The summer assignment is a requirement of AP World History and is designed to build your fundamental knowledge of World History, laying the foundation for the first unit and subsequent material covered during the course of the year. **Students who do not complete a summer assignment will not be permitted to stay in the course.**

- 2. Vocabulary
 - Use the internet to define the word commonly used in AP World History.




AP Regions Map
