


DISTRICT ASPIRE SUMMARY 2021-22




DISTRICT SUMMARY ASPIRE 2020-21 and 2021-2022




ESSA School Rating Index – Charleston Elementary - B




ESSA School Rating Index – Charleston High School - B

It is also used to purchase a grade level chrome books, books for classroom libraries, literacy, math and stem instruction materials, purchase of online software for math and literacy. ACT prep tutoring, credit recovery, parent involvement activities and materials. Elementary after school care program.
- Professional development funds are used to send staff to workshops and conferences for the purpose of increasing teacher quality in instructional areas. Some of the funds are transferred to ESA.
- ALE funds will be used for the Charleston ALE Program.

Security Changes for the 2022-2023 School Year

- > All classroom doors will remain locked at all times
- All exterior doors will be locked in the morning after students arrive (except main entrance in Middle School and High School)
- > A "buzz-in" system will be installed at Middle School
- A glass and steel partition will be installed at the high school
- > The District will have a Threat Assessment Team to investigate student issues.
