You will receive 100 for a homework grade for bringing all of these items in! Be prepared every day for class, being unprepared will seriously affect your grade.

Expectations:

- 1. Be **Respectful** of **all** adults and peers.
- 2. Be **Prepared** and **on time**.
- 3. Electronic Devices are **Not Allowed** to be out during class.
- 4. Keep hands, feet and objects to yourself.
- 5. **Raise** your **hand** and **wait** for **permission** to speak, **do NOT** speak while others are speaking.
- 6. Be in dress code at all times.
- 7. Complete the Classroom Routine immediately upon entering the classroom.

Negative Consequences: (If you CHOOSE to break a rule)

First time. Verbal Warning.

Second time. Detention/Student-Teacher Conference with signed behavior contract.

Third Time. Detention/Call home.

Fourth Time. Written Referral to the Office.

Fifth Time. Parent-Teacher-Administrator Conference.

Severe Disruption. Student sent immediately to the office, phone call home, written referral and a parent –teacher-administrator conference.

Consequences for having an Electronic Device:

- 1. First offense. Verbal warning
- 2. Second offense. Confiscation (you may pick it up at the end of the period)
- 3. Third offense. Confiscation and Detention (device sent down to the office for a parent/guardian to pick up)

Charging of devices are NOT ALLOWED without permission, do not come in and plug your phone or I will confiscate it

Dress Code: You must be in dress code at all times. This is a Board of Education Policy that all teachers/administrators and adults are obligated to uphold.

Consequences for being out of dress code:

- 1. First Offense. Written referral to the office, phone call home
- 2. Second and Third Offenses. Written referral to the office, phone call home, Detention ***Being out of dress code is considered a disruption to learning and therefore, points will also be taken off of your grade for every day you are out of dress code***

Positive Consequences: (If you CHOOSE to follow the rules)

Verbal Praise (everyday)

Paws (two every week)

Pens/Pencils/ Stickers (random)

Positive Phone Calls Home (four every week)

Positive Notes Home (four every week)

Classroom Routine:

- 1. Sit in your assigned seat without speaking.
- 2. Take out your notebook, pen, folder, syllabus and any homework from the night before, which you will place on the right corner of your desk for collection.
- 3. Begin Do Now Assignment (you have five minutes to complete this assignment).
- 4. When finished with Do Now Assignment, read Daily Agenda and Objectives silently and wait for teacher direction.

Attendance/Make-Up work: In the event that you are sick, you will be required to make up your work within one week. I am not here to remind you of missed work. You are to check with another student about your missed work and make it up. If you have checked with another student and still have questions, you may ask me. It is your responsibility to make up work

when you are absent. DO NOT wait until the end of the marking period to make up your work, I will not accept it then, it will be too late. I am going to ask that you make a dedicated effort to be in this class every day, since part of your grade is attendance. 20 absences from class will earn you an 'incomplete' for the year.

Tardiness Tardiness is not acceptable without a pass. If you arrive tardy without a pass you can only receive an '80' for your daily 'Disposition to Learning' grade. If you arrive more than five minutes tardy to class without a pass you can only receive a '50' for your daily 'Disposition to Learning' grade. If you accumulate three tardies you will receive a detention. **Not being tardy is defined as being in your seat when the bell rings.**

Latex and Nut-Free Zone: There are students and adults in this building with SEVERE allergies. It is our responsibility to ensure that these people are safe to come to school. Food and Drink are NOT ALLOWED in class. Latex balloons, sunflower seeds, peanut butter products, products with soy are prohibited in the building. Do not put someone's life in jeopardy! Cheating/Plagiarism: Cheating will not be tolerated. If there is a test being administered and I catch you cheating, you will receive a zero. Please be respectful of other students taking a test. Plagiarism is not tolerated. It is unfair to authors and it is unfair to you. All papers will be checked for plagiarism when they are graded, it is advisable to not do it, as I am extremely adept at finding it. Please cite your sources properly to avoid this. If I find that you have plagiarized in any way, you will receive a zero on the assignment, with no option to redo the assignment.

Passes: Passes will not be given unless it is an emergency. If it is not an emergency, my answer is NO. As a general rule, I do not give out passes because I prefer to have you here with me in the room, learning.

Work Ethic: We will work every day until the bell rings. Please do not pack up your things or leave until I dismiss you. **I end the class, not the bell.**

Homework: You are required to complete your homework on the night it was assigned. As a responsible student, you will do so. If you are absent, you are to check with another student as to what the assignment was and then complete the missed assignment within the week.
