Why is this property significant?

- Built to replace an earlier City Hall that was located on N. 2nd St. that was destroyed in the 1876 Fire.
- Constructed in 1904, this building has served as the hub of civic life in Fernandina for 116 years. It originally housed all local government function including Police, Fire, Public Works, and the City Managers offices.
- The building has significant cultural value in that it served an important function during our National Register listed downtown's period of significance.

Current Concerns

The building was significantly altered in 1956, in an effort to "modernize" the structure. The new design removed and obscured the original design of the structure in favor of a mid-century modern design, which was the architectural style chosen for all Fernandina Beach's civic buildings, such as the Atlantic Rec Center.

Nearly 40 buildings were destroyed by the fire March 23, 1876 including the Post Office, City Offices, the Probate and County Clerks Office, Offices of the Charleston Steamship Company, and the Observer printing office.

- As a number of the later additions were of poorer quality and materials than the original portion of the building, they have begun to deteriorate and fail.
- Between the failing additions and the space constraints that challenge housing a growing city staff, actions will need to be taken soon.
- Development pressure is high for downtown, as developers are seeking land downtown to construct residential projects. This parcel consists of 8 underlying platted lots of record.
- As the historic nature of the structure has been obscured for over a generation, many people lack an understanding of the history and significance of this site. This is concerning, because when people understand and are invested in the history of a site, there is more will to rehabilitate and maintain these structures.

1904 - Dedicated (cost unknown)

- Originally housed all City departments including Police, Fire, and Public Works.
- First City Council Meeting held at City Hall July 6, 1904.
- Facility included the Public Works Garage, City Jail, and the City Commission Chambers.
- Fire House was equipped with a state of the art Gamewell fire alarm system
- Throughout the mid-1900s, various City Departments were moved from the building, including the Police Station, Public Works Department, and, in later years, the City Commission Chambers.







1956 Renovation – (cost =\$19,572)


- New wing constructed on the west elevation;
- Building altered to remove archways, towers, and chimneys;
- Brick resurfaced with stucco;
- Windows replaced;
- Re-roofed;
- Courtroom remodeled to serve as Courtroom/ Commission Chambers.
- Vault installed for City records, which had previously been kept in the attic.




City Hall and Fire Station Floorplan (after 1956 addition to west elevation)

1971 renovation – (cost unknown)

- East wing added to the building to accommodate the Rescue unit and provide an office for the Fire Chief.
- Relocated a number of times throughout the building, City Commission Chambers moved to the Police Station across the street in 1972.

1995 Renovation - (cost \$350,000)


- City approves relocation of Fire Department to new Fire Station #1 on 14th Street. This allowed for the reunification of City Commission Chambers with City Hall
- Replacement of all building components including HVAC, plumbing, electrical, and communication lines.
- Addition of ADA restrooms, elevator, landscaped parking lot, three interior customer service counters, a drive-up window with night depository, and a drive up public notice board.
- Most work performed by City employees through the Public Works Department.






"At the June 30, 1995 City Commission Retreat, the Commission expressed support for retaining City Hall at its present location...

From a planning perspective, the existing City Hall is properly located. It is located in the downtown area and the heart of the community, and it is near the historic district. It is appropriate and desirable to locate major public facilities such as a Post Office, Police Station, City Hall, and Courthouse and private facilities such as banks and Chamber of Commerce in the downtown area. • North face of original cornerstone laid in 1904. West face is currently obscured by the 1956 addition.




- Geodetic Survey Benchmark Installed 1923
 - Set vertically in the north face of City Hall at the corner of Ash and Second Street, 29.5 feet east of the east curb of Second Street,24.7 feet south of the south curb of Ash Street, 15.0 feet east of the northwest corner, 2.2 FEET west of the west entrance into City Hall, about 4 feet above the level of the ground.
 - "NOAA's National Geodetic Survey (NGS) defines, maintains, and provides access to the National Spatial Reference System (NSRS) a consistent coordinate system that defines latitude, longitude, height, scale, gravity, orientation, and shoreline throughout the United States and is designed to meet our nation's economic, social, and environmental needs. For 200 years, NGS and its predecessor agencies have collaborated with public and private organizations to establish reference stations at precisely determined locations. Traditionally, these locations have been identified by setting a survey mark —usually a brass, bronze, or aluminum disk." *www.geodesy.noaa.gov*




 As the building evolved and expanded, many of the original doorways and windows were sealed off. Many of the built in bookcases throughout the building were constructed to fill in these openings and were designed to be reversible.




- Entry staircase original to the 1904 design.

City of Fernandina Beach Comprehensive Plan Related Policies

Policy 11.03.08. The City shall continue the use of historic buildings for governmental purposes and shall consider the acquisition of historic buildings for adaptive reuse for municipal purpose when additional space is required. Any building fifty (50) or more years old considered for surplus by the City shall be submitted prior to sale for review by the applicable review board. Any such building determined to have historic or architectural significance, if considered surplus, shall be sold or otherwise conveyed by the City with protective covenants to ensure its preservation and proper rehabilitation.

Policy 11.03.14. The City shall continue to monitor and seek support from state and federal programs related to historic preservation, and shall pursue grant funding where feasible to complete projects in the City related to historic, cultural and archaeological resource protection.

Policy 11.03.19. The City shall encourage retention of essential public services, such as a post office, library and other government functions, in the historic downtown district, and encourage reuse of historic buildings for these functions where feasible.

Policy 11.07.02. The City shall provide for the interpretation of City-owned historic resources, including but not limited to, media outreach, interpretive kiosks or plaques, and staff outreach.

Policy 11.09.01. The City shall encourage historic preservation as a sustainable building practice that encourages reuse of existing resources and helps reduce energy consumed and waste created as part of the demolition and building process.

Policy 11.09.02. The City shall review the Land Development Code for regulations that encourage teardowns of existing structures and make recommendations to the City Commission regarding changes or alterations to the Land Development Code that will assist in prevention of teardowns and retention of existing structures, including identifying incentives such as tax exemptions, expedited permitting, or reduced fees, to promote reuse of existing structures.
