# Why do we need a grading policy?

#### District Grading Policy Types of Assessments

Supportive Assessments	Purpose: to reinforce instruction and facilitate comprehension.  Examples Grades B-2 Homework, guided practice, outlines, center work, binder checks/notebook checks  Examples Grades 3-6 Homework, guided practice, outlines, center work, binder checks/notebook checks, spelling quizzes, grammar quizzes and math facts, small home-based projects.
