In the sports arena, volleyball season ended with our last matches in Cotopaxi on October 16th. The girls had a strong season. Basketball will start within the next couple of weeks.

It is pumpkin season. Just ask any preschooler a question about pumpkins or squash and they can tell you the different characteristics such as lumpy, bumpy, and rigid. They have collected seeds and now they are cooking pumpkins.

The 7th and 8th graders have started to read <u>Freedom Writers</u> and there are lively conversations in their literature circles around the book. They just finished an Egyptian unit with mummified apples, and their study of the 3 branches of government also finished with a Venn Diagraph. In current events, they have been researching Ebola; where it started and how it spreads.

In science, the 8th graders are looking at calories in food and the amount of energy the food generates. They burned peanuts to calculate the calories. The 7th graders finished an earth science unit studying the plates of the earth and the causes of tsunamis. The 6th graders have been learning about movement and potential and kinetic energy.

The kinders are doing a lot of reading and they love it. They are even writing their own sentences and will soon be authors of their own books.

The 1st and 2nd graders have been productive and have created some wonderful fall poetry and art. To build the students' vocabulary and knowledge in science and social studies, Miss Jody has a beautiful word wall full of pictures and definitions.

The 3rd and 4th graders completed a fairy tale unit by writing their own perspective on a fairy tale. They also have been learning about the different forms of energy; heat, light, and electricity and they have projects to reveal practical applications of their new knowledge.

Gardner School just purchased STAR 360. This is a web based comprehensive assessment tool for both reading and math. It allows teachers to test students' performance in a short amount of time and then group students for targeted instruction, measure growth, and monitor progress. Only one staff member had ever used STAR, so we got three one-hour webinar training sessions along with the program. Last Friday, Oct. 17, the staff came in and we sat through 2 hours of instruction. We look forward to having this added tool for documentation of student achievement.

Liz Schneider, Kevin Crosson, Casey Huff, and I applied for scholarships to attend the Space Foundation Discovery Center in Colorado Springs. This scholarship is valued at \$980 and awards 52 students, 3rd through 8th, and their teachers to participate in a 20-35 minute presentation followed by a 40-60 minute hands-on activity or demonstration taught by an accredited Space Foundation instructor, plus a 60-minute pre-class session and a 60-minute post-class session via distance learning. Our field trip day is Monday, November 10.

Please join us at our Open House the evening of October 28, and see the work of our students and meet the Gardner staff. Also, our book fair will be open that evening and this allows for a great opportunity to do some shopping.

Culture Club is also interested in celebrating the "Day of the Dead" prior to Halloween (normally celebrated Nov. 2nd).



Our iPad program is moving along. At the time of this writing we have deployed all Teachers iPads. Teachers received training conducted by our Apple sales team Friday, October 3rd. We received the Life proof cases for the iPads October 9th and distributed them to Walsenburg campus teachers that same day. Gardner teacher received theirs the next week. We have enabled all iPads for the John Mall Students. Students and their parents have been asked to attend an information meeting Thursday night October 23rd. The purpose of this meeting is to explain the districts expectations for Students, Parents, Teachers and the District. Students and their parents will sign an agreement indicating their understanding and acceptance of the obligations and responsibilities that accompany the iPad. Student iPads will be handed out to students Monday afternoon at the end of the school day

We are currently setting up iPads for Peakview School. An information meeting similar to the John Mall meeting is planned to be held October 27th at peakview. We anticipate being able to hand out iPads to student by Thursday, October 30th.

As we complete setting up Peakview's iPads, we will set up Gardner's iPads. An information meeting for Gardner is scheduled for Wednesday, October 29th, with ipads being handed out within three days of that meeting, or by Tuesday, November 4th

Our Mobile Device Management Solution is Air-Watch. This solution gives us the ability to manage the ipads according to Teacher or Student groups and allows us to set restrictions on the devices at group levels. Our App catalog, accessible to all users, contains over 40 free apps. Eventually, it will contain textbooks as welf.

As you can tell from the subject of this report, the iPad project has been consuming most of Manuel's and my time; we have not ignored the day to day requirements of our school user population
