


# PSAT Score Release

PSAT Scores will be available online for Connecticut students beginning Monday, December 9th. All 9th through 11th grade students should access their scores by:

1. Logging into their College Board Account if they've already created one OR
2. Creating a College Board Account if they haven't already

# Logging Into Your College Board Account

- 10th and 11th grade students should have created accounts.
- Go to collegeboard.org to log in.
- Use the Forgot username or password if you do not remember your log in information. Try both your school and personal emails before creating a new account.

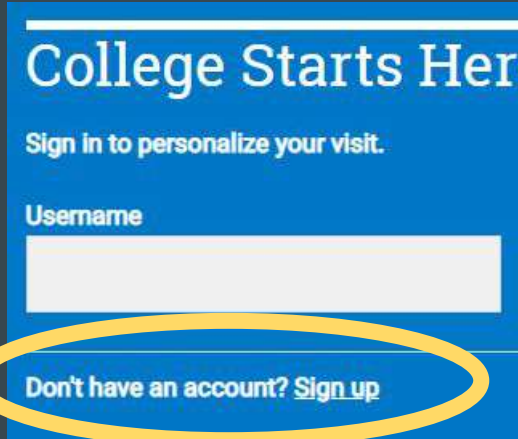

# For Students Who Need To Create a CB Account

*\*For 10th & 11th graders, make sure you do not already have an account by using the “Forgot username” feature and trying all email addresses. Also check with your parents to ensure they haven’t created an account for you.*

Step 1: Go to collegeboard.org, click Sign up, and select Student.



Step 2: Input your information. Make sure your first name matches what you wrote on your PSAT.
