Passage (Looking at the Life of a Scientist)

- 1 Picture this: Two people are dressed in special suits from head to toe. Their suits are made of fireproof fabric that protects the human body from heat. They are wearing gloves, boots, and face masks too.
- The people walk out onto a sea of black rock. This rock is the same color as a city street, but it isn't smooth and flat. Instead, it is bumpy and looks just like the ripples in a pond. It is a little difficult for them to keep their balance as they move across the rock. "It's almost like walking on the waves of the sea." one of them says.
- 3 After walking a short distance, the two people stop near a layer of liquid red rock. One of them waves a long stick over the rock. The other reads the thermometer that is attached to the end of the stick. Then they both record the temperature in their notebooks. They look out toward the edge of a mountain to see where the red rock came from. They record this information in their notebooks also.
- Does this sound like a great adventure? For these people, it most definitely is. After all, this is what a typical day is like for people who study volcanoes. These people are called volcanologists. Their job is to learn all about volcanoes so they can better figure out when they might erupt, or blow. Volcanologists look at all parts of a volcano. They study the liquid red rock called lava. They use special tools to gather information. Later, in their lab, they come up with ideas about how volcanoes work.
- Volcanologists aren't the only scientists who have exciting jobs. Some scientists work with animals in the wild. They study animal homes and see how the animals live. They watch how the animals act with one another and how they take care of their young. One group of scientists studies animals that live near the North Pole. They watch birds to see where they like to eat, rest, and lay their eggs. They follow large animals such as polar bears. They want to see where the animals find food and how they live in the cold. Other scientists study animals in Africa. They take trips to see lions, leopards, and hippos in the wild. They learn a lot about these animals by seeing them in their homes.


The Wonderful World of Science
