Bullying Still an Issue in U.S. Schools By Jena Parker



School bullying isn't just a big kid picking on a smaller kid and shoving them in the locker anymore; its many different things such as verbal harassment, threats, physical harassment, cyber bullying and emotional threats. According to stopbullying gov the definition of school bullying is unwanted, aggressive behavior among school aged children that involves a real or perceived power imbalance. The behavior is repeated, or has the

potential to be repeated, over time.

Both kids who are bullied and who bully others may have serious, lasting problems. Some of the symptoms of bullying include suffering from changed eating and sleeping patterns, mental illnesses such as anxiety, depression or Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder. Ultimately many people who are bullied have suicidal thoughts or succeed in committing suicide. Suicide is the second leading cause of death for ages 10-24 according to 9news.com. Colorado ranks 9th in the US in teen suicides, 9news.com further stated. Education.com explains that bystanders are affected by bullying they witness. Bystanders struggle from increased mental illnesses, drug abuse and missed school.

Lets not forget how the bullies themselves are affected. Bullies often are abusive when they become older because of the actions of their youth. School bullies may also suffer mental illnesses.

If someone is being bullied they can overcome it by seeking help and going to therapy. If you see bullying it is very important to report it for the safety of the victim. Speak with school counselors or administrators to report suspected bullying. If you are concerned about becoming a target by the bully there are sites such as Safe2Tell (1-877-542-7233 or http://safe2tell.org) provide an anonymous way to help someone in trouble because of bullying.

State Forensics Success and on to National Qualifying

Three members of the Forensics Team competed at the CHSAA State Festival Tournament January 29 and 30. Juniors Jay Armstrong, Heather Hoffman and Aubrey Wells competed in Impromptu Speaking, Creative Storytelling, Original Oratory, One on One Value Debate and Lincoln Douglas Debate at Heritage High School in Littleton.



State Champion Jay's stories were extremely creative, impressing the judges to a near perfect day placing first and with maximum points on almost every ballot. He beat out a field of 35 to finish in first place. It was very exciting to have a first year competitor win a State Championship! Aubrey finished in fifth place on One on One Value debate with an undefeated record in her first three rounds, losing to the state champion in the quarterfinals

round. Heather finished 13th place, only two points behind a 11th place tie, with her two wins. The tournament began with 33 in this event. Jay also finished 18th of 44 in Impromptu Speaking.

While Jay, Heather and Aubrey compete for state honors, teammate Tristan Reyez, also a junior, competed at Longmont High School trying to qualify for the National Forensic League National Student Congress. Unfortunately, he didn't place in the top two to make it to nationals, but is fired up for next year.

Next up: competing March 4 and 5 at Greeley Central for a chance to compete at the National Tournament in Salt Lake City June 13-17. Our students will compete in Oratory and Lincoln Douglas Debate, hoping to place first or second for a League imag chance to travel to nationals.

FBLA Headed to District Competition

FBLA will be competing in their District Competition on February 4 at NJC in Sterling. The District consists of the schools on I-70 from Burlington to Flagler up to Yuma, Lonestar, and over to us. There are approximately 300 students competing for spots in the state competition April 14-16 in Vail. The top 3 in speaking/project events and the top 4 in test only events qualify for state

The Fort Morgan High School club will be well represented by 40 students in 15 speaking/project events and six test events. Speaking/project events include digital video production, publication design, website design, securities and investments, website design, graphic design, computer game and simulation programming, sports and entertainment management, public service announcement, social media campaign, intro to parliamentary procedure, impromptu, partners with business public speakling and intro to business communication. The six test events include personal finance, computer problem solving, business calculations, economics, business communications, and healthcare administra-

Time To Rethink Studying and Test Scores

Most people think that a lot of homework is a good thing showing that they have a great education. The website Intelligence for Life states that recent research shows that kids who study a lot actually do not do well on standardized tests. The Stanford study found that high school students who are loaded with homework often suffer from poor mental and physical health. They don't exercise or sleep enough because they are studying. This overload of homework has a negative impact on learning. Duke University school psychologist Dr. Harris Cooper stated that middle school students stop absorbing information after about 90 minutes and high school students stop learning significantly after 2 hours. To reduce the weight of homework on student learning he recommends that student not be given more than 10 minutes of homework per grade.

Schools are now reevaluating their homework policies after reading the research. Dr. Cooper recommends that homework count



for no more than 10% of student grades. Teachers should also be aware of the amount of homework they assign as well. According to research most teacher underestimate the amount of time it takes their students to finish an assignment by 50%. so when teachers say it will take 30 minutes to finish it may take about an hour.
