May 10, 1933



Public burnings of "un-German" books occur across Germany. Photograph taken on May 10, 1933.

Additional Information:

Books written by Jews, communists, socialists, and anyone else whose beliefs seemed to contradict those of the Nazi party, were burned by members of the SA (Storm Troopers or Brownshirts) and university students across Germany.

August 1, 1936



Germany hosts the 1936 Olympic Games in Berlin in August, 1936.

Additional Information:

The Olympic torchbearer runs past the Brandenburg Gates, festooned with Nazi banners, on his way to the stadium.

November 10, 1938



Jewish businesses and synagogues are destroyed in the November Pogroms, a government-ordered riot later known as *Kristallnacht* (Night of Broken Glass) on November 9–10, 1938.

Additional Information:

Kristallnacht is considered by many historians to have been the turning point in the Nazis' treatment of Jews. Afterwards, for the first time, 30,000 Jewish men and teenage boys were sent to concentration camps solely because of their religion.

1945




As World War II ends, concentration camps are liberated by Allied and Soviet forces.

Additional Information:

The camps were liberated by Allied and Soviet troops who had no idea what they would be finding. Most survivors went on to live at transit camps for months or years, since they had nowhere else to go. In this picture taken by soldiers who liberated Buchenwald, a young Elie Wiesel is visible on the far side of the right-hand center bunk, just next to the post.






