Principal's Letter

Dear Parents,

I hope this letter finds you all well. At this time last year I was thanking you for your flexibility in remaining positive throughout our many snow disruptions. This year winter survival has been a pleasure.

March madness, and I don't mean basketball, is once again upon us. On March 6, 7, 8,12,13,14,15,16, and 19 all sophomores will be taking the Connecticut Academic Performance Test (CAPT) as required by No Child Left Behind. CAPT scores are part of Daniel Hand High School's graduation requirements (see the Program of Studies) and are also used as a measure for the high school program overall. Please insure that your child has had a good night's sleep and breakfast before taking this very important test. On March 14, 15, and 16 freshmen, juniors, and seniors will be taking trimester exams while the sophomores are taking CAPT. On those three days both CAPT testing and trimester exams will begin promptly at 7:45 a.m. Trimester exams end at 12:15; however, CAPT testing will end at 9:15 a.m. on Wednesday and Thursday and at 8:45 a.m. on Friday. The exam bus schedule allows for only one pick up and that is at 12:15 p.m. Sophomores may certainly remain in the school dining hall and wait for the bus. However, they are officially dismissed from school at the completion of their CAPT exam, so you may pick up your child following the exam.

Scheduling for next year is in progress. Over the next couple of weeks you will be receiving a mailing with your child's course requests for the 2012-2013 school year. The appropriate placement in selected courses is very important. Teachers have made recommendations that are in the best interest of your child, taking into consideration an academic review of their abilities. Should you have any questions, please contact the referring teacher and/or school counselor. Once schedules have been put in place, it is difficult to make changes.

I am saddened at the pressure I see building and over which I have no real control. What we need to keep in mind is what is of most importance. That, I would suggest, is a strong, supportive, and loving relationship with your child. Listen to them, do something unassuming with them like going for a walk, hug them often, and remember that their relationship with you is a most precious gift.

Spring is right around the corner. I hope to see you all on the athletic fields, in the seats being amazed by the musical *Legally Blonde*, in the audience at the spring concerts, and on the town green recognizing our graduating seniors! As always, we thank you for your ongoing support.

Each year the DHHS Art Department enters students into a state-wide art competition sponsored by the CT Art Education Association, which is the professional art educators' organization. The competition is called the CT Scholastic Art Awards Program which is an affiliate of The Alliance for Young Artists & Writers. Student artwork is juried by professional artists and university professors and is selected on merit for inclusion in a state-wide art exhibition held at the University of Hartford Art School. Teachers are allowed to choose four works of art by their students to enter into the competition. Beyond the honor of being selected for this high quality exhibit, students may be awarded gold or silver keys and honorable mention places in each of 17 media categories. Winners of gold keys will have a digital image of their work submitted to the National Level Scholastic Art Awards for jury at the end of the exhibit. A national jury will determine works to be exhibited in the national exhibit which will be held in June, 2012, in Washington, DC. The selected works were on display at the Silpe Gallery, Hartford Art School from mid January until the beginning of February.

Reminders for the New Year

- ✓ Students requesting an early dismissal from school must bring a note from home stating the reason for leaving school early. Notes should be presented to the attendance secretary upon arrival at school. At that time the student will be issued an early dismissal slip, which must be signed by teachers and returned to the attendance secretary before leaving school. Parents are asked to call the attendance secretary at 203 245-6355 in the morning of the dismissal to confirm the note. Parents are also urged to request an early dismissal only in cases of pressing family business. Seniors only have the privilege of leaving school early after their last class of the day. Trimester early dismissal forms for seniors are available in the Main Office and must be signed by a parent and approved by a school administrator each trimester. For trimester 3 juniors who meet the criteria in the DHHS Student Handbook can also apply for a daily early dismissal.
- √ First period classes begin at 7:25 a.m. followed by period 2 attendance at 8:29 a.m. Juniors and seniors, who do not have scheduled first time block classes and who have their own transportation, must be in school by 8:15 a.m. Please help us by being certain that students are on time.
- $\sqrt{}$ Parents of **students who are absent** are required to call the school at 203 245-6355 between 7:00 and 10:00 a.m. each day the student is absent. This procedure also applies to students who will be tardy to school or who require an early dismissal.
- $\sqrt{}$ Students who are **tardy to school** must arrive at school prior to 9:00 a.m. All excused tardies must be for a valid reason and must be verified by a parent. Oversleeping is not considered a valid reason for tardiness. To be eligible to participate in an athletic or other after school activity, a student must be present for a minimum of four hours.
