- Essays




#### Step Up To Writing Traffic Signal

#### Power Number Statements



- This year, Lincoln Alternative is a California Distinguished School nominee.




#### Occasion/Position Statements

After, Even though, If, Although, When, Before, In order to, If,.....

- These sentences are more for 3<sup>rd</sup> grade and up. They are compound sentences and they lead to great paragraphs and essays.
- Although there are many schools in Corona, Lincoln Alternative is the best elementary school.
- After visiting Lincoln Alternative School, I know it is the best place for my family.

#### Accordian Paragraphs

- Students create accordian paragraphs as a draft to go back and work on.
- We are going to write an accordian paragraph about "Family".
- Make sure to use one of the types of topic sentences we spoke about and use transition words.



#### Let's Write a Narrative

- Look at the picture in the folder.
- Create a quick sketch to tell a story about the picture.

## Analyze A Paragraph

- After your child has written an essay or paragraph, have him/her write the first word of each sentence. (see example)
- Ask your child to change any words that are the same.

# What can parents do to assist their children with writing?

- After your child reads, ask him/her to write a summary topic sentence. This can be done after each chapter or it can be done orally with kindergarteners: "Clifford's Vacation tells how Clifford got into trouble while he was with his family."
- When your child needs to write a paragraph or essay, help him/her create an informal outline to organize ideas.
- If you read over your child's writing look for examples of good topic sentences. The topic sentences will lead to strong paragraphs. Remember, the topic sentence has the main idea in it.
- When reading over your child's writing look to see that each sentence begins with a different letter.

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
