# **Notable Notes**

**Prekindergartners**, with their teachers **Mrs. Weed**, **Mrs. McCulloch, and Mrs. Mauceri**, heard three storybooks: *Hello*, *Hello*, *Chicken Chickens Go to School*, and *Curious George's First Day of School*. **Art teacher Julian** has **3<sup>rd</sup> graders** learning how to draw 3-dimensional figures. With **Mrs. Gwiazdoski** and **Mrs. Baker**, **1<sup>st</sup> graders** will learn about equality. The children should understand the meaning of the equal sign, and determine if equations involving addition and subtraction are true or false. For example, which of the following equations are true and which are false? 6 = 6, 7 = 8 - 1, 5 + 2 = 2 + 5, 4 + 1 = 5 + 2. Mr. Brault's 6<sup>th</sup> graders are learning to divide fractions by fractions, and understand what it means. **Mrs. Piccirillo's 6<sup>th</sup> graders**, in studying conflict in literature will write about the various types of



conflict in their own lives and how they solved them or plan to solve.
