

A HISTORY OF BASEBALL TEAMS AT TURLOCK HIGH SCHOOL

1907-2007

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Baseball has been an integral part of the sports history of the United States since before the Civil War. As the national sport there is no question, baseball has been and continues to be Number 1 (aside from a few winter contests of some small significance). In this project I have researched the baseball teams at Turlock from inception through 1987. This involves a period of 100 years and a great many participants in the Grand Old Game.

The format for this paper will include a section documenting the earliest beginnings of baseball at Turlock High School. I have divided the rosters by seasons and the teams by decades with a summary introduction of the decades' highlights. All information was researched from Turlock High School yearbooks, dating back to the first yearbook in 1906, former coaches, fans, parents and coaches. In many cases the first names of many players was not available. Information was lacking for the year 1914 and for the depression years of the 1930's. On occasion team pictures and rosters had been left out of the yearbook with only a list of outstanding players. For those years I have produced only that information. This project does not include school records or statistics but it does denote championships.

1907-1909: A HUMBLE BEGINNING

In 1906 Turlock High School was formed with a faculty of five instructors but engaged in no athletic contests that first year. According to the 1907 Alert (the annual yearbook): "Last year we did not take part in athletics, because there were so few boys in school, and because our time was fully occupied along other lines of work."

The 1907 school year opened on September 16 and in the first week of school a baseball team was organized by the boys in the school. Victor Hoskins was chosen by the boys to be manager and Corrine Hodges as team captain. The 1907 Alert carried an account of the first athletic contest ever played by Turlock High School. The game was played on September 28, 1907 as the result of a challenge issued by Merced High School. The result of that first-ever game was a victory for T.H.S. by a score of 16-14. The Alert reported: "That game surprised us somewhat, and delighted us more, for now our school has the honor of winning the first debate and the first athletic meet, certainly a good beginning for us."

Baseball continued to be played in the fall when the weather is usually outstanding! The school did not participate in football at this time. In 1909 the baseball team played in the fall and for the first time competed in the spring of the same school year, 1910. Turlock High School joined the A.A.L. (initials unknown) league in 1909. Opponents included Orestimba (Newman), Oakdale, and the first opponent, Merced. A

challenge by Madera was not met due to lack of funds. A common theme throughout the reports on games from this time period is respect for opponents, a sportsmanship that oft times is missing in today's win at all costs society.

1910-1919: THE NATIONAL GAME THRIVES

The decade began with the conversion to springtime baseball after a 5 game schedule in the previous fall. This would be the only decade in which teams would be fielded in all ten years until the 1940's. Many references to baseball used the term 'National game' instead of the 'National pastime' that is so common today. The composition of the first team of the new decade was identical to that of the team 1909 as it was the same school year. Games with Stockton, Sonora, Lodi and Modesto were added. The 1910 season was delayed until the track season was completed due to the limited number of boys in the school. The longest game reported was a thirteen-inning affair won by Merced in 1911. No roster exists for the 1911 team but many of the 1910 players appear on the 1912 roster so it is safe to assume that many if not most of them also played in 1911 as well. Mr. Cross coached the 1912 team, the first reported baseball coach. One of the members of that 1912 team was Lester De La Mater, was the American Legion sponsor for the Post 88, Turlock Legion Baseball team for many years until his death in the late 1970's. He was an ardent backer of local baseball who never missed a summer legion game while working the gate, retrieving foul balls and paying the umpires. The 1913 season saw the formation of 4-team league. This is also last year that baseball was spelled with two words in the yearbook, instead of one as we do today. No roster or picture was found for 1914 but later yearbooks state that Turlock had always fielded a team leaving no doubt that 1914 was an exception. Pictures but no rosters were found for 1915 and 1917. The 1917 team asked to play on the town diamond (near the present day Towne Center on Golden State Boulevard) as the high school did not have its' own field until the 1930's. The schedule that year was 6 games in length and the team lost only to Ceres. World War I had no apparent effect on baseball despite the emphasis on military preparation at Turlock High. The largest club on campus was the Cadets, an organization of military preparation complete with uniforms. The 1918 baseball team sported new uniforms, won the local league and were challenged by Coalinga for the championship of the Valley only to lose in an eleven-inning game. The

basketball team of that year won 25 games and lost their only game of the season in the State Championship game to Hollywood High School, 31-22. Many of the same athletes were on both the 1919 basketball team and the baseball team, as is common in a small school. The 1919 team won the County Championship for the second year in a row. Unfortunately, no roster exists for the 1919 team although the 1920 Alert states that the team had eight returning veterans from that championship squad.

1920-1929: THE ROARING TWENTIES AND THE LOCAL NINE

The Roaring Twenties ushered in a new sport at Turlock High School. The first football team began play in 1921. Not surprisingly, by 1928 the Alert stated, "The great national sport was hardly recognized in Turlock High School." The caption was written by a member of the baseball team but the rivalry for the attention between the two sports is still felt to this day.

The 1921 team did not enter league competition but played eight games including surely one of the fastest 9-inning game played, a 4-3 Ceres victory in 1 hour and 30 minutes. The 1924 season was cancelled due to an outbreak of foot and mouth disease (a contagious disease common among cattle and deer but transmittable to man) that we know as hoof and mouth disease today. Due to the cancelled season, the field fell into disrepair and the 1925 season was limited for that reason although 7 games were played. The home run was big news in the early twenties and the local nine was no exception. The 1926 season was highlighted by a three home run game against Modesto High School. The coach that year was a young teacher by the name of Fred Earle, now of Modesto. In a phone interview, Mr. Earle recalled his one season as the baseball coach as an enjoyable one with the active support of the faculty. He moved on after the 1925-6 school year and when given names of his players it brought a lot of old memories to him. It's extremely difficult to imagine and appreciate the fact that this was over 60 years ago.

The decade ended with the beginnings of a national worldwide depression but not before a successful turnout of 14 boys and one manager completed the 1929 season for T.H.S. with 8 wins and 0 losses.

1930-1939: AN ENDING AND A NEW BEGINNING

With the advent of the Great Depression in the 1930's the high school arena of extracurricular activities began to wane. Despite back to back championships in 1929 and 1930 the T.H.S. baseball team was no exception to cut backs. The 1931 team was the last team to compete until 1937. The 1932 season was cut for lack of a coach and, of course, funds. Joe Debley, now retired, was the physical education instructor, football coach and track coach from 1932 to 1966 (except for War World II military service). In two interviews he not only helped to identify players from those years but also filled in many pieces of history between those early years. Mr. Debley states that the old 1932 uniforms were stored until the 1937 season when they were used again as funds were still scarce when baseball was reintroduced. Baseball competition at the high school was replaced by fastpitch softball which swept the nation as a major summer recreation sport and form of entertainment in the depression/ pre-television days. The mid-thirties, forties and fifties were marked by fastpitch softball competition between many teams from the surrounding area. Many of the high school players were on these teams in lieu of school sponsored teams.

In 1935 the first local American Legion Baseball team was formed for boys ages 18 and under. A picture of that first team hangs in the Department of Community Activities and Facilities at the Turlock City Hal. In the picture many of the uniforms appear to be the ones worn by the high school beginning in 1918 through 1925. the same uniforms also appear on seven players on the first documented "B" squad in the 1946 team picture. Baseball began again in 1937 as Coach Armand Seghetti began a 15 season stint that would cover parts of three decades.

1940-1949: BATTLES ON AND OFF THE DIAMOND

The year 1940 saw the Nazi blitzkrieg overrun Europe, threaten England and endanger the security of the United States. Life at home continued virtually interrupted, as America looked the other way. New cars continued to roll off the assembly lines in Detroit while Congress debated, then narrowly passed the Lend-Lease Act of aid for our allies. Little did the boys in uniforms on the sandlots across America realize that they would soon be engaged in another type of training wearing another uniform. Turlock was no different as young men, their coaches and teachers would soon enlist or be drafted into the armed forces of the United States. This time, however, the fight would be not against friendly rival across the diamond but against an enemy determined to destroy the way of life that make that friendly competition possible. After the attack on Pearl Harbor, the innocence of high school life was forever altered for the students and athletes of the early and mid-forties. In all 25 T.H.S. students would give their lives in World War II, including 1937 baseballer, Manuel Rozario.

President Franklin Roosevelt had decided that major league baseball should continue as a morale builder throughout the war even though many major league ballplayers had left for military service. Following this lead, baseball in small town America continued as well. The 1942 season saw the departure of Coach Armand Seghetti to the U.S. Navy in mid-season. Teacher Bob Colyar took over to complete the season before he left for military duty. The following season of 1943 was cancelled for lack of a coach but returned in 1944 when Art Rohde took the team for the next two years. In that 1944 season what certainly must have been one of the longest games at

T.H.S., was played. Turlock and Hughson engaged in a three-hour, 16 inning marathon game that ended when Turlock scored the games' only run in the bottom of the sixteen inning. The 1940-45 teams all had more than 20 members each with the 1941 team numbering 30. Light poles and lights were added to the school diamond after the WWII bomb plant on Faith Home Road was closed at the end of the war. Other locations receiving lights were the Wakefield School diamond, as well as Hilmar and Denair High Schools. Although some of them still work as of 1988, they are not used. After VJ Day and the boys returned home, postwar prosperity in America brought a close to the war years. Beginning with the 1946 season two baseball teams per year would be fielded, as a team for the younger boys was formed.

1950-1959: BASEBALL – BIG AND LITTLE

The Advent of two teams at the high school to accommodate a growing student body was a significant milestone in the development of baseball in Turlock. The 1950's saw an even more dramatic change with the organization of Little League baseball in Turlock. Former Athletic Directors Joe Debley, Les Ratzlaff and Ex-Principal and coach Don Goldstein, all have stated that the advent of the Little League program resulted in a much higher quality of baseball player entering the high school ranks. The man responsible for starting the program was Jin Brainbridge, then the manager of Pacific Telephone. A large, jolly man, Bainbridge was interested in giving young boys an organized situation in which to play ball. Local Little League began in the year 1955 and the first players reached the high school in 1957 as freshman.

The decade of the 1950's witnessed three coaching changes as Armand Seghetti, returning from Military service, gave way to Les Ratzlaff. Two years later, Ratzlaff took over the reigns of the football program was replaced by Ezio (Atch) Pedretti. Under Pedretti, Turlock baseball grew to become a well-respected and recognized program throughout the Central Valley. Pedretti would guide Turlock baseball teams for the next 24 seasons. In 1958 Turlock joined the newly formed Central California Conference and played an 18 game schedule, some four more than had previously been played under the old format.

1960-1969: Change and Stability

The 1960's ushered in an age of social change that included a missile crisis in Cuba, the beginnings of a war in an unknown region called Vietnam and a group of English musicians called the Beatles. Through all the change and upheaval, one constant remained: baseball. Now known as the National Pastime, the game was entering its second century, practically unchanged. The ball, the bat, the rules, the drama, and the fun were still the same as it had been for the fathers and grandfathers of Americans everywhere. The game continued locally as well. Runs were scored, hits were made and taken away, strikeouts were recorded, walks given up and errors committed. Turlock baseball entered its seventh decade of competition with high expectations by young and old alike.

1970-1979

The 1970's were marked by the first CCC Championship in T.H.S. history as the 1971 team nicknamed, "Atch's Angels" surprised many enroute to a banner year ending in an appearance in the Sac- Jaoquin Section Tournament of Champions. The Team would finish with 20 wins, the highest total of victories to that time. As styles of baseball attire began to change with the reappearance of colored uniforms and white sleats on professional level the trend also carried to the high school level as well. Pin striped uniforms made a reappearance for the first time since the early 1940's. These however would be made of a more comfortable double knit material. At the same time as the new uniforms arrived, a new field at the high school was readied for the 1975 season replacing the old field at the corner of Berkely and Marshall. That field had served as the home games during the school year for the high school, Babe Ruth League, Senior Little League and American Legion games in the summer. Also known as the "B" diamond, it has been in continous use for over 70 years and was the first home of the new college team, Stanislaus State in the mid-sixties.

1980-1989: INTO A SEVENTH DECADE

The 1980's have included several major turning points in Turlock baseball. As the decade of the 1980's unfolded, Turlock High baseball teams would complete a sixth and enter into a seventh decade of competition. The 1980's would be the fourth decade in which Atch Pedretti would lead baseball teams at T.H.S. unknown to anyone, the 1981 season would be his last as he passed away in the fall of 1981. The period of time that followed brought forth a great deal of sorrow but even more evoked a great many fond memories.

The 1983 and '84 seasons were played at the newly completed Pedretti Park Sports Complex as the high school field was inundated with gophers. This move to the park allowed the first known home games to be played at night. Although chilly nights were the norm, the local fans turned out in good number as they have for a great many years. In 1985 the local nine once again played home contests at the high school field. In 1986 a championship was won for the first time since the 1970's and the 1987 team reached the Sac-Joaquin Section Championship against Rancho Cordova before losing. Another milestone was reached in the 1988 season, as Turlock High fielded its' 75th baseball team.

Over the years these many young men have experienced a common love for the game, a sense of accomplishment and a sense of pride as participants in the Grand Old Game. Hundreds of players have come and gone since that first team took the field way back in 1907 including countless sons and at least two grandsons of former T.H.S. players. The old adage that the only death and taxes are certain in life should be amended to read death, taxes, and baseball!

1990-1999: LAST HURRAH OF THE OLD CENTURY

The decade of the 90's included some of the very best Turlock teams ever. As the nation prospered so did THS Baseball. The city population began to swell and so did the number of players in the program, which eventually added a second freshmen team. In 1990 and again in 1997 the Dogs reached the section finals with truly outstanding teams. The championship season of 1990 was highlighted by back-to-back no-hitters. Steve Soderstrom and Brady Sebok accomplished the feat in March. Soderstrom would go on to star at Fresno State and become the third THS player to reach the Major Leagues with the San Francisco Giants. By the end of May, the Dogs found themselves facing Elk Grove in the Section Finals, unfortunately the Dogs came up short in their second attempt at a section crown.

In 1991, Mike Vincent took the reigns for a year and the team reached the South Section Finals. The 1993 season was a historic one highlighted by the first, and so far only, perfect game thrown by a Bulldog when David Hartvickson dazzled Johansen HS. In 1994 pitcher Dan Reichert would dominate the opposition and follow in Soderstrom's footsteps of college All-American and eventually become the fourth Bulldog in the Major Leagues with the Kansas City Royals.

In 1997, Mile Trainor would take over the program as Mark de la Motte became the baseball coach at CSU Stanislaus. Trainor's first team would bring home the most wins ever in a 24-11 season. That team also reached the section finals against Elk Grove again. Painfully the third time was not a charm for THS. As the century closed there would be a great deal of nostalgia around the world. The nostalgia on the diamond here was no different. Nearly a century of baseball here would be marked by four wars, disease, unemployment and nation-wide depression. In between and beyond there were hundreds of eager players, coaches and fans to experience the highs and lows of growing up, leaving home and striving to return, all the while learning life's lessons along the way between the lines.
