RULES AT GHS FOOTBALL GAMES

GPS distributed the following reminders to parents and guardians about home games at Griswold High School:

Friday night football & cheer games at Griswold High School are fun and exciting times for our entire community. In the best interest of all of our Griswold students and their safety, it is important that all adhere to the following pieces of important information.

- Please remember that all adults and students are required to pay admission upon entry to the game (\$5.00). All spectators will receive a stamp indicating payment.
- GHS administration and event security reserve the right to remove or refuse entry to any spectator who is in violation of Griswold High School rules and policies.
- Students and spectators are to stay off the hills surrounding the field and the woods. These areas will be blocked off by fencing. This is for safety purposes, and also to allow for people to use the concession stand freely.
- No one should go under the bleachers at any time.
- No students are to enter any building on campus.
- Throwing footballs, chasing one another, wrestling, and rolling down the hills is not permitted at any time.
- Griswold High School is not responsible for lost or stolen items.
- Please remember that all school rules apply to sporting events.
- **Students in grades K-7 should be accompanied by an adult at all times during the game.**
- If an incident or emergency occurs, a school administrator or security staff must be notified at the game immediately.

COLLEGE ESPORTS RECRUITER VISITS GHS

Attention all gamers and families! Every thought about going to college on an esports scholarship? A college esports recruiter will be at GHS on Monday, October 3 at 2:45pm in the Auditorium to discuss college and esports scholarship opportunities. This presentation is open to all interested students and families.



COLLEGE AND CAREER FAIR

Griswold High School is hosting its annual College and Career Fair Tuesday, October 4 from 1:30-3:00 p.m. in the courtyards in front of GHS (rain location is the café & gym). During school hours, juniors and seniors will be called down to explore the fair.



PSAT TESTING

On Wednesday, October 12, all 9th, 10th & 11th grade students will take the PSAT. This will be a half-day for students with dismissal at noon.

PSATs are not only excellent practice for the SAT, but also connect students to scholarships, including the National Merit Scholarship Program. If your child opts into our free Student Search Service, scholarship providers will invite them to apply. It also provides insight into a SAT study plan or which Advanced Placement Program (AP) courses your child may be ready for.

This is a "Post-Secondary Planning Day" for seniors. Seniors are not expected in school, and are encouraged to optimize the day to make college visits, perform job shadows, or work on college applications, essays, and requesting letters of recommendation.

AWARDS & HONORS

Celebrating Achievement & Success

Congratulations to 5 of our Griswold Wolverines who earned academic honors from the College Board's National Recognition Programs!

- Aislinn Green: National Rural and Small Town Award
- Amanda Wrobel: National Rural and Small Town Award
- Emma Retan: National Rural and Small Town Award, National Indigenous Award
- Kuranda Ruggiero: National Rural and Small Town Award
- Maya Perea: National Hispanic Recognition Award

Each of these students earned this recognition by excelling on their PSAT/NMSQT, PSAT 10, or AP Exams and in their classrooms. Students who may be eligible have a GPA of 3.5 or higher and have excelled on the PSAT/NMSQT or PSAT 10, or earned a score of 3 or higher on two or more AP Exams; attend school in a rural area or small town, and/or are African American or Black, Hispanic American or Latinx, or Indigenous. Eligible students are invited to apply during their sophomore or junior year, and are awarded at the beginning of the next school year. Our five students were just a handful of the 62,000 students recognized nation-wide.

These academic honors can be included on college and scholarship applications.

They were recognized at the BOE meeting on 9/12.



We are excited to share that we have three student teachers this year: Chris Delillo, Social Studies with Mr. Demars; Phil Michener, Math with Mr. Cooke; and Ryder Fitch, Science with Ms. Kingston.

GMS NEWS

MASHANTUCKET PEQUOT MUSEUM OUTREACH PROGRAM

An educator from the Mashantucket Pequot Museum visited the Griswold Middle School Learning Commons on Friday, September 23 and taught three sessions for students in grade five to align with their class lessons about Indigenous Peoples.

Students were shown objects that illustrated Pequot lives and activities in a 16th century coastal village and learned how the arrival of Europeans brought dramatic change. They learned how beaver pelts were one of the biggest trade items, and wampum was a popular currency at the time. Students made their own wampum bracelets that told stories, and learned to play a traditional tribal game, hubbub.

The Museum will return October 21 for another three sessions. This program was made possible by funding acquired through the American Library Association's Humanities Grant. The grant also allowed the middle school learning commons to acquire new books and virtual reality goggles.

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GMS CELEBRATED PEACE DAY!

Students, faculty and staff recognized the International Day of Peace on Wednesday, September 21 by decorating pinwheels and installing them on the front lawn. This year, the United Nations focused World Peace Day around the theme "End Racism. Build Peace." CREWs discussed how each of us can participate in building peace in our world by helping to build peace in our own communities.

**CREW (Caring, Respectful, Empowered Wolverines) is GMS's Social-Emotional Learning program for all students. CREW meets weekly throughout the school year to build relationships and create a supportive school community.*

GES NEWS

Great things are happening at Griswold Elementary School!

PRESCHOOL

The GPS website's preschool section is updated! [Check it out for more information.](#)

Griswold preschoolers are learning and practicing ways to show respect to their peers and teachers by being kind. They are also participating in a lesson, "All About Me: Me and My School," and taking walks around the inside of the building to see where the office, nurse, gymnasium, library, and cafeteria are located, and took a guided walk outside around the GPS campus.

KINDERGARTEN

Kindergarten is doing really well demonstrating respect in all areas of our school. We are so proud of their growth in the past month!

1ST GRADE

First grade has been working hard to learn all about respect. Students are beginning Illustrative Math. First Grade will be getting a visit from the local fire department on October 12 to enrich their understanding of people who work in our community.

2ND GRADE

Second grade classes are finishing up Foundations, and moving into reviewing glued sounds. They are working with data and picture graphs in math.

3RD GRADE

Third graders are beginning to learn multiplication in math and have started working on weather in science. In reading, they are working on character traits, both personality and physical. They recently took a Community Walk to better focus on the SEL component of respect in the community and support Social Studies standards.

4TH GRADE

The fourth grade has completed benchmark testing and have started to settle into a routine to focus on both academics and SEL. In SEL, they are working on defining the difference between beliefs, values and opinions and exploring ways in which they can respect others' opinions. In ELA, students have been working on elements of plots, specifically looking for clues that can develop the exposition of a plot. In math, students are working to find factor pairs and using those pairs to determine whether a number is prime or composite. Students are also continuing to build their fact fluency with 2's, 3's and 5's. In SS, students are learning about New England and its landforms and landmarks that can be found in each northeastern state. In science, students are working on what happens to a rock when it detaches and falls down a mountain, and discussing root and ice wedging. They recently did a "sugar shaker experiment" to reinforce these skills.

EXPLORATORY

Students in Health are learning about the zones of regulation, and self-awareness. We are working on easy ways to think and talk about how they feel on the inside while learning to understand and sort into the four color zones. Over time, they will be introduced to strategies to better help meet daily expectations, while building upon GES character traits and managing feelings in each color zone.

ALUMNI FEATURE: AYLA TAYLOR-ROBICHAUD '21

There is nothing like a college visit in the fall. Crisp air, college hoodies, students in good spirits before midterms, and potentially a bonus opportunity for leaf peeping! I, having only toured two or three colleges before choosing my alma mater, always experience a sense of “what if” and much-delayed FOMO (fear of missing out) when I tour a school. I’m always envious of the young adults following their dreams and trying to find their purpose. It’s cliché to say, but it’s beautiful to think that they have their whole lives ahead of them.

In mid-September, I had the opportunity to visit Brown University in Providence, RI, and get acquainted with Griswold alumna Ayla Taylor-Robichaud '21. Ayla is one of a handful of recent Griswold High School graduates that are taking Ivy League universities by storm. Ayla is in her second year studying Biophysics, with the intention of pursuing medical school post-graduation. She always wanted to go to Brown, so she applied early decision with the help of the GHS School Counseling department.

Upon my arrival to campus, I parked in front of the Van Wickle Gates. This was the first time, and not the last, that I would hear about superstitions across Brown’s campus. Ayla noted that students only cross through the main gates once at Convocation, and once at Graduation. Allegedly, if you cross through the big gates between the start and finish of your undergraduate, *you will not graduate*. Also, if you step on the Pembroke College seal on the steps of the former women’s college, *you will not graduate*. See a trend?

On our walk to get falafel wraps on Thayer Street, and then trek across campus to the athletic facilities, Ayla and I reminisced on our upbringings in Griswold. We had many commonalities: we’re both the first born of two daughters, explored our interests through enrichment class projects, shared stories about teachers we had in common, and realized we’re both Yankees fans like our moms.

During Ayla’s time at Griswold, not only was she a stellar student, but she was also a three-season varsity athlete who ran cross country and indoor/outdoor track all four years. Ayla was also a violinist in the school orchestra and the Thames Valley Youth Symphony Orchestra. To experience a new challenge, she [helped launch the GHS Model United Nations club](#). She noted that GHS’s tight-knit community allowed her to really get to know faculty and staff, and also allowed her to have flexibility and support to create her own schedule that incorporated advanced classes in-person and online.

Now in her second year at Brown, Ayla is finding more ways to explore her interests. She’s engaged in extracurricular activities such as ultimate frisbee, and is enrolled in a string band class where she plays fiddle. Ayla also continues to be active in community service. In her time at Griswold, she volunteered at Day Kimbal Hospital before the onset of the COVID-19 Pandemic. She currently volunteers at a free clinic in downtown Providence.

On a campus that seems to have beautiful green spaces, patios, and libraries everywhere you turn, I asked where she likes to study. “Outside, if it’s nice out.” Brown’s campus is bustling with over 6,000 undergraduate students, and we passed by a few groups touring campus. Ayla informed me that in October, there are also ghost tours on campus that examine many of the old buildings at Brown that are allegedly haunted. “It’s not uncommon to see a man dressed as the Grim Reaper strolling around campus this time of year,” she laughed, as she also informed me about Brown’s midnight organ concert on Halloween ([check out this cool video here](#)).

Ayla encourages current and prospective GHS students to get involved and take advantage of the fact that Griswold is a small school. You have the opportunity to get to build relationships with teachers and staff, as well as pursue your interests to get a good idea of how you want your future to look.

Since not everyone has their heart set on a college like Ayla did with Brown, it’s important to take advantage of opportunities to talk with school counselors about what’s right for you and maybe take a few tours this fall.
