# AP ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND COMPOSITION

#### PURPOSE OF THE COURSE:

- 1. Prepare students for the AP Exam in May through mastery of close reading, writing, and rhetorical strategies
- 2. Shift students' focus from literature to the rich world of nonfiction readings and techniques writers employ to achieve their purpose
- 3. Teach students to read, think, and write critically about an author's use of language in 20<sup>th</sup> -21<sup>st</sup> century American literature and in nonfiction from a variety of genres and time periods
