Tells the story of Mamie "Peanut" Johnson, a woman who had to overcome the obstacles of gender and race to pursue her dream of playing baseball, and who finally got her chance when she and other African-American women were invited to play in the Negro Leagues after male players were allowed on major league teams.

Kostyal, K. M.

Trial by Ice: A Photobiography of Sir Ernest Shackleton

Traces the adventurous life of the South Pole explorer whose ship, the Endurance, was frozen in ice and crushed, leaving the captain and crew to

fight for survival.

Krull, Kathleen Marie Curie

Presents a biography of Polish-French physicist and chemist Marie Curie, who was a pioneer in the field of radioactivity and won a Noble prize in

both physics and in chemistry.

Paulsen, Gary

Guts: The True Stories Behind Hatchet and the Brian Books

This collection of six stories reveals Paulsen's real-life spirit and the part it played in Brian's four adventures. Paulsen relates the nature lore and autobiographical incidents behind the wilderness survival scenarios.
