(When: September 3, 2021 Where: GWT / RET / DMS / DHS)


HNH Immunizations will be providing and administering flu shots to our students again this school year. We have used them over the last several years to provide flu vaccines to non-PEEHIP covered students.

If you would like for your student to receive the flu vaccine please complete the 2021-2022 Vaccine Consent Form and return to school by September 2nd. You must complete the entire form for your student to receive an injection. (**Please do not return the form if your child will not be receiving the vaccine.) PLEASE prepare your child ahead of time that he or she will be receiving a shot at school.

This particular flu clinic will not cover PEEHIP insurance participants. However, flu vaccines will be offered to PEEHIP dependent children later in the month (GWT and RET 9/21/21; DMS and DHS 9/23/21). If your student is covered by PEEHIP insurance and you would like for him or her to receive a flu vaccine at school please contact me or your school based nurse for a consent form.

I acknowledge that I am giving permission for HNH Immunizations, Inc. to adjudicate and appeal claims with my insurance providers on my behalf. Clinic dates can be obtained from the school. I understand that the health-related information on this form will be used for insurance billing purposes and your privacy will be protected. Influenza (Flu) Vaccine (Inactivated or Recombinant): What you need to know

1 Why get vaccinated?

Influenza vaccine can prevent influenza (flu).

Flu is a contagious disease that spreads around the United States every year, usually between October and May. Anyone can get the flu, but it is more dangerous for some people. Infants and young children, people 65 years of age and older, pregnant women, and people with certain health conditions or a weakened immune system are at greatest risk of flu complications.

Pneumonia, bronchitis, sinus infections and ear infections are examples of flu-related complications.

If you have a medical condition, such as heart disease, cancer or diabetes, flu can make it worse.

Flu can cause fever and chills, sore throat, muscle aches, fatigue, cough, headache, and runny or stuffy nose. Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults.

Each year **thousands of people in the United States die from flu**, and many more are hospitalized. Flu vaccine prevents millions of illnesses and flu-related visits to the doctor each year.

2 Influenza vaccine

CDC recommends everyone 6 months of age and older get vaccinated every flu season. **Children 6 months through 8 years of age** may need 2 doses during a single flu season. **Everyone else** needs only 1 dose each flu season.

It takes about 2 weeks for protection to develop after vaccination.

4 Risks of a vaccine reaction

• Soreness, redness, and swelling where shot is given, fever, muscle aches, and headache can happen after influenza vaccine.

• There may be a very small increased risk of Guillain-Barre Syndrome (GBS) after inactivated influenza vaccine (the flu shot).

Young children who got the flu shot along with pneumococcal vaccine (PCV13), and/or DTap vaccine at the same time might be slightly more likely to have a seizure caused by fever. Tell your health care provider if a child who is getting flu vaccine has ever had a seizure.

People sometimes faint after medical procedures, including vaccination. Tell your provider if you feel dizzy or have vision changes or ringing in the ears.

As with any medicine, there is a very remote chance of a vaccine causing a severe allergic reaction, other serious injury, or death.

5 What if there is a serious problem?

An allergic reaction could occur after the vaccinated person leaves the clinic. If you see signs of a severe allergic reaction (hives, swelling of the face and throat, difficulty breathing, a fast heartbeat, dizziness, or weakness), call 9-1-1 and get the person to the nearest hospital.

For other signs that concern you, call your health care provider.

Adverse reactions should be reported to the Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System (VAERS). Your health care provider will usually file this report, or you can do it yourself. Visit the VAERS website at www.vaers.hhs.gov or call 1-800-822-7967. VAERS is only for reporting reactions, and VAERS staff do not give medical advice.

6 The National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program

The National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program (VICP) is a federal program that was created to compensate people who may have been injured by certain vaccines. Visit the VICP website at www.hrsa.gov/vaccinecompensation or call 1-800-338-2382 to learn about the program and about filing a claim. There is a time limit to file a claim for compensation.
