AVID students complete four-year college entrance requirements at a rate that is at least two times the national rate, and three out of four AVID graduates who apply to four-year colleges or universities are accepted. Of the 58 Foothill AVID graduates from the class of 2019, 96% matriculated into college.

ASSOCIATED STUDENT BODY: CLUBS, ACTIVITIES & HONOR SOCIETIES

Consisting of over 40 students, the Foothill ASB Leadership class implements and oversees all student activities at Foothill High School. Student activities range from assemblies and dances to awareness programs and school-wide community service. The purpose of each activity is to engage students and create a welcoming, enriched, and involved school community at Foothill High School. In addition to campus-wide events, the ASB Student Council also oversees student-run organizations on our campus in the areas of academics, politics, culture, religion, athletics, special interests, and philanthropy.

CTE Pathways

Foothill offers eight pathways that were developed (including FEAT) and offer students options in engineering, manufacturing, video production, and computer science earning students and teachers many awards and distinctions. These courses are

approved as a "g" elective by the UC and CSU systems. Pathway options include: Engineering, Manufacturing, Computer Science, Culinary Arts, Media Arts, Graphic Design, Visual Imagery, and Robotics. The Foothill Engineering and Technology (FEAT) program started with the support of a California Partnership Academy grant in 2008 and has quickly established itself as one of the top STEM programs in California. The program coordinator and Engineering teacher earned the distinction of 2016 CTE Teacher of the Year. The FEAT program was the focus of Foothill's 2015 Gold Medal School award and utilizes a sequenced curriculum from Project Lead the Way in order to build and develop students' skills and abilities to be applied to real-world projects.

TUSD CONNECT

The TUSD Connect initiative spawned from the passage of a bond measure that delivered state-of-the-art technology to each student in Tustin Unified School District. Every student at Foothill is issued a laptop computer to be used for academic purposes. Along with classroom technology, Foothill students routinely use technology to research, collaborate, and demonstrate learning. Programs offered by Google, Microsoft, and a host of others, are routinely used in an academic setting to give students a more in depth understanding of the subject matter. The technology provided by this initiative supports rigorous academic standards and engaging instructional strategies.

ATHLETIC PROGRAMS

Foothill has a long tradition of athletic excellence. The athletic program includes 28 different sport programs and at least 2 levels within each program In 2018-19, 21 out of our 25 programs went on to CIF playoffs and Foothill won 14 league titles and 1 CIF championship. While these accolades are a source of pride, FHS also seeks to build character, work ethic, and integrity in its athletes. The athletic program includes the following sports:

NEWSPAPER – KNIGHTLIFE

Knight Life, the Foothill High School student newspaper, includes more than 30 sections and is published once a month. This student-run program features stories of all aspects of the school, including sports, academics, and an editorial section. Several journalism students submit articles for the local newspaper as well. Knightlife has a proud tradition of thorough and honest reporting on Foothill-related issues and also offers an online version (www.knightlife.org), which was launched in 2015.

INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE - IB

The Foothill IB program has approximately 85 junior and senior students, as well as 211 pre-IB Freshman and Sophomore students. As a full diploma program, FHS has a 95% diploma completion rate among students that enter the program. The average IB exam score is a 5.0. The IB Diploma Program offers students comprehensive course work in traditional disciplines while bolstering writing skills, preparing students for rigorous university study and enhancing students' college admissions opportunities. Diploma candidates write an extended research essay (EE), complete 120 hours of creativity, action, and service (CAS), and participate in a Theory of Knowledge (TOK) class that examines the relationship among academic disciplines and investigates how one arrives at knowledge and develops reasoning skills.
