


Art Portfolio

Things You'll Do:

Junior year is a foundations year of skill development both in traditional and digital media. This year will focus on understanding the importance of "seeing" objects and accurately representing them using a variety of media. This begins with a summer assignment that explores art history and the traditional master/apprentice relationship seen in the work, along with investigating careers, colleges, and artistic styles within work.

Senior year becomes more fully focused on portfolio development and presentation, resulting in more individualized projects. Students investigate themes to create visual concepts that guide the artmaking process. This work begins with the summer assignment of completing 5 planning and playing layouts, where theme and visual imagery are explored.



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
