## **Analysis Questions**

You do not need to write out responses to these questions, but they are good questions to consider as you think about the story you chose to read for Week 5.

1. Explain the title. In what way is it suitable to the story?
2. Who is the main character, and what sorts of conflicts confront this character?
3. What type of narration is used (first person, third person limited, third person omniscient) and why did the author choose that point of view to tell the story?
4. What happens during the rising action, climax, and falling action of the story? How is the story's resolution?
5. Does the story create a special mood?
6. Are the incidents in the plot presented in flashback or chronological order?
7. Is there a villain in the story? A hero? What makes that character a villain or a hero?
8. What is the story's theme or message about life? Do you agree or disagree with this theme and why?
9. What aspects of the story do you find particularly important or memorable and why?
