Election sequencing must match current Board election cycles, with three in 2020 and two in 2022.




Heavily Latino Neighborhoods

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Latino eligible voters are particularly concentrated between Hwy 50 and the railroad, and then up to Lighthouse Dr.

To comply with the Federal Voting Rights Act requirements for districts, these neighborhoods must not be divided in a way that dilutes their voting strength.







Heavily Asian-American Neighborhoods

Asian-Americans are particularly concentrated in the east above Linden Rd and in the southwest below Marshall Rd.

To comply with the Federal Voting Rights Act requirements for districts, these neighborhoods must not be divided in a way that dilutes their voting strength.





- Population-balanced.
- Focuses on compactness and following the railroad, major roads and canals as borders.
- All attendance zones except Stonegate have at least two trustees.
- Area 4 is 25% Asian-American by CVAP.*
- Areas 2 and 1 are 37% and 21% Latino by CVAP.*


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- Population-balanced.
- Unites the more rural western areas, then focuses on roughly following attendance zones (to the limits allowed by Census Blocks and neighborhoods):
- Elkhorn Village and most of Riverbank in 1;
- Most of Westfield in 2;
- Most of Westmore Oaks and SW Bridgeway in 3;
- Most of Southport in 4;
- Stonegate in 5.
- Area 4 is 23% Asian-American by CVAP.*
- Areas 1 and 2 are 30% and 28% Latino.*

- All attendance zones except Elkhorn village and Stonegate have at least two trustees.
- Area 4 is 21% Asian-American by CVAP.*
- Areas 1 and 2 are 27/28%
 Latino by CVAP.*
