- Shel Silverstein drew cartoons and wrote books, poems, plays, and songs. His most famous books were written for children. These books were silly but also serious. In these books, he used his pen to make black-and-white drawings that were funny and strange. He was an adult, but knew how children felt and thought. That's why he became one of the most-loved authors in America.
- 2 His full name was Shelby Silverstein. He was born in Chicago, Illinois, in 1932. He started writing and drawing when he was about 12 years old. In the 1950s, he joined the U.S. Army and drew cartoons for a military magazine. When he got out of the Army, he drew cartoons for a magazine and made a book of drawings for adults.
- In 1964, Silverstein wrote a book called <u>The Giving Tree</u>. It was about a boy and a tree. Adults and children loved this book. After that, Silverstein wrote more books for children, such as <u>Where the Sidewalk Ends</u> and <u>A Light in the Attic</u>. These books had fun poems and funny drawings.
- 4 Silverstein didn't just write and draw. He also wrote music. He wrote a song called "A Boy Named Sue." A famous singer named Johnny Cash sang the song. Silverstein also wrote songs for movies and wrote some plays.
- 5 He kept writing books for children until he died in Florida in 1999. He was old, but he still remembered how it felt to be young.
