# AGREEMENT FOR BOND COUNSEL SERVICES (General Obligation Bonds)

THIS AGREEMENT ("Agreement") for bond counsel services is made and entered into this 20<sup>th</sup> day of May, 2014 by and between Kronick, Moskovitz, Tiedemann & Girard, a Professional Corporation (hereinafter "KMTG"), and the Colusa Unified School District (hereinafter "District"). KMTG and District are collectively referred to herein as the "Parties".

#### WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, District desires to take all actions necessary for the issuance and sale of general obligation bonds ("Bonds") for the purpose of financing the acquisition and construction of school facilities and various other capital improvement projects within the District's boundaries, and all in accordance with California law; and

WHEREAS, District desires to retain legal counsel to act as bond counsel ("Bond Counsel") to provide the legal services, specified herein, related to the authorization and issuance of the Bonds.

#### NOW THEREFORE, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Scope of Services</u>. District retains KMTG under this Agreement to provide Bond Counsel services pertaining to the authorization, issuance, and sale of the Bonds. In particular, KMTG shall:
- (a) Confer with District's representatives and other consultants (including but not limited to District's additional legal counsel, financing advisor(s), and underwriter(s) as necessary regarding the structure, authorization, issuance and sale of the Bonds; and any other related issues;
- (b) Prepare a calendar of events that sets forth the actions required for the authorization, sale and issuance of the Bonds;
- (c) Prepare or review any documents prepared by other parties in the proceedings for compliance with applicable law;
- (d) Prepare for and attend such meetings of District's governing board as deemed necessary for the proper conduct of the proceedings;
- (e) Prepare a paying agent agreement (or similar issuance document) and all other legal documents necessary for the authorization, issuance, and sale of the Bonds;
- (f) Assist the District in obtaining any necessary governmental approvals for the sale of the Bonds;
  - (g) Assist the District in securing investment ratings for the Bonds;

- (h) Prepare typewritten bonds;
- (i) Prepare the bond purchase contract pursuant to which the Bonds will be sold to the underwriter and the requisite continuing disclosure certificate of District in order to facilitate the underwriter's compliance with SEC Rule 15c2-12;
- (j) Prepare and deliver to each participant in the financing a complete transcript of the proceedings for the authorization, issuance, and sale of the bonds;
- (k) Prepare a comprehensive closing memorandum and prepare and arrange the execution and delivery of a receipt for the Bonds, a receipt for the proceeds of the Bonds, signature certificates, an arbitrage/rebate certificate and associated certificates of underwriter and insurer (if any), Form 8038-G, DTC Letter of Representations, CDIAC report of final sale, forms of opinions of other counsel, and all other necessary closing certificates and documents;
- (I) Upon due and proper completion of the proceedings to satisfaction of KMTG, deliver a final approving opinion confirming the validity of the Bonds and opinions that interest on the Bonds is excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes and is exempt from State of California personal income taxes, under existing statutes, regulations, rulings, and court decisions;
- (m) Assuming completion of the preliminary and final official statements in form acceptable to KMTG, deliver a letter addressed to District with respect to the Bonds to the effect that, in the course of KMTG's participation in the preparation of the official statement for the financing, nothing came to the attention of those attorneys rendering legal services to District that caused KMTG to believe that such official statements as of its date and as of the date of the letter (except for financial data or forecasts, estimates, assumptions, or expressions of opinion, or any information regarding The Depository Trust Company or any credit enhancer) contained any untrue statement of a material fact or omitted to state a material fact required to be stated therein or necessary to make the statement therein, in the light of the circumstances under which they were made, not misleading; and
  - (n) Any services incidental to the Bond Counsel services.
- 2. <u>Services Outside the Scope of this Agreement</u>. KMTG's duties in this Agreement are limited to those set forth in Paragraph 1. Among other things, KMTG has not undertaken to do any of the following under this Agreement:
- (a) Perform an independent investigation to determine the accuracy, completeness, or sufficiency of the official statement or other disclosure document;
- (b) Conduct any investigation regarding the qualification for sale of Bonds in any jurisdiction, provided that KMTG will coordinate with the underwriter regarding any statements requested to be added to the official statements so that the Bonds may be sold in particular jurisdictions;

- (c) Render services in connection with compliance by District after the closing with the covenants contained in the bond documents, including without limitation, the calculation of any arbitrage rebate liability District may have and preparation of any annual reports or material events notices required pursuant to District's continuing disclosure undertaking;
- (d) Render services in connection with the establishment of a citizens' oversight committee; or
  - (e) Render services with respect to any litigation concerning the financing of the Bonds.

If District requests KMTG to provide any such services, compensation therefore shall be agreed upon in advance by the Parties and may be made and calculated at KMTG's hourly rate schedule for the type of services requested (either public finance or litigation) in effect at the time such services are rendered.

- 3. <u>Commencement of Services</u>. KMTG's obligation to provide legal services under this Agreement shall commence upon KMTG's receipt of a copy of this Agreement signed and dated by District.
- 4. <u>Completion of Services</u>. KMTG's representation of District with respect to a series of Bonds will be concluded upon issuance of such series. Nevertheless, subsequent to issuance of a series of Bonds, KMTG will file the Internal Revenue Service Form 8038 G and will prepare and distribute to the participants in the transaction a transcript of the proceedings.

#### 5. Duties of KMTG and District.

- (a) Duties of KMTG. KMTG shall provide those legal services reasonably required to represent District in the matters described in Paragraph 1 of this Agreement. KMTG shall also take reasonable steps to keep District informed of significant developments and to respond to District's inquiries. While one attorney at KMTG may be primarily responsible for completing the work that is within the scope of this Agreement, that attorney may also delegate work to other attorneys, paralegals law clerks, and office personnel within KMTG when it is determined that such delegation is appropriate in representation of District's interests. If District so requests, District will be notified prior to any delegation and a decision will be made in consultation with District.
- (b) Duties of District. District shall timely communicate with KMTG; be truthful with KMTG in all communications; make all reasonable efforts to cooperate with KMTG (including making all reasonable efforts to timely provide any information that KMTG requests in order to carry out its duties under this Agreement); keep KMTG informed of developments pertaining to the Bonds; perform the obligations District has agreed to perform under this Agreement; and pay all monies due to KMTG in a timely manner.
- 6. <u>Disclaimer of Guarantee</u>. By signing this Agreement, District acknowledges that KMTG has made no promises or guarantees to District about the outcome of District's matter, and nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as such a promise or guarantee.

#### 7. Fees and Expenses.

- (a) <u>Bond Counsel</u>. KMTG's fees for Bond Counsel services described above in Paragraph 1 for the Bonds to be sold shall be in the amount of twenty-two thousand dollars (\$22,000.00). KMTG shall be entitled to be compensated for its expenses associated with the financing in an amount not to exceed six hundred dollars (\$600.00).
- (b) <u>Payment of Compensation</u>. The compensation provided for under subparagraph (a) shall be contingent upon the issuance and delivery of the Bonds, and shall be payable solely from the proceeds of Bonds issued and at the time of issuance of the Bonds.
- 8. <u>Legal Action Upon Default</u>. If District does not pay the balance when due or breaches any other terms of this Agreement, KMTG may commence any legal action for collection of the balance due. District and KMTG agree that all legal proceedings related to the subject matter of this Agreement shall be maintained in courts sitting within the State of California. District and KMTG agree that the jurisdiction and venue for such proceedings shall lie exclusively with such courts. Further, the prevailing party in any such dispute shall be entitled to reasonable costs, including attorneys' fees.
- 9. Arbitration of Fee Dispute. If a dispute arises between KMTG and District regarding KMTG's fees or costs under this Agreement and KMTG files suit in any court, or begins an arbitration proceeding other than through the State Bar or the local bar association within the jurisdiction of the District under Business and Professions Code Sections 6200-6206, District will have the right to stay that suit or arbitration proceeding by timely electing to arbitrate the dispute through the State Bar or a local bar association within the jurisdiction of the District under Business and Professions Code Sections 6200-6206, in which event KMTG must submit the matter to that arbitrator.
- 10. <u>Notices</u>. All notices, letters and other communications authorized or required by this Agreement shall be considered transmitted, served, and effective for all purposes on the date that they are reduced to writing, deposited in the United States first class mail, postage prepaid, and addressed as follows:

- 11. <u>District Files</u>. At District's request, upon the termination of services under this Agreement, KMTG will promptly release all of District's papers and property to District (subject to any applicable protective orders or non-disclosure agreements).
- 12. <u>Destruction of District File.</u> If District does not request the return of its papers and property upon the termination of services under this Agreement, KMTG will retain District's file for seven (7) years from the date of issuance of the most recently issued series of Bonds, after which time KMTG may have District's file destroyed. District acknowledges that it will not be notified prior to destruction of its papers and property, and consents to the same. The District must make separate arrangements with KMTG in order to have its file maintained beyond seven (7) years after District's matter is concluded.
- 13. <u>Termination</u>. This Agreement may be terminated by District or KMTG, or modified by mutual consent, at any time upon thirty (30) days written notice. If the District terminates this Agreement prior to the issuance of any series of Bonds, other than for reasonable cause, KMTG shall be compensated in accordance with Paragraph 7(c) above. KMTG and District each agree to sign any documents reasonably necessary to complete KMTG's discharge or withdrawal.
- 14. <u>Assignment</u>. This Agreement is not assignable by KMTG without the prior written consent of District.
- 15. <u>Modification by Subsequent Agreement</u>. This Agreement may be modified only by a written instrument signed by both Parties.

Re: Middle School Science Curriculum Progression of Courses Proposal

The following was released from the California Department of Education:

On September 4, 2013, the State Board of Education (SBE) adopted the *Next Generation Science Standards for California Public Schools, Kindergarten through Grade Twelve* (CA NGSS) as required by California *Education Code* 60605.85. The CA NGSS is based upon the nationally developed Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS).

The nationally developed NGSS presented middle grade standards in a grade span of sixth through eighth grade. However, California is a kindergarten through eighth grade instructional materials adoption state and requires that standards be placed at specific grade levels – sixth, seventh, and eighth. Therefore, the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SSPI) recommended the adoption of the placement of these original NGSS standards at each grade level.

At their November 2013 meeting, the SBE approved the Integrated Learning Progression model as the preferred model for the grade span of six through eight. At that same meeting the SBE approved a recommendation to reconvene the Science Expert Panel (SEP) in order "to develop ... as an alternative model ... a discipline specific model" for the grade span of six through eight. This model was to be based upon the guidance for developing a domain specific model as outlined by Achieve in the NGSS Appendix K.

The SBE's clear intent in their November action was for there to be one preferred Integrated Learning Progression CA NGSS model for grades six through eight and one Alternate Discipline Specific CA NGSS model for grades six through eight, as an alternate.

This course is aligned with the cognitive demands of the Common Core State Standards and contains the CA NGSS for grades six through eight organized into content-specific courses that match the three science domains of:

6th Grade- Earth and Space Science

7th Grade-Life Science

8th Grade- Physical Science and includes

6th – 8th grade- Engineering, Technology and Application of Science

In addition to the arrangement of the domain specific content, the SEP also considered what content, if any, from the other science domains would need to be introduced in order to facilitate student's full understanding of each performance expectation. Therefore, the Alternative Discipline Specific Course standards contain supplemental Disciplinary Core Ideas from other domains.

After collaborating as a science department, as well as discussing the two approaches with the science curriculum PLC, it is being requested that we follow the alternate progress for teaching the middle school science content. We are asking to follow this progression due to the formation/design of textbooks that we currently use, to keep the district aligned to current credentialing requirements without having to add additional staff or rearrange current staff to meet curriculum needs and lastly due to our physical classrooms not being properly equipped to meet safety and disposable needs of laboratory lessons that would be taught if we were to have chemistry and biology lessons at all three grade levels.

Thank you for listening to our opinion, while considering what option is best for Colusa Unified students.

STUDENT'S REPORT

BOARD OF TRUSTEE TIME

No announcements or comments were given.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

♦ Improving Achievement: Mr. Newman reported all instructional strategies were on track at the present time. He stated that since we will not have the State testing data this year, we'll have to use other measures to track student achievement.

LCAP Progress: Mr. Newman drew a schematic on the white board to show how the process works. "Values, Input, Action Steps, Input & Prioritization, Forward Thinking, Allocating based on priorities and Measuring Progress." The students are at the center of it all. He stated we have to have an LCAP that aligns with our budget by June, 2014. He reminded everyone that the whole process would be a learning process since the State is still calling the LCAP template a DRAFT.

Update on SELPA Plan Revision, Community Day School, Opportunity School: Mr. Newman met with CCOE Superintendent Kay Spurgeon last week. He said Ms. Spurgeon told him she has come up with a plan for the SELPA based on a funding formula. The districts in the county have not been happy with their lack of control over the SELPA funding. This way, based on a formula, districts will be able to plan based on A.D.A., the number of special ed. students we have, the LCFF funding and a weighted factor depending on enrollment. Ms. Spurgeon will be getting examples of this to Mr. Newman in the near future. He said the districts are looking at this idea to try and keep the SELPA governance here in Colusa.

Mr. Newman stated he has not done any work on the Community Day School since he drafted a plan that he sent to the other districts in the county. He is waiting on their input. Keeping the safety of other students in mind, he will look for locations for the Community School within our district boundaries.

District Homework Policy: Mr. Newman said he neglected to put DRAFT on the Homework Philosophy that was included in the Board Packet. He wants to discuss with the Board the philosophy behind a possible policy and then will have a discussion with the teachers in the district for their input before a homework policy is developed. A discussion was held with Mr. Forry stating he wanted the homework to be consistent and progressive throughout the grade levels. Mr. Bransford stated he thought the policy wording should be driven by the staff and principals, not the Board.

Progress of CASSPP Testing Progress: Mr. Newman reported the new testing process was going fine. Each principal reported testing was going well at their sites.

• Budget (standing item): Sheryl Bailey reported the annual P2 attendance report was way up at 1382, which is 8 more than we had in the budget. Sheryl said although this is good news, we won't know anything for sure until July when the State gives the final numbers. So far, everything looks good! Mr. Newman stated this year's ending balance will be \$1 million. He's projecting our revenues for next year will be \$12 million with projected expenditures being \$11.6 million. If we change nothing, our ending fund balance will jump to \$500,000. He talked about various ways to improve the district using this money. Mr. Forry asked him to keep in mind we were going to need new textbooks soon, which will be a very large expense.

- Enrollment: Our enrollment is up.
- Management: Darren Brown asked CAHS teacher Bobby Kirkman to give a report on the CAHS. Mr. Kirkman said this was his 4th year teaching at the CAHS and he is now the sole teacher there. The students currently go to school for 4 periods – 0 period through 3<sup>rd</sup> period. enrollment numbers have fluctuated the last few years in the 20's, and this year the enrollment is at a high of 32 students. He stated attendance is up 8% and he has focused on more accountability for the students. They operate in one classroom, which has a better environment and climate, and positive attitudes. He feels it's a very dynamic program this year and is very encouraged with the students' outlook. Mr. Kirkman stated there were 5 students who had achieved their goals and will be re-enrolling in Colusa High School. He had 5 students who were going to present their senior projects and hopefully graduate this year. There will be a few who will be 5<sup>th</sup> year seniors.

CEA REP'S REPORT

Pam Giuliano had nothing to report for CEA. She said their group was close to ratifying next month.

This shall serve as an agreement by and between Interquest Detection Canines® of North Valley Counties and the DISTRICT for substance awareness and detection services for the period of August 2014 through June 2015.

It is understood that the DISTRICT has established and communicated a policy clearly defining contraband as all drugs of abuse (in the broadest terms), alcoholic beverages, firearms and ammunition, prescription and over-the-counter medication, and that this policy has been disseminated to all campus locations. Violations are considered inimical to the welfare of students and contrary to the DISTRICT'S desire to foster an atmosphere conducive to safety and education.

INTERQUEST shall provide contraband inspection services utilizing non-aggressive contraband detection canines. Such inspections may be conducted on an unannounced basis under the auspices and direction of the DISTRICT administration with INTERQUEST acting as an agent of the DISTRICT while conducting such inspections. Communal areas, lockers, gym areas, parking lots (automobiles), grounds, and other select areas as directed by DISTRICT officials, shall be subject to inspection. Contraband detected on DISTRICT property is the responsibility of the DISTRICT. Suspected drugs of abuse may be field-tested to provide preliminary or presumptive identification of the drug.

INTERQUEST agrees to provide 6 \*\* visits for the contract period. The DISTRICT may increase the total number of visits by notifying INTERQUEST in writing. Each visit will be \$ 350/ visit. Multiple canine teams will be charged on a per team basis. DA required court testimony on behalf of the DISTRICT will be charged at the same rate. INTERQUEST will invoice for service on a monthly basis at the conclusion of the service month. The DISTRICT agrees to pay for services within thirty (30) days of receipt of such invoice.

INTERQUEST will schedule DISTRICT visits in conjunction with days designated by the DISTRICT as appropriate for visits. The District will provide a school calendar with inappropriate dates for service noted. This calendar will serve as an addendum to the Agreement. All other dates will be considered acceptable for visits. DISTRICT will be responsible for payment for any visit made on any day other than those days noted as unacceptable on the attached school calendar.

- 5. Funding for Kinder Camp is based on the number of children who preregister by the end of the scheduled preregistration dates.

### Implementation Plan

See attached individual Implementation Plan, Attachment 1.

- A. CONTRACTOR acknowledges that the COMMISSION is developing new structures to promote collaboration between different organizations serving children and families. CONTRACTOR will participate in the development of these collaborative structures and processes where appropriate.
- B. CONTRACTOR will participate in COMMISSION sponsored in-service training when requested by the COMMISSION.
- C. CONTRACTOR will include language in all brochures and promotional materials developed to describe and promote COMMISSION funded programs, services and projects that states "Funded by First 5 Colusa."

# EXHIBIT B COMPENSATION

A. Payment for services and/or reimbursement of costs shall be made as follows:

Cost-based reimbursement. The District/School will pay for all services and equipment as needed and will bill the commission for a cost-based reimbursement, not to exceed the following amount:

•	Total cost reimbursement for supplies for each Preregistered Student	\$6.00
4	Total cost reimbursement for each Certificated Teacher	\$350.00
0	Total cost reimbursement for each Assistant Position	\$100.00
•	Total cost reimbursement for Administration and Coordination	\$350.00

Invoices, as well as copies of all receipts and staff timesheets, shall be received at the COMMISSION office no later than sixty (60) days after close of program. If the invoice and other required financial documentation are received after sixty (60) days, a 10% funding penalty may be enforced.

Such payments are conditioned upon CONTRACTOR's satisfactory performance as determined by COMMISSION, based upon the statement of work described in Exhibit A and performance reports provided by CONTRACTOR as described in Exhibit C. Final payment shall not be made until all final reporting requirements have been met.

- D. COMMISSION'S failure to discover or object to any unsatisfactory work or billings prior to payment will not constitute a waiver of COMMISSION'S right to require CONTRACTOR to correct such work or billings or seek any other legal remedy.
- E. CONTRACTOR will submit an invoice to the COMMISSION for payment requested under this Agreement. CONTRACTOR invoice shall reference the contract name listed on the first page of this Agreement and will include a brief description of the services, activities, and completed Attachment 3, the time period to which the invoice pertains, the number of units of service delivered during the billing time period (if applicable), and the total dollar amount of payment requested. The COMMISSION will pay CONTRACTOR by the due date established in this Exhibit B or, if no due date is set, by no later than 30 days after approval of the invoice by COMMISSION staff.

# EXHIBIT C PERFORMANCE EVALUATION AND REPORTING

- A. CONTRACTOR will perform the following activities to collect, maintain and report data that enables the COMMISSION to determine the progress of work performed and community results achieved by the CONTRACTOR's activities:
- B. CONTRACTOR will submit timely program evaluation reports as outlined in Attachment 1, 2, and 3. If a report is not submitted on time, the COMMISSION, at its sole discretion, may withhold further payments to CONTRACTOR until the report is received by the COMMISSION and accepted by the COMMISSION as satisfactorily providing all of the information required on the COMMISSION's report format. The COMMISSION at its sole discretion may also impose a funding penalty of no more than 5% of the total grant amount for late reporting.
- C. CONTRACTOR acknowledges that the COMMISSION is subject to state-level reporting requirements, which may change in the future, and will fully cooperate with the COMMISSION as necessary to enable the COMMISSION to meet its requirements under law or as defined by written policies established by the California Children and Families Commission.

### EXHIBIT D INSURANCE

CONTRACTOR, at CONTRACTOR's own cost and expense unless otherwise provided for in this Agreement, shall procure and maintain, for the term of this Agreement, the following insurance policies with insurers possessing a Best's rating of no less than A:VII.

- A. Workers' Compensation Coverage. CONTRACTOR shall maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employee Liability Insurance for its employees in accordance with the laws of the State of California. In addition, CONTRACTOR shall require each subcontractor to similarly maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employee Liability Insurance in accordance with the laws of the State of California for all of the subcontractors' employees. Any notice of cancellation or non-renewal of Workers' Compensation policies must be received by the COMMISSION at least thirty (30) days prior to such change.
- B. General Liability Coverage. CONTRACTOR shall maintain commercial general liability insurance in an amount not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage. If a commercial general liability insurance form or other form with a general aggregate limit is used, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to the work to be performed under this Agreement or the general aggregate limit shall be at least twice the required occurrence limit.
- C. Automobile Liability Coverage. CONTRACTOR shall maintain automobile liability insurance covering bodily injury and property damage for all activities of CONTRACTOR arising out of or in connection with the work to be performed under this Agreement, including coverage for owned, hired, and non-owned vehicles, in an amount not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for each accident for bodily injury or property damage.
- D. Professional Liability Coverage. CONTRACTOR shall maintain professional errors and omissions liability for protection against claims alleging negligent acts, errors or omissions which may arise from CONTRACTOR's operations under this Agreement, whether such operations are by the CONTRACTOR or by its subcontractors. The amount of this insurance shall not be less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) on a claims-made annual aggregate basis, or a combined single-limit per occurrence basis. Said insurance shall remain in full force and effect for at least thirty-six (36) months following the month in which the term of this Agreement is completed.
- E. Policy Endorsements. Each general liability and automobile liability insurance policy shall be endorsed with the following specific provisions:
  - 1. The Colusa County Children and Families Commission, its appointed officers, directors, officials, employees, agents and volunteers are to be covered as insureds with respect to liability arising out of work performed by or on behalf of CONTRACTOR, including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations.
  - 2. Provide that CONTRACTOR's insurance shall be primary insurance as respect to COMMISSION, its appointed officers, officials, employees, agents and volunteers. Any insurance maintained by the COMMISSION, including any self-insured retention the

COMMISSION may have, shall not be called upon to contribute to a loss covered by CONTRACTOR's insurance.

- 3. This insurance shall act for each insured and additional insured as though a separate policy had been written for each, except with respect to the limits of liability of the insuring company.
- 4. The insurer waives all rights of subrogation against the COMMISSION, its appointed officers, officials, employees, agents, or volunteers.
- 5. Any failure to comply with the reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the COMMISSION, its appointed officers, officials, employees, agents, or volunteers.
- 6. The insurance provided by this policy shall not be suspended, voided, canceled, or reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days written notice has been received by the COMMISSION.
- 7. Include broad-form contractual liability coverage insuring CONTRACTOR's indemnity obligations under this Agreement.
- 8. Be issued on an "occurrence" basis or other basis determined by the COMMISSION's legal counsel to be substantially similar to an occurrence basis.
- 9. Be issued by insurers acceptable to the COMMISSION and licensed to transact business in California.
- 10. Provide that all liability limits shall be single limit coverages.
- 11. Provide products/completed operations coverage for three (3) years following completion of CONTRACTOR's work under this Agreement and acceptance by the COMMISSION.
- F. **Deductibles and Self-insured Retentions.** Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the COMMISSION before work is begun. At the COMMISSION's option, CONTRACTOR shall demonstrate financial capability for payment of such deductibles or self-insured retentions.
- G. **Proof of Coverage**. Prior to beginning work, CONTRACTOR shall furnish the COMMISSION with copies of its insurance policies and endorsements effecting coverage required by this Agreement. Issuing a notice to proceed shall not waive the COMMISSION's right to strictly enforce the insurance requirements of this Agreement.

# EXHIBIT E CONFIDENTIALITY REQUIREMENTS

CONTRACTOR and COMMISSION shall maintain the confidentiality of all records, including billings, claims, and any audio and/or video recordings, in accordance with all applicable State and Federal codes and regulations, as they now exist or may hereafter be amended or changed. Each party shall inform its officers, agents and employees of the requirements of this section and the special requirements as to particular classes of records.

- A. Contractor Obligations; Confidentiality of Records to Persons Provided Services. CONTRACTOR shall not disclose any information with regard to the identity of children or other persons receiving services pursuant to this Agreement, except as expressly requested and/or approved by the COMMISSION and as permitted by law. CONTRACTOR agrees to maintain the confidentiality of its records pursuant to all applicable provisions of law and implementing regulations promulgated thereunder relating to privacy and confidentiality, as each may now exist or be hereafter amended.
  - 1. All records and information concerning any and all persons referred to CONTRACTOR by COMMISSION or COMMISSION'S designee shall be considered and kept confidential by CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR'S staff, agents, employees and volunteers.
  - 2. CONTRACTOR shall require its employees, agents and volunteers to sign an agreement which certifies that they will keep the identities and any information with respect to any and all service recipients of CONTRACTOR related to services authorized under this Agreement confidential except as may be required to provide services under this Agreement to comply with any reporting and auditing requirements specified in this Agreement, and any other information required by COMMISSION in the administration of this Agreement, and as otherwise permitted by law.
  - 3. CONTRACTOR agrees that any and all approved subcontracts entered into shall be subject to the confidentiality requirements of this Agreement.
  - 4. CONTRACTOR shall inform all of its employees, agents, subcontractors, volunteers and partners of this provision that any person knowingly and intentionally violating the provisions of federal, state or local confidentiality laws may be guilty of a crime and/or subject to civil action.
- B. Commission Obligation. COMMISSION shall maintain the confidentiality of patient or service recipient records made available pursuant to this Agreement in accordance with all provisions of the law, and regulations promulgated thereunder relating to privacy and confidentiality, and the customary standards and practices of government third-party payors. CONTRACTOR acknowledges such confidentiality may be limited by public records and freedom of information laws.
- C. Authorized Data Sharing. The provisions of A and B are not applicable to authorized data sharing pursuant to COMMISSION funded projects or as permitted by law.

### AGREEMENT FOR PROPOSITION 10 STRATEGIC PLAN IMPLEMENTATION SERVICES

Burchfield Primary School Kinder Camp Fiscal Year 2014

THIS AGREEMENT (hereafter Agreement) is made by and between the First 5 Colusa County Children and Families Commission (hereafter COMMISSION) and Colusa Unified School District, having its principal place of business at 745 10th Street, Colusa 95932 (hereafter CONTRACTOR) wherein CONTRACTOR agrees to provide and COMMISSION agrees to accept the services specified herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED. CONTRACTOR agrees to provide services to the COMMISSION in accordance with Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.
- 2. TERM. CONTRACTOR shall commence performance on June 1, 2014 and end performance upon completion, but no later than August 31, 2014 unless otherwise directed by the COMMISSION or unless earlier terminated. CONTRACTOR shall not be responsible for delays caused by factors beyond its control provided that approval for any extended time of performance has first been approved in writing by the COMMISSION.
- 3. COMPENSATION OF CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR shall be paid for performance under this Agreement in accordance with the terms of Exhibit B attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.
- 4. STANDARDS OF PERFORMANCE. CONTRACTOR represents that it is professionally qualified and licensed to perform the work to be done as required in this Agreement. COMMISSION relies upon the representations of CONTRACTOR regarding professional training, licensing, and ability to perform the services as a material inducement to enter into this Agreement. Acceptance of work by the COMMISSION does not release CONTRACTOR from any responsibility to perform work to professional standards. CONTRACTOR shall provide properly skilled professional and technical personnel to perform all services under this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall perform all services required by this Agreement in a manner and according to the standards observed by a competent practitioner of the profession.
- 5. PERFORMANCE EVALUATION AND REPORTING. CONTRACTOR shall collect data on services rendered and results achieved, submit reports to the COMMISSION, and otherwise support the ability of the COMMISSION to evaluate the performance of CONTRACTOR under this Agreement in accordance with the terms of Exhibit C attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.
- 6. ASSURANCES BY CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with all provisions regarding supplanting of funds and nondiscrimination in accordance with the terms. Consistent with the intent of the California Children and Families Act of 1998, no monies provided by the COMMISSION may be used to supplant federal, state, county or other monies available to CONTRACTOR for any purpose. CONTRACTOR will not require participation in a religious faith

to be a prerequisite for individuals receiving services paid for under this Agreement. Outreach for services will be to the community at large.

- 7. OWNERSHIP OF MATERIALS. All plans, studies, documents, software, databases, and other writings and materials ("Materials") prepared by and for CONTRACTOR, its officers, employees and agents and subcontractors in the course of implementing this Agreement, except working notes, shall become the property of the COMMISSION, and the COMMISSION shall have the sole right to use such materials in its discretion. CONTRACTOR shall, at CONTRACTOR's expense, provide such Materials to the COMMISSION upon written request. All copyrights and other proprietary rights in such Materials shall belong exclusively to the COMMISSION unless otherwise agreed to in writing by the COMMISSION.
- 8. <u>INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR</u>. CONTRACTOR shall perform all of its services under this Agreement as an independent contractor and shall not act as an agent or employee of COMMISSION, and is not subject to the direction and control of the COMMISSION except as to the final result. CONTRACTOR shall obtain no rights to retirement benefits or other benefits which accrue to COMMISSION employees, and CONTRACTOR hereby expressly waives any claim it may have to such rights.
- 9. CONFLICT OF INTEREST. CONTRACTOR covenants that CONTRACTOR presently has no interest and shall not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of services required to be performed under this Agreement. CONTRACTOR further covenants that in the performance of this Agreement, no person having any such interest shall perform any services under this Agreement.
- damages or injuries caused, nor the costs or expense incurred by CONTRACTOR or its officers, employees and agents in the performance of any of CONTRACTOR's duties under this Agreement. CONTRACTOR agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the COMMISSION, its officers, agents, employees and volunteers from and against any and all claims, demands, actions, losses, damages, injuries, and liability, direct or indirect (including any and all costs and expenses in connection therein) arising out of the performance of this Agreement to the extent caused by the negligent acts, errors or omissions of CONTRACTOR, except for any such claim arising out of the gross negligence or willful misconduct of the COMMISSION, its officers, agents, employees and volunteers.
- 11. <u>INSURANCE</u>. CONTRACTOR agrees to procure and maintain insurance in accordance with the provisions of Exhibit D attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.
- 12. NON-APPROPRIATION. This Agreement is funded from revenue derived from a tax placed on the sale of tobacco products. COMMISSION reasonably believes that such tax revenue will be available to fully fund this Agreement for its term. In the event, however, no funds or insufficient funds are available for payments, then COMMISSION will immediately notify CONTRACTOR of such occurrence and the Agreement may be terminated by COMMISSION upon thirty (30) days notice. After this Agreement is terminated under these provisions, COMMISSION shall have no obligation to make further payments.

13. <u>TAXES</u>. The COMMISSION shall not be responsible for paying any taxes on CONTRACTOR's behalf, and should the COMMISSION be required to do so by state, federal, or local taxing agencies, CONTRACTOR agrees to promptly reimburse COMMISSION for the full value of such paid taxes plus interest and penalty, if any. These taxes shall include, but not be limited to, the following: FICA (Social Security), unemployment insurance contributions, income tax, disability insurance, and workers' compensation insurance.

### 14. BUSINESS RECORDS.

- A. Financial Records. CONTRACTOR shall maintain any and all ledgers, books of account, invoices, vouchers, canceled checks, and other records or documents evidencing or related to charges for services, or expenditures or disbursements charged to the COMMISSION for a minimum period of four (4) years, or any longer period required by law, following the termination of this Agreement. All accounting records shall be kept in accordance with generally accepted accounting practices.
- B. Client Records. CONTRACTOR shall prepare and maintain accurate and complete records of children/clients served or other services rendered, and dates and type of services provided, under the terms of this Agreement in a form acceptable to COMMISSION. CONTRACTOR shall maintain such records for a minimum period of four (4) years, or any longer period required by law, following the termination of this Agreement.
- C. Other Records. CONTRACTOR shall keep such other business records pursuant to this Agreement as would be kept by a reasonably prudent practitioner of CONTRACTOR's profession and shall maintain such records for a minimum period of four (4) years following the termination of this Agreement.
- D. Inspection of Records. Any records or documents required to be maintained pursuant to this Agreement shall be made available for inspection or audit, at any time during regular business hours, upon written request by the COMMISSION. Copies of such documents shall be provided to the COMMISSION for inspection at the COMMISSION's office when it is practical to do so. Otherwise, unless an alternative is mutually agreed upon, the records shall be available at the CONTRACTOR's address indicated for receipt of notices in this Agreement.
- E. Custody of Records. Where COMMISSION has reason to believe that such records or documents may be lost or discarded due to dissolution, disbandment or termination of CONTRACTOR's operations related to the services provided under this Agreement, COMMISSION may, by written request, require that custody of the records be given to the COMMISSION and that the records and documents be maintained by the COMMISSION at its offices. Access to such records and documents shall be granted to any party authorized by CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR's representatives, or CONTRACTOR's successor-in-interest.
- 15. **CONFIDENTIALITY**. CONTRACTOR agrees to maintain the confidentiality of all records, including children or other persons receiving services under this Agreement, in accordance with the provisions of Exhibit E attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

- 16. <u>LICENSES</u>. CONTRACTOR represents and warrants to the COMMISSION that it has all licenses, permits, qualifications, insurance, and approvals of whatsoever nature which are legally required of CONTRACTOR to perform the services under this Agreement. CONTRACTOR represents and warrants to COMMISSION that it shall, at its sole cost and expense, keep in effect or obtain at all times during the term of this Agreement any licenses, permits, qualifications, insurance, and approvals which are legally required of CONTRACTOR to perform the services under this Agreement.
- 17. ASSIGNMENT AND SUBCONTRACTING. The parties recognize that a substantial inducement to COMMISSION for entering into this Agreement is the professional reputation, experience and competence of CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR shall not assign any of its rights nor transfer any of its obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of COMMISSION and any attempt to so assign or so transfer without such consent shall be void and without legal effect and shall constitute grounds for termination. CONTRACTOR shall not subcontract any portion of the work to be performed under this Agreement without the written authorization of the COMMISSION. If COMMISSION consents to such subcontract, CONTRACTOR shall supervise and monitor all work performed by any and all sub-contractors, and shall be fully responsible to COMMISSION for all acts or omissions of the subcontractor(s). Nothing in this Agreement shall create any contractual relationship between COMMISSION and subcontractors nor shall it create any obligation on the part of the COMMISSION to pay or to see to the payment of any monies due to any such subcontractor other than as otherwise is required by law.

### 18. REVERSION OF ASSETS.

- A. Unencumbered or Unexpended Funds. Upon the termination or expiration of the term of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall transfer to COMMISSION any unexpended and unencumbered COMMISSION funds on hand at the time of such termination or expiration and any accounts receivable attributable to the use of subject funds.
- B. Real or Personal Property Assets. Any real property or moveable or immovable personal property under CONTRACTOR'S control or ownership that was acquired or improved in whole or in part with COMMISSION funds disbursed under this Agreement, the original cost therefor exceeded five thousand dollars (\$5000.00) shall either be, at the election of COMMISSION: (1) used by CONTRACTOR for the services described in Exhibit A for a period of five (5) years after termination or expiration of this Agreement, unless a longer period is specified in Exhibit A; or (2) disposed of and proceeds paid to COMMISSION in a manner that results in COMMISSION being reimbursed in the amount of the current fair market value (assuming depreciation in accordance with customary business practices) of the real or personal property less any portion of the current value attributable to CONTRACTOR'S out of pocket expenditures using non-commission funds for acquisition of, or improvement to, such real or personal property and less any direct and reasonable costs of disposition, including a reasonable and customary broker's fee incurred in listing and completion of sale of such asset.
  - 1) In furtherance of the foregoing, if COMMISSION selects continued use of the capital asset, then CONTRACTOR hereby agrees that it shall be subject to an ongoing operating and use covenant relating to the subject real or personal property. The foregoing covenant shall survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement

and shall be actionable at law or in equity by COMMISSION against CONTRACTOR and its successors in interest.

- 2) In the event COMMISSION selects disposition of the subject real or personal property, then CONTRACTOR shall exercise due diligence to dispose of such property in conformity with applicable laws and regulations and in accordance with customary business practices. The net proceeds of such disposition shall be disbursed directly to and be payable to COMMISSION upon the close of the applicable disposition transaction, such as close of escrow for the sale of real property, transfer of a motor vehicle "pink slip" in accordance with applicable California Vehicle Code requirements, or completion of sale of personal property by bill of sale in accordance with UCC requirements.
- 19. NON-EXCLUSIVE AGREEMENT. CONTRACTOR understands that this is not an exclusive Agreement and that COMMISSION shall have the right to negotiate with and enter into contracts with others providing the same or similar services as those provided by CONTRACTOR as the COMMISSION desires.

### 20. TERMINATION.

- A. By COMMISSION. COMMISSION may, by written notice to CONTRACTOR, terminate this Agreement in whole or in part at any time upon thirty (30) days written notice, whether for COMMISSION's convenience or because of the failure of CONTRACTOR to fulfill the obligations herein. Upon receipt of notice, CONTRACTOR shall immediately discontinue all services effected (unless the notice directs otherwise), and deliver to COMMISSION all data, estimates, graphs, summaries, reports, and all other records, documents or papers as may have been accumulated or produced by CONTRACTOR in performing this Agreement, whether completed or in process.
  - 1) For Convenience. COMMISSION may terminate this Agreement upon thirty (30) days written notice. Following notice of such termination, CONTRACTOR shall promptly cease work and notify the COMMISSION as to the status of its performance. Notwithstanding any other payment provision of this Agreement, COMMISSION shall pay CONTRACTOR for service performed to the date of termination to include a prorated amount of compensation due hereunder less payments, if any, previously made. In no event shall CONTRACTOR be paid an amount in excess of the full price under this Agreement nor for profit on unperformed portions of service. CONTRACTOR shall furnish to COMMISSION such financial information as in the judgment of the COMMISSION is necessary to determine the reasonable value of the services rendered by CONTRACTOR. In the event of a dispute as to the reasonable value of the services rendered by CONTRACTOR, the decision of COMMISSION shall be final. The foregoing is cumulative and shall not affect any right or remedy which COMMISSION may have in law or equity.
  - 2) Due to Default or Breach of Agreement. Upon default by the CONTRACTOR in the performance of this Agreement or materially breach any of its provisions, COMMISSION may, at the COMMISSION'S sole option, terminate this Agreement by written notice which shall be effective upon receipt by CONTRACTOR.

- 3) **Due to Non-Appropriation**. Termination may occur according to the provision of Paragraph 12 of this Agreement.
- B. By CONTRACTOR. Should COMMISSION fail to pay CONTRACTOR all or any part of the payment set forth in Exhibit B, CONTRACTOR may, at CONTRACTOR's option terminate this agreement if such failure is not remedied by COMMISSION within thirty (30) days of written notice to COMMISSION of such late payment.
- 21. <u>SECTION HEADINGS</u>. The headings of the sections of this Agreement shall be solely for convenience of reference and shall not affect the meaning, construction or effect hereof.
- 22. <u>SEVERABILITY</u>. If any one or more of the provisions contained herein shall for any reason be held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, then such provision or provisions shall be deemed severable from the remaining provisions hereof, and such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability shall not affect any other provision hereof, and this Agreement shall be construed as if such invalid, illegal or unenforceable provision had never been contained herein.
- 23. **REMEDIES NOT EXCLUSIVE.** No remedy herein conferred upon or reserved by COMMISSION is intended to be exclusive of any other remedy or remedies, and each and every such remedy, to the extent permitted by law, shall be cumulative and in addition to any other remedy given hereunder or now or hereafter existing at law or in equity or otherwise.
- 24. <u>WAIVER</u>. No failure on the part of either party to exercise any right or remedy hereunder shall operate as a waiver of any other right or remedy that the parties may have hereunder.
- 25. <u>SOLE RECOURSE</u>. CONTRACTOR'S sole remedy is against the COMMISSION and its Trust Funds and CONTRACTOR will not seek damages, specific performance, or other relief from Colusa County or its agencies or employees.
- 26. <u>TIME IS OF THE ESSENCE</u>. Time is of the essence in this Agreement and each covenant and term is a condition herein.
- 27. ENTIRE AGREEMENT AND AMENDMENT. In conjunction with the matters considered herein, this Agreement contains the entire understanding and agreement of the parties and there have been no promises, representations, agreements, warranties or undertakings by any of the parties, either oral or written, of any character or nature hereafter binding except as set forth herein. This Agreement may be altered, amended or modified only by an instrument in writing, executed by the parties to this Agreement and by no other means. Each party waives their future right to claim, contest or assert that this Agreement was modified, canceled, superseded, or changed by any oral agreements, course of conduct, waiver or estoppel.
- 28. <u>SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS.</u> All representations, covenants and warranties set forth in this Agreement, by or on behalf of, or for the benefit of any or all of the parties hereto, shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of such party, its successors and assigns.
- 29. **COMPLIANCE WITH LAW.** CONTRACTOR shall, at its sole cost and expense, comply with all County, State and Federal ordinances and statutes now in force or which may

hereafter be in force with regard to this Agreement. The judgment of any court of competent jurisdiction, or the admission of CONTRACTOR in any action or proceeding against CONTRACTOR, whether COMMISSION is a party thereto or not, that CONTRACTOR has violated any such ordinance or statute, shall be conclusive of that fact as between CONTRACTOR and COMMISSION.

- 30. <u>CALIFORNIA LAW.</u> This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. Any litigation regarding this Agreement or its contents shall be filed in Colusa County, if in state court, or in the federal district court nearest to Colusa County, if in federal court.
- 31. <u>AUTHORITY</u>. All parties to this Agreement warrant and represent that they have the power and authority to enter into this Agreement in the names, titles and capacities herein stated and on behalf of any entities, persons, or firms represented or purported to be represented by such entity (ies), person(s), or firm(s) and that all formal requirements necessary or required by any state and/or federal law in order to enter into this Agreement have been fully complied with. Furthermore, by entering into this Agreement, CONTRACTOR hereby warrants that it shall not have breached the terms or conditions of any other contract or agreement to which CONTRACTOR is obligated, which breach would have a material effect hereon.
- 32. <u>CONFLICTS IN INTERPRETATION.</u> In the event of conflict in interpretation by the parties of the provisions contained in the numbered sections of this Agreement and the provisions contained in the Exhibits, the provisions of the numbered sections of this Agreement shall prevail over those in Exhibits.
- 33. <u>DESIGNATED REPRESENTATIVE</u>. Ginger Harlow, Director, at phone number (530) 458-5555 is the representative of the COMMISSION and will administer this Agreement for and on behalf of COMMISSION. Dave Tarr, Burchfield Primary School Principal, at phone number 530.458.5853 is the authorized representative for CONTRACTOR. Changes in designated representatives shall be made only after advance written notice to the other party.
- 34. <u>NOTICES.</u> Any notice or consent required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be given to the respective parties in writing, by first class mail, postage prepaid, or otherwise delivered as follows:
