SMART WATCHES – Electronic Violation

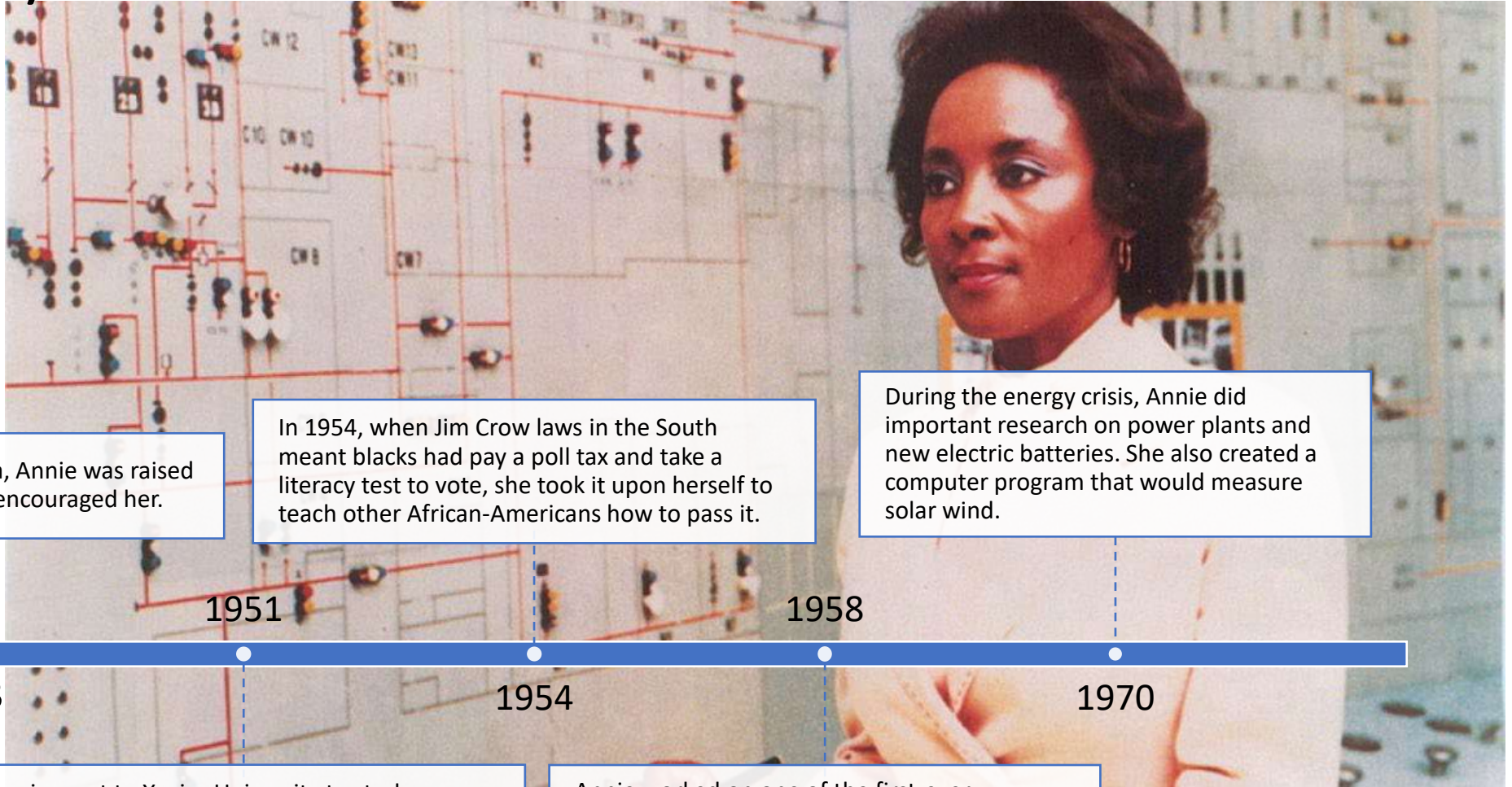
February 1 – March 1

- In 1926, Carter G. Woodson “Father of Black History”, sponsored a national “Negro History Week”
 - Recognized the achievements of Black Americans and others of African descent
- In the 1960’s, college campuses expanded “Negro History Week” to Black History Month
- In 1976, Black History Month was officially recognized in the United States by President Gerald Ford
 - He wanted citizens to “seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history
- 2023 Theme: Black Resistance
 - explores how African Americans have resisted historic and ongoing oppression, in all forms, especially the racial terrorism of lynching, racial pogroms and police killings, since the nation's earliest days.

Ms. Jacob's Door:

Annie Easley Computer Programmer, Mathematician and Rocket Scientist

(1933 – 2011)



Born in Birmingham, Alabama, Annie was raised by a single mom who always encouraged her.

In 1954, when Jim Crow laws in the South meant blacks had pay a poll tax and take a literacy test to vote, she took it upon herself to teach other African-Americans how to pass it.

During the energy crisis, Annie did important research on power plants and new electric batteries. She also created a computer program that would measure solar wind.

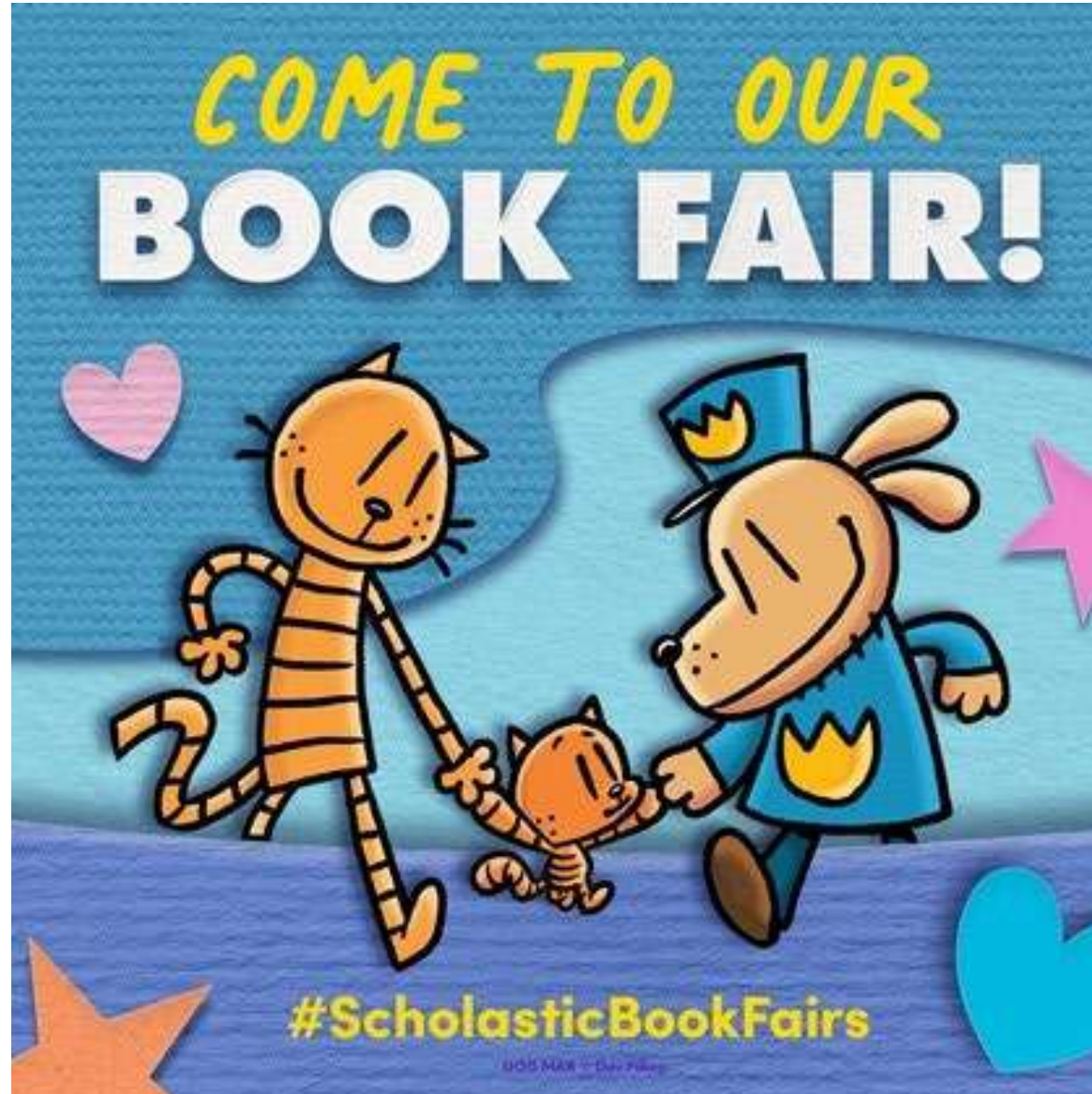

Annie went to Xavier University to study pharmacy education. She applied to NASA and had a 34-year long career as a computer scientist and mathematician.

Annie worked on one of the first-ever computer programs to enable navigation in space.
