 Conducting parent and family engagement meetings/trainings/activities
 Recruiting/Hiring/Retaining Professionally Qualified Teachers





 On February 19, 2015, the State Board of Education (SBOE) voted to rename the ELA and Mathematics standards to the Georgia Standards of Excellence (GSE). The recently revised and SBOE approved ELA and Mathematics standards for implementation beginning for the 2015-2016 school year will be called the ELA and Mathematics Georgia Standards of Excellence (GSE). Georgia Milestones Assessment System (GMAS)



Georgia Milestones Assessment System (GMAS)

Students will receive an EOG scale score, an achievement level designation, and a number correct out of the number possible on items aligned to the state content standards.
 Students will also receive scores on norm-referenced items that allow comparison to a national group of students



Georgia Milestones Assessment System (GMAS)

- Selected-response items are machine scored. The Science and Social Studies assessments consist of only selected-response items.
- However, the English Language Arts (ELA) assessment consists of a variety
 of item types that contribute to the student's score, including selectedresponse, constructed-response, extended constructed-response, and
 extended writing-response.
- Likewise, the Mathematics assessment consists of selected-response, constructed-response, and extended constructed-response items.
- Items that are not machine scored—i.e., constructed-response, extended constructed-response, and extended writing-response items—require rubrics for manual scoring.



Georgia Kindergarten Inventory of Developing Skills

The Georgia Kindergarten Inventory of Developing Skills (GKIDS) is a yearlong, performance-based assessment. The goal of the assessment program is to provide teachers with information about the level of instructional support needed by individual students entering kindergarten and first grade. GKIDS will allow teachers to assess student performance during instruction, record student performance in an on-line database, and generate reports for instructional planning, progress reports, report cards, SST, and/or parent conferences. Throughout the year, teachers may assess students and record GKIDS data based on their system's curriculum map or report card schedule. At the end of the year, summary reports and individual student reports will be generated based on the data the teacher has entered throughout the year.

Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS)

A set of procedures and measures for assessing the acquisition of early literacy skills from kindergarten through sixth grade. They are designed to be short (one minute) fluency measures used to regularly monitor the development of early literacy and early reading skills.
