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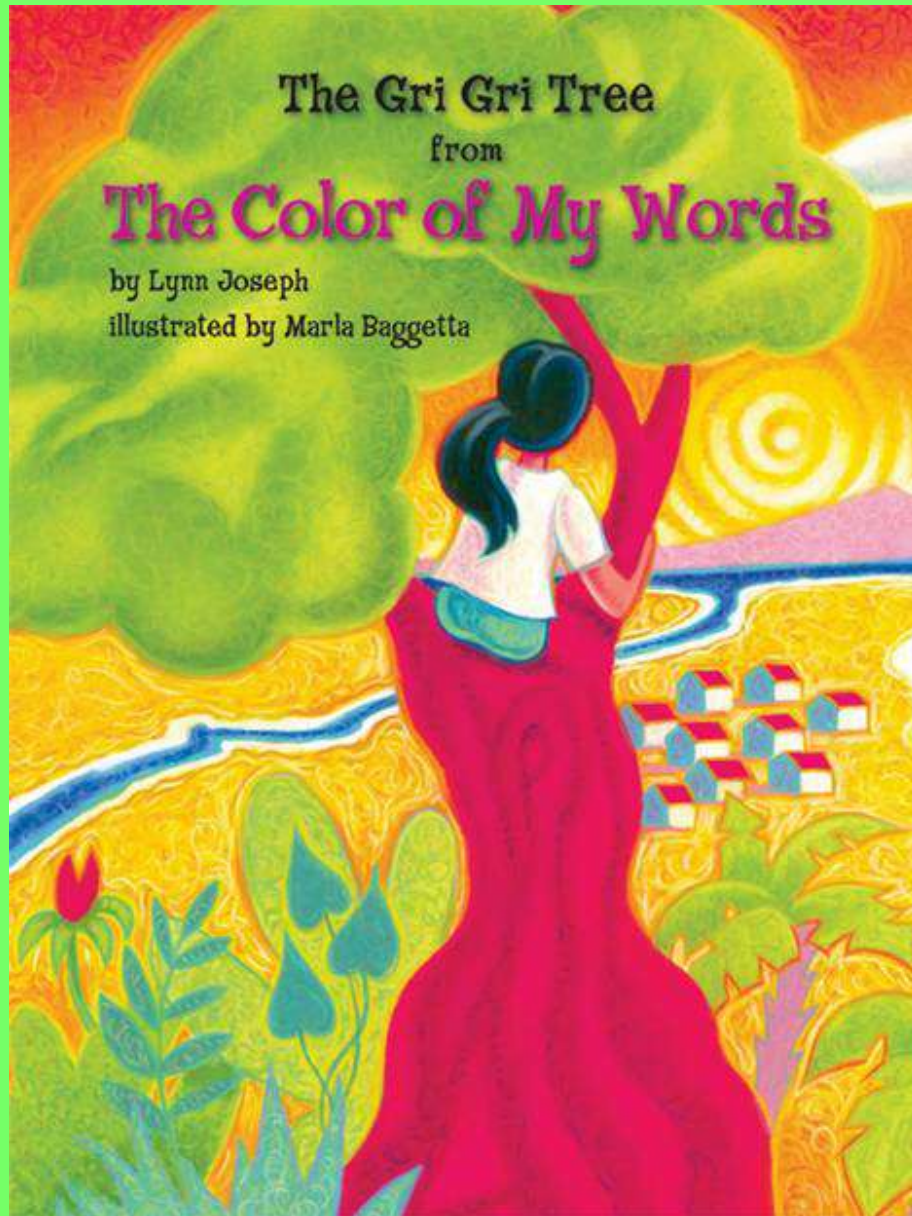

In English, we use **to wave over** to describe a way we get someone's attention and invite them to join us. *To wave over* means “to call attention and invite by moving the hand, or to signal with the hand.”

In English, we use **almost**
never to describe things that don't happen very often.
Almost never means “seldom, rarely, happening infrequently.”

one of a kind

In English, we use **one of a kind** to describe an item that is different from all others. *One of a kind* means “unique, original, different.”
