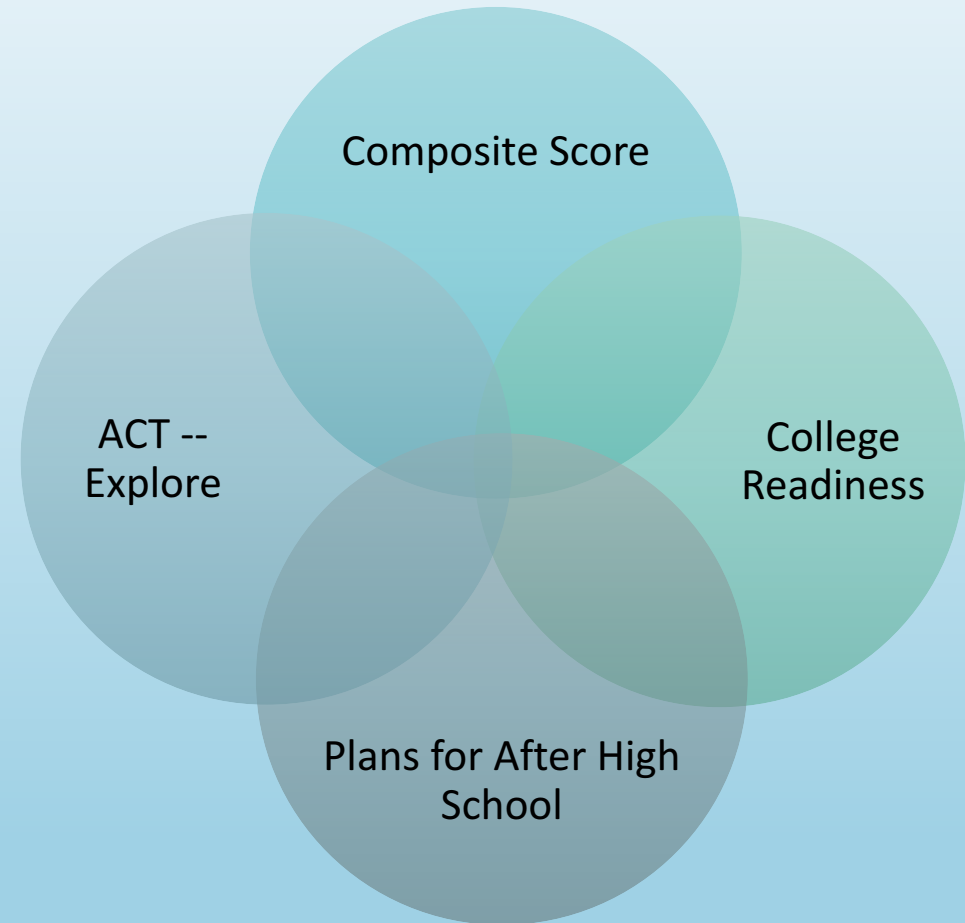

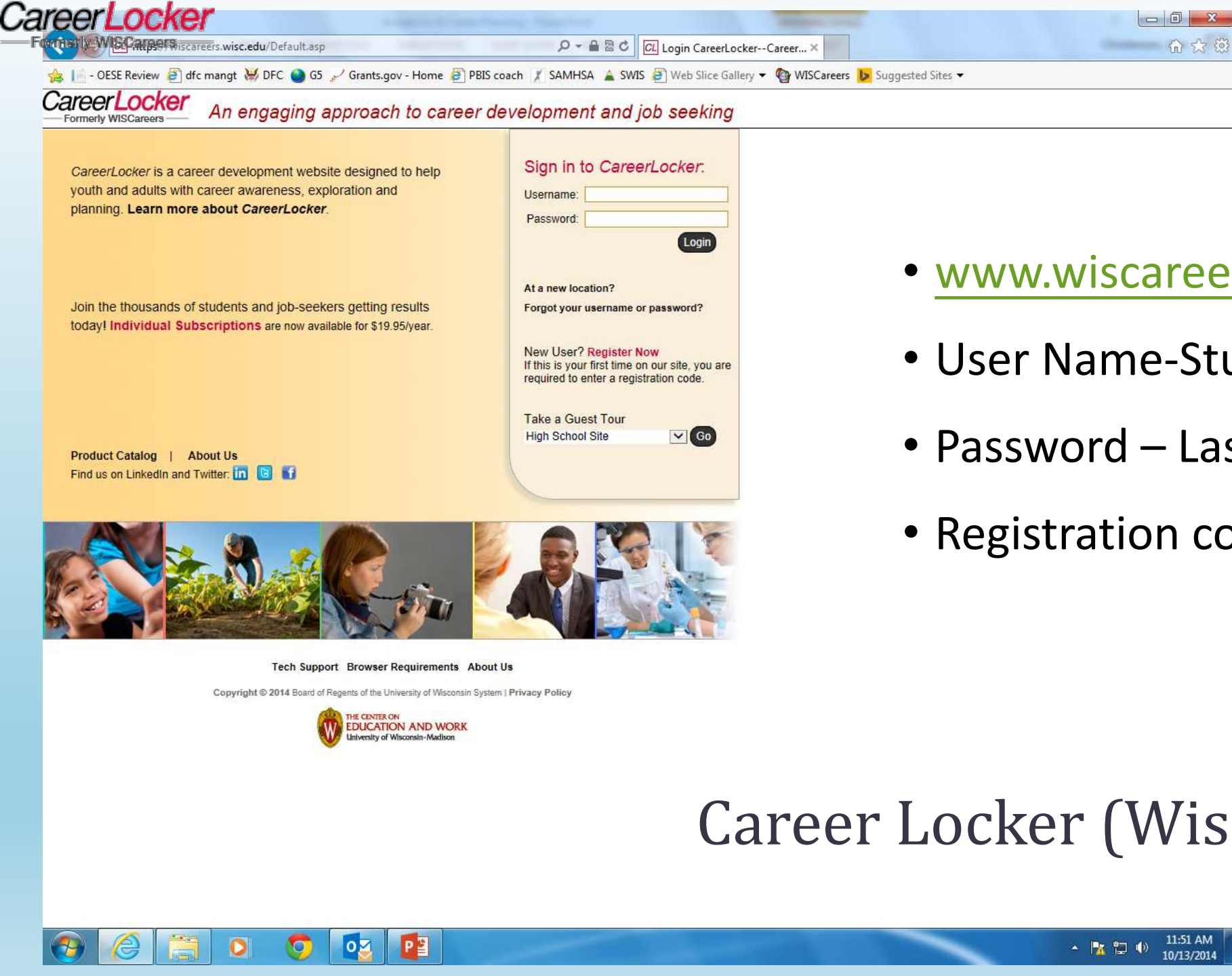



Guidance Counselors

General Description

School counselors work with all students to help them develop the skills they will need to learn, communicate, and work effectively. They help students identify their interests, skills, aptitudes, and educational goals.

They help students plan their academic programs so they graduate from high school prepared for work or postsecondary education. Often students need to learn more about their interests and abilities to make decisions about school and work. Counselors give standardized tests to students to measure their achievement in school. They have students complete interest inventories or other questionnaires to help them identify their strengths, recognize problem areas, and explore career options. Counselors interpret these test results for students, their parents, and teachers.



at a glance

- Help students learn about schools and jobs
- Help students with personal and emotional issues
- Regularly interact with people
- Usually work during the school year (they have summers off)
- Have a master's degree and are certified
- Earn \$44,990 per year (national average)

School counselors also help students deal with issues that interfere with their success in school. Conflicts among students, or between students and their teachers may require the help of a counselor. Counselors must be aware of the personal and social pressures on students. Counselors work with large classes, small groups, and individuals to teach students how to handle problems and resolve conflicts. They may refer students for individual counseling.

Counselors work 36 to 40 hours a week. They often meet with students individually or in groups before or after school. They also attend scheduled school events in the evening hours and on weekends.
