WAMS will hold its first ever Color Run on May 21, 2016, 11:00 am at Wilby High School. The color walk/run features a designated 5k course. There is no time limit; however, all racers must be present at the race start time to participate in the run. After the race, there will be food trucks set up offering food and beverage options for purchase.

Donors should try to eat healthy, iron-rich meals and drink plenty of fluids such as water for two days prior to making their donation. Caffeinated beverages such as coffee and tea should be avoided. In addition, they should get at least eight hours of sleep the night prior to donating. When arriving to the school to donate please wear appropriate clothing that allows easy access to the upper arm.

WAMS NEASC CORNER

You can stay updated with all things NEASC here at the NEASC Corner in the WAMS Newsletter!

During the 3rd and 4th marking periods, students at WAMS will be using the new WAMS school-wide assessment rubrics representing our new 21st century learning expectations. Students will be assessed as effective readers, effective writers, creative problem solvers, self-directed learners, collaborative workers, and effective communicators. Teachers will report scores directly to students using Progressbook on a scale of 1-4. Look for an assignment title matching our learning expectations: effective reader rubric, effective writer rubric, etc. A score of 4= Exemplary, 3= Proficient, 2= Developing, and 1= Beginner. The rubric score will not affect the students' grade point average for that class. The rubric scores are an indication of each student's progress towards the learning expectations. During the end of the 4th marking period, students will complete a self-assessment based on their participation in school/community based events. The data collected will be reported to our school community right here in the WAMS NEASC CORNER of our newsletter. The data will also help us to make the best decisions regarding what is best for policy, student learning, and performance here at WAMS.


