Honors and Advanced Placement

Honors courses in English, math, social studies, sciences, and foreign languages are offered. AP classes in English, Statistics, Calculus, Biology, US Government and US History are also offered. These courses are designated as such on the transcript. High school subjects taken in the eighth grade also receive honors credit.

Honor Rolls

Student honor roll is based upon the student's numerical average. Grades for students in Honors or Advanced Placement Courses are weighted five points for Honor Roll computation purposes.

Dean's List - 89.50 or higher average (No grade below 85) Honor Roll - 85.00 or higher average (No grade below 80)

Dual Enrollment

Students may receive both high school and community college credit while enrolled in high school courses that are approved to offer dual enrollment credit. All courses are taught by PUHSD teachers who are community college certified. Some dual enrolled courses require that students take and pass a community college ASSET test prior to enrolling.

Magnet Program

The Center for Medical Arts & Health Studies is designed for students interested in preparing for careers in medical or health fields. There are three major strands: Sports Medicine, Medical Research and Health Careers. Students enroll in "Introduction to Medical Arts" their first year and choose a strand for their remaining three years. Students are encouraged to take advanced science and math courses in conjunction with the Magnet curriculum. This program works with local Health Systems in a close partnership to provide opportunities for our students to observe medical professionals at work in various health facilities and complete clinical experiences as nursing assistants.

Student Achievement is Phoenix Union's top priority. According to the Arizona accountability system, all schools are "Performing" or better. Bioscience High School broke into the "Excelling" category. The rankings reflect improving trends in test scores, graduation rates and a dropout rate that has declined below state and national averages. Expanded Honors and Advanced Placement classes, innovative programs like AVID (Advanced Via Individual Determination) and Read 180, and the implementation of new strategies in math instruction, Special Education inclusion and English as a Second Language are paying dividends.

Phoenix Union is also a leader in adopting instructional technologies to the classroom that improve teaching and enhance the learning environment for children through increased participation and interaction.

Phoenix's growth is legendary, and the District reflects and responds to the population explosion. An increase of over 1200 students in the past three years followed a \$205 million bond approval by voters, which is funding the construction of new schools, campus renovations and technology enhancement. Franklin Police and Fire High School, focusing on law enforcement and fire science, and Bioscience High School, reflecting Phoenix's emerging biotech industry, are examples of the Small Schools Initiative the District is embracing.

The largest high school district in the state is also the most diverse. Over 60 languages are represented, and more than half of our students come from homes where English is not the primary language. Latino students represent over 75 percent of the enrollment, and the District boasts the largest enrollment of African American students in the state.

With 26,000 students, 16 schools and 2,900 dedicated employees, the Phoenix Union High School District stands poised to deliver a 21st century education for our community.
