Dear SHS Spartan Families,

We have made it to May. The end of the school year is in sight. To say this school year has been different is an understatement. As we enter the last six weeks of school, please make sure your student is utilizing the resources available if they need assistance with their classes. All of us have been working hard to help support our students who have struggled with the academic and social-emotional challenges that COVID has brought about.

After School Teacher Assistance/Learning Centers

After school assistance is still available from our wonderful staff. Students just need to coordinate with the teacher to find out when they are available. Students can also get assistance during "Learning Centers". Throughout the day, staff is available to help students during their study hall times. The teacher may not be your student's primary instructor but can still assist them with the concepts. Student's study hall proctors will be able to provide learning center availability if needed.

Tutoring Assistance

Peer tutoring is available in the LMC. Our peer tutors are students from National Honor Society and/or Beta Club. Our tutors will be working mainly with 9th and 10th graders. If your student needs assistance, please have them talk with their teacher or counselor.

Edmentum

This is an online program that allows students to complete work that may assist them in their academic program. Students are identified as needing this resource and placed in the program accordingly.

Summer School (Free Enrollment)

Somers High School offers summer school at SHS through the use of an online platform called Edmentum. Students will have their own virtual classroom wherein they will complete the required lessons and assessments under the supervision of our summer school instructor.

Skills Blast Assistance (Free Enrollment)

This program will be offered over the summer for those students who may have successfully passed their coursework but could use additional assistance on English and/or Math skills that will make them even better prepared for the fall. ART Students Have Some Advice

This year has been more than "a little strange" for visual art students. Working in hybrid mode most of the year provided a lot of challenges for making art at home. Motivation and distraction issues at home; materials and work transport; finding the right kind of physical space to work: all of it has been a new challenge. Some art students are still working on art at home full time, and along with those who recently came back, have some new found knowledge about their own "work at home" issues.

Since many students move into higher level art classes, and really will need to know how to self manage and make art at home over the summer and next year, I've asked my Honors/AP Class to share some tips.

"Schedule a specific time, one that works for you, to work on art and then stick to it."

"Get started as soon as you are motivated. Don't wait to start or you might lose the energy."

"Keep scrap paper or a sketchbook handy to scribble notes or sketches for projects when the idea strikes."

"Try to find a separate space to work that is dedicated to art making."

"Set up all materials ahead of time so they are ready to go when you are motivated. If you have that separate space, it will be easy to do."

"Listen to your favorite music while you work."

"Try to get feedback from other art friends. Send photos of your work and video chat with each other to keep the ideas flowing."


"Make sure you are working on something you LOVE doing whenever possible."


"If you have to do an assignment you are not in love with, try to MAKE it into something you love by using a new style or media you've always wanted to try."

Machining Clocks in the Tech Department







The CNC Machining class has been hard at work over the past couple of months learning about materials, machines, cutters, and how to calculate machining feeds and speeds. Students started off writing code for the CNC machines by hand and testing their programs on soft materials like foam.

After learning programming basics, students began exploring the CAM software program MasterCam. Using the program, students have been drawing parts and using their drawings to write programs that have become more and more complex. The students have been machining and engraving slightly harder materials like wood and corian.

At this point students are now ready to design their own parts for the CNC machine. The students in the class have been tasked with designing their own unique clocks. The students have been given a battery powered clockwork and a choice of 3 different hand sizes. They then have to design, program and machine a wall mounted clock body and face.

The students have come up with some very interesting designs and are beginning the process of setting up the CNC router to cut them out of wood. Thus far the class has done an excellent job demonstrating what they have learned and we are looking forward to seeing the final products.

Let's Stay Hydrated!

This year due to covid-19 the water fountains had to be shut down. As a result students are sometimes going long periods of time without water which can have a significant impact on how they feel and their learning. Even mild dehydration can lead to the following symptoms (most of which I see students for everyday.)

- Inability to focus on tasks
- Light-headedness
- Dizzy spells
- Headaches
- Altered Moods
- Dry tongue or mouth
- Muscle weakness
- Tiredness
- Feelings of lethargy


With the official start of spring sports on April 10th, 185 athletes in 8 sports are finally able to return to competition after not being able to play during the 2020 spring season.

Following their 2019 Class S state championship run, the **softball** team has won 7 games in a row after an opening day non-league game loss to Enfield, and lead the NCCC while heading into May with several important games. The **baseball** team has won 5 out of their last 6 games including a couple of late inning comeback wins to start the season with a 5-3 record.

With our **boys lacrosse** team (2 wins) and **girls lacrosse** team (3 wins) competing in the CCC this year due to realignment for non-league scheduling, both teams started the season with tough away games against the better teams in the CCC. Both teams will also play their traditional NCCC rivals in May, and will be looking forward to once again competing in their respective Class S state tournaments.

Our **boy's and girl's track and field** teams are off to a fast start, which included hosting their first home track meet in several years. With several athletes setting school records and the girl's team being undefeated and the boy's team having just one team loss, both teams are looking forward to competing in the NCCC Championships and their respective state tournaments.


