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PHS Spring Sports Competing Well

With a long Spring Break jutting into the middle of the PHS spring sports' season, it's a good time to evaluate how the program is doing so far. Some fine performances are leading into what should be an exciting early May as the six programs vie for CIF playoff spots.

Pirate Track and Field and Swimming programs both offer rewards for team and individual excellence. As of this writing, the Track and Field program is poised to (once again) sweep to league championships on both varsity levels. A satisfying sweep of Gahr on April 8 solidified the Pirates' hold on first place and set the stage for a final home dual meet against Lynwood and the league prelims and finals here at PHS in early May. Paramount Aquatics are also on the cusp of CIF individual competition in Long Beach next month while the Pirate boys await the BIG meet against Warren in late April that will all but decide the league championship.

The boys' tennis program will give Coach Curtis Mu a sweep of both the girls (fall 2008) and boys' SGVL titles. With two solid victories over defending league champ Gahr, the Pirate boys are in position to go undefeated in league play and earn a home match in the first round of the CIF playoffs next month. The two championships will be a major "feather in the cap" for Coach Mu and show that Pirate tennis is back to the high level of play and expectations it enjoyed for years under former Paramount AD Paul Castillo.

Pirate boys' volleyball is in great shape to compete for a playoff spot this spring after sweeping Gahr on April 9. While big matches against Lynwood, Downey, and Warren loom, the experienced Pirates are a becoming a challenge to all the teams they play against and could enjoy a breakthrough season if they get into the playoffs.

Lady Pirate softball took a big step toward qualifying for the playoffs by knocking off Warren on April 9, 1-0. The Varsity just missed defeating Downey in the 1st round of league play, and a big game at Gahr on April 23 will be a huge indicator of any momentum the ladies have that could carry them on into the second round. The still-young team is getting great pitching and is showing that experience gained last year is beginning to pay off.

Finally, Pirate baseball enjoyed a fine Anaheim Lions tournament over Spring Break, winning 4 of 5 games and getting some momentum after disappointing losses to Gahr and Downey in early April. The Pirates will be in the thick of the race for the top three spots with the Gladiators and Vikings - after pairs against Warren and Dominguez, the big Gahr week will be May 5 and May 8. Those games will decide much about the SGVL race and Paramount's place in it.

Good luck to the Paramount spring teams as they head down the home stretch for the May playoffs!

Miss Quintero and Mrs. Ontiveros shared addition and subtraction games using dice, dominoes, math mats, and toothpicks. Students and parents were eager to finish up, head for home and work on their own.

First grade families worked with Mrs. Diaz discovering activities that supported the concepts of telling time, counting money and delving deeper into concepts of addition.

Mrs. Manglicmot, Mrs. Clark and Mrs. Chavarria stressed the importance of mastering basic math facts by sharing flashcards, creating multiplication spinners, and foldables for student use at home.

A roll of the dice and a quick deal of the cards provided by Mrs. Black and Miss Baltazar gave fourth and fifth graders an opportunity to apply critical thinking skills to place value and other concepts of number sense. Parents and students enjoyed their time and left with several ideas and games to support math learning in the time away from school.

Throughout the school year parents have attended grade level meetings on a weekly basis and their involvement has had a positive impact on student performance in reading and mathematics.

Alondra School Reopens Wax Museum








Wax Museum presentation opened again on Open House evening, Thursday, April 2, with a larger cast and more spectacular costumes than ever before. Equally impressive were the performances by the students. Not one of the nearly forty actors needed to take along note cards to help them remember the lines to their presentations which lasted from two to four minutes in length. Wax Museum is

a dramatic performance where students dressed in historical costumes "come to life" when tapped on the shoulder. They then present information on a character of their choice with drama and flair using props and costuming for added effect. The timeline of history includes the periods studied from the sixth, seventh and eighth grade curriculums, which ranges from pre-historic times to the very early 1900's. Egyptian, ancient



Hypatia, a famous mathematician. From the seventh grade curriculum, students portrayed many characters from Medieval and Renaissance times. Sydney Roumeliotis portrayed Catherine de Medici. From the eighth grade US History curriculum two students chose to portray characters indirectly linked to our own Paramount Unified School District. PARENT INVOLVEMENT MAKES A DIFFERENCE

Parent involvement is typically cited by educational researchers as one of the most influential factors affecting student achievement. Students whose parents take an active role in their education have higher achievement levels than their peers whose parents are not involved. And, the earlier in a child's educational process that the parent involvement begins, the more powerful is the effect. According to research sponsored by the National Parent Teacher Association (PTA), when parents are involved, their students have:

- Higher grades, test scores and graduation rates
 - Better school attendance
- Increased motivation, better self-esteem

- Lower suspension rates
- Decreased use of drugs and alcoholFewer incidents of violent behavior
- Joyce Epstein, of Johns Hopkins University, has created a framework that defines six different types of parent involvement:
- 1. PARENTING: Parenting skills are promoted and supported through parent education.
- 2. COMMUNICATING: Meaningful, two-way communication between home and school.
- 3. VOLUNTEERING: Parents as school and classroom volunteers.
- 4. LEARNING AT HOME: Parents play an integral role.
 - 5. DECISION MAKING: Parents

actively involved in decisions made by PTA, School Site Council (SSC), English Learner Advisory Council (ELAC), Gifted and Talented Education (GATE), and other groups

6. COLLABORATING WITH COMMUNITY: Community resources used to strengthen schools, families and student learning.

In Paramount Unified School District, parents have the opportunity to participate in decision making at both the school and District level. Parent committees at the schools (SSC, ELAC, and GATE) meet regularly to discuss issues related to their students' education. Representatives from those committees also meet regularly at the District Office

with representatives from other schools to discuss issues on a District wide level. Those committees include District Advisory Council (DAC), District English Learner Advisory Council (DELAC), and Gifted and Talented Education. Please speak to your school administration for information on parent committees and meeting schedules.

According to Joyce Epstein, "There are many reasons for developing school, family and community partnerships. The main reason to create such partnerships is to help all youngsters succeed in school and later life."
