Dr. Mark C. Schug, Professor Emeritus University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee "Common Core in the Social Studies: Who Desegregated Major League Baseball, Jackie Robinson or Adam Smith?"

Professor Schug taught for 36 years at the middle school, high school, and university levels. A widely recognized scholar, he has written and edited over 200 articles, books, and national curriculum materials. He has been the guest co-editor of eight issues of Social Education, the flagship journal of the National Council for the Social Studies. His latest book is Economic Episodes in American History published by Wohl Publishing and co-authored William C. Wood. Professor Schug earned a Ph.D. from the University of Minnesota. He has received national awards for leadership, service, and research in economic education. He has been married for 45 years. He and his wife Io enjoy the lakes of northern Wisconsin in the summer and the sunshine of southern Florida in the winter. They have two grown daughters and three grand children.

#### Preamble

- 10) To respect the rights and to meet the responsibilities on which our liberty rests and our democracy depends.

- 1. Demonstrated a record of "lifetime achievement" in social studies education in Arizona.
- 2. Served social studies education in a consistent and outstanding manner.
- 3. Exemplified the term, "Social Studies Educator," and/or nurtured such qualities in others.
- 4. Supported effective programs for democratic citizenship in their communities.

The Murra Award recipient will receive a plaque and a one year membership in ACSS.

## **Great Moments in Social Studies Teaching Awards**

In order to recognize teachers who <u>design and implement exemplary classroom experiences</u>, the Arizona Council for the Social Studies established *Great Moments in Social Studies Teaching*. Award recipients will receive certificates citing and describing their outstanding examples of social studies teaching and a \$100.00 cash award. "Great Moments" can take many forms and use various teaching methods (e.g., simulation, lecture, and role-play). To be recognized as a "Great Moment in Social Studies Teaching," an exemplary classroom experience must:

- 1. Be at least an extended lesson or mini-unit (i.e. a series of activities lasting several days).
- 2. Be significant for its creativity, meaningful content, and potential for promoting learning.
- 3. Incorporate teaching methods likely to engage and motivate students.
