Description of Course:

Economics is the study of how our economy operates, and how difficult decisions are made with limited resources. The study of economics helps one to better comprehend costs, the type of economy we have, money, banking, international trade, and business. Students will assess the functions performed by the American and global economic systems (macroeconomics) and the foundations of the economic decision-making by the individual and businesses (microeconomics).

The goal of an Advance Placement Economics course is to provide students with learning experience similar to that obtained in a typical college/university introductory macroeconomics or microeconomics course. AP Economics is planned to prepare students to take the AP Exams in Macroeconomics and Microeconomics (2 separate exams) in the month of May of each year. Successful competition of these assessments may result in college/university credits or placements for the students.

AP Macroeconomics

Advanced Placement Macroeconomics lays out students with a thorough comprehension of economic principles that apply to an economic structure as a whole. The course places specific attention on the study of price-level determination and national income. The course also develops students' familiarity with economic performance measures, stabilization policies, international economics, economic growth, and the financial sector.

AP Microeconomics

Advanced Placement Microeconomics lays out students with a thorough comprehension of economic principles that apply to the roles of individual decision makers, both producers and consumers within an economic structure. The course places primary focus on the nature and functions of product markets and includes the study of factor market and of the task of government in advocating greater efficiency and equity in the economy.

Major Instructional Goals

Students will be able to:

- Describe what is known through economic systems to the economic challenges. Students will analyze the different aspects:
 - ✓ Basic Economic Concepts
 - ✓ Supply and Demand
 - ✓ Measurement of Economic Performance
 - ✓ National Income and Price Determination
 - ✓ The Financial Sector
 - ✓ Inflation, Unemployment, and Stabilization Policies
 - ✓ Economic Growth and Productivity
 - ✓ The Open Economy: International Trade and Finance
 - ✓ Behind the Demand Curve: Consumer Choice
 - ✓ Behind the Supply Curve: Profit, Production, and Costs
 - ✓ Market Structures: Perfect Competition and Monopoly
 - ✓ Market Structures: Imperfect Competition
 - ✓ Factor Markets
 - ✓ Market Failure and the Role of Government.

AP Economic Goals:

Students will achieve mastery of at least 60% of standards on all quizzes, tests, and finals. Students will complete 100% of their classwork/homework. Students will be confident speakers, good listeners, conscientious citizens, and supportive classmates.

General Rules

Chino Hills High School students will follow the school-wide rules and classroom rules

Entering The Class Procedure

Warm-ups: Each day, Mr. Suh will have an introduction on the board. You are to do these warm-ups independently in your composition notebook without talking or getting up from your seat. Raise your hand if you need assistance. Please do not walk up to the teacher's desk without permission.
