## First Grade 2<sup>nd</sup> Nine Weeks

The parent guide below is designed to keep you informed of exactly which standards are being taught during the 2<sup>nd</sup> 9 weeks grading period. In the left hand column you will see the exact language from the report card and the Alabama College and Career Readiness Standard (CCRS) on which it is based. The Skills column on the right-hand side addresses what is being assessed.

During the 1st 9 weeks, first grade students will review basic reading concepts and establish routines for reading and writing. Students will explore fiction and nonfiction texts to learn how texts are structured and how various structures and features help us understand what we are reading and hearing. Students will write stories and informative texts using a combination of oral storytelling, drawing and writing.
