Student participants live on campus from Sunday night through Thursday afternoon. (For the summer of 2015, we are starting on Monday, July 6 because of the Holiday weekend.) They attend academically challenging classes during the day and spend their evenings in study, enrichment, recreational and/or challenging activities. Students who successfully complete the USJ institutes receive 3 college credits from USJ. There is a tuition fee of \$250 and an activity fee of \$50 for each University of Saint Joseph Institute. Scholarships are awarded to students upon submission of their 2014-2015 Free and Reduced Lunch forms, signed and documented by school personnel.

Students must also submit high school transcripts and an essay as noted on the application. 

hrough interactive classes, cooperative learning experiences, simulations and collaborative writing projects, students can earn college credit, broaden awareness, and work with fellow students from diverse racial, cultural, geographic and economic backgrounds

BIOTECHNOLOGY

Students explore the mystery behind genes and human heredity and learn about techniques used by major biotechnology companies. Focus areas include cellular structure, DNA structure, DNA isolation, and polymerase chain reaction (PCR). In the lab, students use state-of-the-art molecular biology equipment to perform basic experiments to explore DNA and related molecules. Students analyze results of experiments and write lab reports based on findings.

HEALTH and MEDICAL SCIENCE

Students assess and promote healthy behaviors, and evaluate their own fitness levels, stress levels, and dietary intake. With this data, they prepare portfolios, laboratory reports and presentations about their findings. Classroom and field activities expose students to fitness challenges, the food environment, nutritional science, alternative medicine, and health careers. Symposium day presentations conclude the study.

INTRODUCTORY PSYCHOLOGY

Students study the approaches, methods and subject matter of psychological inquiry. Emphasis is placed on the fundamental questions of psychology, studied through the lenses of culture and diversity:

1) understanding the biological and social bases of consciousness and behavior; and 2) examining the psychology of human relations, motivation, perception, learning, personality, memory, cognition, pathology, morality, and emotion.

POLITICS AND YOUR LIFE

Students get an introduction to the study of politics, with a focus on how politics shape daily life. Topics include: the influence of politics on education, career, and income, family and marriage, health and safety, and personal freedom and social responsibility. Students learn how they can promote justice and community improvement, with special emphasis on the importance of political ideology, various kinds of government, and international affairs.

CO-ED EARLY COLLEGE EXPERIENCE FOR HIGH SCHOOL JUNIORS AND SENIORS

For four weeks, Sunday through Thursday, Summer Institute students receive a rich, rewarding and safe residential college campus experience at University of Saint Joseph.

The courses are led by University of Saint Joseph professors and Connecticut public school teachers who provide instruction and learning opportunities that are motivating and intellectually challenging.

RESIDENTIAL LIFE


