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Rationale and Summary:

Effective traffic safety instruction has great benefits to students, parents, and the community. The goal of driver education is to transfer traffic safety knowledge and skills into injury prevention behaviors. This curriculum focuses on risk awareness; time, space, and distance-perception skill development; and the recognition of and appropriate response to hazards in the ever-changing driving environment. Further, instruction aims to establish responsible attitudes and good driving habits. Significant attention is given to risk awareness, driver alertness, and responsible actions for occupant protection devices, positive interactions with other roadway users, and the physical and psychological conditions that affect driver performance

Instructional Focus:

Enduring Understandings

- Making informed decisions involves evaluating potential for injury prior to engaging in unhealthy/risky behaviors; taking steps to be prepared with firstaid procedures reduces injuries and saves lives.
- There are immediate and long-term consequences of risky behavior associated with substance abuse and dependency.
- Informed citizens know and respect the laws of a society. Compliance with public codes is a necessary requisite for an orderly, safe environment.
- The continuing relationship between personal behavior, health, and well-being affect not only individuals, but also society through intended and unintended consequences.
- Students will gain understanding of the age requirements for obtaining student permit, provisional license and basic license.
- Students will understand the requirements for the MVC six points of identification verification.
- Students will gain an understanding of the requirements necessary of them for the basic road test and the reasons for rejection.
- Students will gain an understanding of New Jersey seat belt law, child restraints and airbags.
- Students will learn about general car conditions and will know what must work properly when operating a vehicle on New Jersey roadways.
- Students will also learn the basic skills for operating a motor vehicle.
- Students will also learn the basic skills for parking a motor vehicle.
- Students will gain an understanding of safe driving rules and regulations including the use of cell phones, right of way, speed limits, highways and headlights.
- Students will gain an understanding of defensive driving; including the Smith system, SIPDE (Search, Identify, Predict, Decide, and Execute) collision prevention formula.
- Students will learn what to do when they are involved in an accident.
- Students will gain an understanding of drinking, drugs and the effects they have on the driving task. Students will learn about the HERO campaign, how much is too much, and the good host.
- Students will gain an understanding of the driver privileges and the penalties.
- Students will learn about the point system, moving violations and the consequences of driving under the influence and other motor vehicle infractions.

- Students will gain an understanding of how to share the road with other motor vehicles, pedestrians, animals and low speed vehicles. Students will also learn about tractor-trailers, buses and no-zone principles.
- Students will review general vehicle information and essential driver information.
- Students will also gain understanding of how to title, register and insure a vehicle.
- Students will gain an appreciation of the High School Heroes Donate Life Act.
- Students will be presented both sides of the issue, the donor's side and the recipient's side.

- Why is there an age and weight limit for a child restraint system and what are the limits?
- Why does NJ have a seat belt law and what does it state?
- Explain the process of entering and starting a car.
- Why do you check the inside and outside of the motor vehicle?
- Explain how you position your mirrors to make your blind spot as small as possible.
- Explain the proper way to hold the steering wheel and why it is the proper hand position.
- What are the three hand signals and explain when they would be used?
- Why are there different speed limits in New Jersey and what are they?
- Who must you yield the right of way to?
- How do you enter and exit a highway?
- What is the New Jersey headlight law?
- What are the laws pertaining to New Jersey cell phone usage?
- What are the three parts of the collision prevention formula?
- How can you prevent road rage?

- What steps would you take in the event that you are involved in a motor vehicle collision?
- How does the consumption of alcohol impact your ability to drive a car safely?
- What becomes impaired after 2-4 drinks?
- What are the four factors that will impact your Blood Alcohol Content (BAC)?
