CLASSROOM NEWS

KINDERGARTEN

In Kindergarten we are very busy. We have a very exciting month planned for your little ones. The next few weeks through read-alouds, class discussions and activities we are learning about how to be a good listener, classroom rules and expected behaviors. This year we are using Class dojo as a behavioral system. If you have not logged on yet and need help please contact your child's teacher.

This month:

Letters we are learning: T,B,F,N,M,I,U,C,O,A,G,S

Language Arts: Roles of the author and illustrator, who is the character of the story? Where is the setting? What happens in the beginning, middle and end of the story?

Math- Identifying numbers 1-10, counting 1-20, 2D shapes

Reminders: Check your child's folder daily. Take out any work from the day. Please label all backpacks, lunchboxes, sweatshirts and coats. Please help your little ones become more independent by teaching them how to zip coats and tie shoes.

FIRST GRADE

The First Grade Team has once again chosen <u>Scholastic News</u> as our basis for our Science and Social Studies. Please send in your \$ 6.53 as soon as possible so we may get your child's subscription for <u>Scholastic News</u> and <u>Science Spin started</u>.

SECOND GRADE NEWS

Second grade is looking forward to another exciting and successful school year. We are beginning a new program called Wilson Fundations which incorporates phonics, spelling, and writing. As a result, spelling tests will not take place on a weekly basis. However, spelling

homework will be sent home for added practice. Contact your child's teacher with any specific questions regarding this program.

Our reading unit theme focusses on character traits and finding evidence to support ideas. We are working on addition, subtraction, and solving one and two-step problems. In science, we are working on the three states of matter.

We thank you for your continued support. Together we make a difference.

THIRD GRADE

In ELA we are studying character traits through literature. We started the TRC reading assessment to determine the students' reading level.

In math we began with telling time to the minute, 5 minutes and half hour. Now we are learning to multiply using arrays, repeated addition, and equal groups.

This year for behavior management we are using the Class Dojo. If you didn't sign up yet, please do so.

FOURTH GRADE

Our fourth grade students are getting off to an excellent start this school year!

In math, fourth grade students are learning to multiply, divide and conquer.

During our ELA block, students are learning how to identify nonfiction text features. Please remind your child to read for at least 20 minutes a day and review their multiplication facts daily.

New to our school this year is a website called Class Dojo. We are using this website to monitor classroom behavior. Please check the website daily (<u>http://www.classdojo.com</u>) to view your student's progress.

FIFTH GRADE

ELA: We are finishing up our first ELA unit- Mysteries! Students will soon begin to write a mystery story of their own!

Mathematics: Our mathematicians are learning how to add, subtract, read, write, compare, and round decimals.

Social Studies: Our historians will continue learning about the causes and effects of the American Revolution.

Science: Be on the lookout for a Project on Sound coming home! This Project will be due at the end of October.

PARENT CORNER



Step 1: You have to Have a Plan:

Sit down with your kids and lay out expectations now, when the school year is starting, rather than waiting until problems arise. "Two or three goals is plenty, and you'll get better results if your child helps decide them," says Alexandra Mayzler, director of New York City—based Thinking Caps Tutoring and author of <u>Tutor in a Book: Better Grades as Easy as 1-2-3</u>.

Ask: What were your child's stumbling blocks last year? Maybe homework time was running into bedtime, so agree on an earlier start time. Did your child resist reading? Work on ways to make it fun—maybe set up a reading tent under your dining room table. Review your child's <u>homework</u> <u>goals</u> again in October, and perhaps once more in January, says Mayzler. Adjust your plan as you go, letting your child take as much ownership of the process as possible.
