Student and Staff Safety - Provisions for student and staff safety are based on the requirements and guidelines set forth by the Connecticut Commissioner of Education, Governor, Center for Disease Control, and Connecticut Department of Public Health. Wallingford Public Schools is in

compliance with the CT Department of Health's Guidelines for the cleaning of disinfection of schools. All plans were reviewed and approved by the Director of the Wallingford Health Department. In addition, the Wallingford Police Chief and Fire Chief have reviewed and approved the plan as well.

	Mitigation Strategy	District Response
	Universal and correct wearing of masks	 All students and staff must wear face masks at all times. There will be times throughout the day during which students do not have to wear their masks (lunch, recess, physical education(outside), and any socially distant classes that are held outside). If a student forgets to bring his/her mask to school, one will be provided. In very hot conditions, early dismissal will be considered.
	Physical distancing (e.g., including use of cohorts/podding)	 Social distancing will be maintained when feasible. In certain instances, students will be in common groups throughout the day. Teachers will maximize the space between themselves and the students. Signage will be posted reminding students of the need to social distance.
	Handwashing and respiratory etiquette	 Hand washing is key and will be required throughout the day by students and staff. Hand sanitizer is available in all classrooms. Signage will be posted reminding students of the need to hand wash.
	Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation	 Cleaning Protocols Cleaning of vehicles will occur once per day; Anti-bacterial cleaning supplies will be provided to drivers to enable them to spot-clean any surface that becomes contaminated during the route prior to the start of school. Ventilation and Water Systems Maintenance Ventilations systems throughout the district have been assessed for optimal performance. Maintenance and setting adjustments have been made to accommodate any determined need for additional ventilation. Teachers will be encouraged to open windows whenever possible except in those cases where students with health conditions might be adversely affected.

- Window fans that blow air into a room or free-standing fans that only serve to circulate existing air around a room should not be used.
- The use of central and split AC systems should be allowed. In addition portable AC units can be used providing the discharge is directed up or away from people.
- Water systems throughout the district are in compliance with the CT DPH Return to Service Guidance for Building Water Systems guidelines.

Cleaning Protocols

- Wallingford Public Schools is in compliance with the CT Department of Health's Guidelines for the cleaning and disinfection of schools.
- A cleaning and disinfecting plan for our schools has been developed that identifies
 what areas need cleaning, what areas need cleaning and disinfection, a schedule for
 cleaning and disinfection, what cleaning and disinfection products are needed, what
 personal protective equipment (PPE) is needed, and the person responsible for the
 cleaning and disinfection. This plan reflects the following guidelines from the CT
 Department of Health (DPH)
 - Areas needing daily routine cleaning include:
 - Occupied areas of the school and buses.
 Cleaning of wooden surfaces outdoors is not recommended.
 - Any soft or porous materials that are shared by many individuals (such as blankets, towels, oven mitts, jerseys, etc.) need to be laundered frequently.
 - o Schedules for cleaning and disinfection
 - Daily
 - Restrooms, Health Offices, Isolation Rooms, Known Exposure Areas
 - Appropriate cleaning and disinfection products have been procured for our facilities.
 - Cleaning Products: Detergent products (soap) and water are effective for surface cleaning and are very effective at removing the virus that causes COVID-19 from surfaces.
 - Instead of soap and water, commercially prepared cleaning products

	 may also be used. All cleaning products purchased by schools must comply with the Connecticut School Green Cleaning Law. Staff members are not permitted to bring cleaning products from home and should only use those products provided by the district. "Foggers" or tank sprayers are not to be used in schools as they are potentially dangerous to the custodial staff and other occupants of the building. Staff are to be trained in the proper use of cleaning and disinfection products.

Diagnostic screening and testing	Wallingford Public Schools, in collaboration with the Wallingford Health Department, will provide families and staff with updated locations for testing within the community.
Efforts to provide vaccinations to educators, other staff, and students, if eligible	 Wallingford Public Schools, in collaboration with the Wallingford Health Department, will provide families and staff with updated locations for vaccinations within the community. Wallingford Public Schools did coordinate staff clinics and student clinics this year with the Wallingford Health Department and Hartford HealthCare.

- Wallingford Public Schools recognizes there are students who, due to compromising medical conditions, are not medically cleared to return to school in the fall. The District will follow current homebound/hospitalization guidelines in regard to instruction and the delivery of services. Such services are considered different then those provided in a Voluntary Distance learning setting. Parents of students in this situation should complete the appropriate Homebound paperwork and submit it to their child's school nurse and principal as soon as possible. The team will develop a plan for the implementation of services on an individual basis.

Academic Needs: Wallingford Public Schools recognizes students in all grade levels may have experienced an impact from the pandemic. Proactive measures to address learning loss were instituted in the spring of 2021. Supplementary after school services for students with special needs, english learners and secondary students at risk for credit loss were provided to students. Small group instruction was targeted to provide students the opportunity to accelerate their learning. The District will continue the after school services for students at-risk and those experiencing impact from the pandemic during the 2021-2022 school year. Specific populations receiving after school programming will include students with special needs, english learners and high school students at risk for credit loss.

In addition to after school support, the District recognizes instruction within the school day is a critical component to the provision of equitable educational opportunities. As such, Wallingford Public Schools will employ 19 instructional support positions to assist both students and staff with efforts to meet students' academic needs. Instructional Specialists will work with teachers at all levels to assist in identifying student needs through data analysis, creating a network of small group instructional opportunities for students, identify high impact instructional strategies to target learning loss and plan engaging opportunities for student mastery. Secondary Recovery teachers will focus on providing small group support to students identified through a variety of measures including but not limited to: the universal screening process, district created curriculum based assessments, Interim Assessment Blocks, and specific diagnostic and formative measures. The recovery teachers will work collaboratively with school personnel (Interventionists, EL/Bilingual, Special Education, and General Education teachers to target specific instruction in identified areas to accelerate students back to grade level standards.

Student/Staff Social Emotional and Mental Health Needs:

Wallingford Public schools recognizes the social and emotional needs of many students and staff have increased due to the pandemic. The District has proactively planned to address student and staff mental health in several ways. During the summer and fall of 2021, mental health professionals will provide at-risk students with counseling on a regular basis either virtually or in the school setting. The intent of the services is to prepare students to return to school, address any mental health needs heightened by the pandemic and to support a seamless transition in the school environment. Similarly, Wallingford Public Schools has planned to address staff mental health needs. In collaboration with a local community organization, the District will offer support groups, forums and individual counseling for staff members impacted by the pandemic. We have found many adults are struggling from pandemic fatigue in addition to other mental health effects.

Student Health and Food Services:

Wallingford Public Schools will continue to offer families and students meals (breakfast and lunch) during the month of July and August for community feeding. During the school year, all students will have access to lunch.

Wallingford Public Schools is dedicated to providing students and staff a safe and healthy learning environment. The District will adhere to CDC and CSDE guidelines as they pertain to recommended health and safety practices. As recommendations are revised the District will notify the community of pertinent changes.
