

Language Arts

- The four areas of language arts are listening, speaking, reading, and writing. Our language arts program is a balanced approach that provides students with opportunities to engage in shared, independent, and guided reading. The text will support learning of our science, math, and social studies theme as well as the Common Core emphasis on Informational genres and presenting text evidence to support answers. Students are encouraged to "read like a detective and write like a reporter."
- Solana Vista third grade teachers are using a series entitled <u>Treasures</u> published by Macmillan/McGraw-Hill. The literature is organized around six themes common to all grades. These themes address the intellectual and social demands students will face in school and the workplace. Students will write independently during Writer's Workshop. The workshop involves teacher directed mini lessons as well as conferring with each other, and teacher-student conferences. The majority of the morning will be devoted to language arts. However, students will have many opportunities to develop language skills throughout the day, as language arts will be integrated into all areas of the curriculum. Book Clubs, Readers Theater, etc. will also be utilized.
- We will have a very strong focus on the Common Core standards include critical thinking, creativity, communication, and collaboration.



Mathematics

- We will be using the district program Eureka Math along with many other resources such Marilyn Burns, Marcy Cook, Cathy Fosnot, and most recently John Van de Walle. These programs were chosen because they support the Common Core approach.
- We will be strongly focusing on the new Common Core standards, especially emphasizing multiplication and division and fractions. Please look for "word problems" in real life. Common Core utilizes the application of strategies in the real world. Math facts fluency, (especially multiplication facts) is an important part of third grade math mastery. There are many ways to practice these facts, such as the App Flash to Pass, flashcards, daily oral quizzing in the car, etc.
