BCHS Latin Students Collect International Accolades, Earn Perfect Score for Third Time in Four Years

Thirty nine students at Bristol Central High School recently received very high scores on the fortieth annual National Latin Exam. In March, students in Kelly Monahan-DiNoia's Latin I, II, III and IV classes took the exam which is sponsored by the American Classical League and the National Junior Classical League. BCHS Latin students competed against 149,000 Latin students from all fifty states and sixteen foreign countries including: Australia, Belize, Canada, China, France, Germany, Ghana, Greece, Italy, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Singapore, Spain, Taiwan, the United Arab Emirates, the United Kingdom, and Zimbabwe. Latin II student, **Sebastian Kania**, the son of Pawel and Ewa Kania,

earned a perfect score on this tremendously competitive examination!

In its inaugural year, 1978, approximately 9,000 students participated in the exam, and the number has grown steadily each of its forty years to reach its current level. The birth, growth, and success of the National Latin Exam are all the results of a cooperative venture which has linked elementary-, middle-, high-school, and college teachers across the nation and the world.

The National Latin Exam tests students' knowledge of ancient Roman language, grammar, literature, geography, daily life, mythology, history, and English derivatives. There are also comprehension questions based on a short passage. The test has a time limit of 45 minutes. The BCHS winners will be recognized at Bristol Central World Language Department's awards ceremony on Tuesday, May 16, at 2:30 p.m. in the BCHS auditorium.

Mock Accident

Bristol Central High School will be conducting a Mock Motor Vehicle Accident to promote awareness of the dangers associated with distracted and impaired driving. BCHS Class of 2017 Senior Prom Info

The Senior Prom will be held on Saturday, June 3, 2017 at the Aqua Turf Club in Southington from 6:30-11:00 p.m. Students must arrive no later than 7:15 p.m. Tickets will be on sale from May 8-19. Tickets can be purchased during lunches or from Mr. Greenleaf after school in Rm. 124. The class has run enough successful fundraisers to have a photo booth at the prom for unlimited use all night! This photo booth will include fun props and dress up items for all!

Students must be a member in good standing of the Class of 2017 in order to purchase a prom ticket. That means that **they must meet all school eligibility requirements.** Anyone who is ineligible due to excessive tardies, absences or suspensions will not be able to purchase a ticket. The administration reserves the right to refund money and refuse admission to the prom for students who

become ineligible after they have purchased a ticket.

In addition, students must have paid class dues for all four years. Class dues are \$15 for each of the past years. Back dues may be paid now or when purchasing prom tickets. Make checks payable to BCHS Class of 2017.

Any student who will be attending the prom with a date who is not a student at BCHS must be aware that they will need to provide their date's name, address, phone number and date of birth as well as parent's name and address. A form must be completed and signed by the principal of the date's school to attest that the date meets all eligibility requirements. All of this information must be available at the time of ticket purchase. No one over the age of 20 will be permitted to attend the prom.

Dress for the prom is formal. Dresses for girls and jackets and ties for guys are required. While prom dresses and tuxedos are usually worn, they are not required. However, sneakers or athletic footwear, jeans, t-shirts, tank tops, halter tops, baseball caps and sportswear are not appropriate dress for the prom. The school dress code will be enforced. Bare midriffs are inappropriate. We reserve the right to refuse admission if dress is inappropriate.

Students must be in school for at least three periods on Friday, June, 2. Students who are tardy, absent or dismissed on that Friday will not be able to attend the prom. Of course students with late arrival or early dismissal may follow their normal schedule. However, students cannot miss a scheduled class.

The Prom photographer is Art Rich Studios. Students will receive a flyer with prom photo prices when they purchase a prom ticket. Students are under no obligation to purchase any prom photos, but if they choose to do so they may prepay online or have the money available at the prom. Try to avoid standing in line for pictures. The photographer will be there until all who wish to be photographed have been photographed.

Once we have given a final count to the Aqua Turf, we cannot change reservations or give refunds for cancellations after that date. If a student's actions on prom night or during the week before cause them to be denied admission to the prom, they will not receive a refund because we have to pay for the meal whether they are there or not.

Senior Class Night

Senior Class Night will be held on Tuesday, June 6. The program includes a picnic for all seniors in

the courtyard in front of the auditorium beginning at 6:00 p.m. followed by the class night program in the auditorium at 7:00 p.m. where Senior Superlative awards will be presented. Senior parents and guests are invited and strongly urged to attend the program in the auditorium. This program will also include a slide show presentation highlighting the last four years at BCHS as well as the presentation of the class gift and class poem. The class night activities will conclude with the distribution of yearbooks following the program.

A student may not enter 11th grade unless the health assessment (physical exam) and immunization update are completed. We will also once again offer the Summer STEM program in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics.

Summer School registration will take place at Bristol Eastern High School, 632 King Street, on Thursday, July 6, from 2:00 to 6:00 p.m. and Friday, July 7, from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. Registration will be through the main entrance. Online registration will also be available beginning June 1 through the Bristol Board of Education website, www.bristol.k12.ct.us/department/summer-school

Course fees for Bristol residents are: High school grade 9 and 10 are free; grade 11 and 12 \$175, and \$87.50 for semester courses such as Civics. Middle school grades 6, 7 & 8 are also free for Bristol residents. The high school

out-of-town fee is \$225 for a full course and \$112.50 for semester courses such as Civics and \$225 for middle school. There is also a \$25 book deposit for each course taken. Participants can register and pay online or in person.

Copies of the Summer School brochure will be mailed during the third week of May. They will also be available online. In the meantime, please make every effort to include the dates, location, and registration and contact information available to parents and students as soon as possible.
