





Congressman McKeon Visits Westside at Student Request

Students of Joe Walker Middle School had the honor of a personal visit from Congressman Buck McKeon of the 25th United States Congressional District. The congressman visited 8th grade history students at the school to answer their questions about current issues. This visit came as the result of their teacher's request that students write a letter to one of their representatives at a federal, state or local level.

Many students chose to fulfill their history class assignment by writing letters to Congressman McKeon.

During the course of their history class this year, students discussed current issues and the candidates running for various seats in office. "One of the things the students said to me was that they didn't believe they had a voice," said Willie Scott, history teacher at Joe Walker Middle School. "The

congressman coming today, I believe, gave these students the true realization that they do have a voice."

McKeon answered student questions about many issues from gun control to sequestration and welfare to the national debt. His overall message to students, however, was that they are the future of this country and they must get their education to ensure America's future.

"If there is one thing you remember from my visit here today, it's that America needs you," McKeon told the group of history students. "You're going to be the future leaders of this country."

Several students were specifically selected to take the microphone, stand next to McKeon and directly ask him their question, which he answered for the benefit of the entire assembly. McKeon said he was

impressed by the quality and depth of the questions coming from such young citizens.

"It's inspiring when you think that they're eighth-graders and they've got enough understanding of what's going on in the country to be able to ask those kinds of questions," said McKeon. "Very, very good. It makes you feel better about our future."

"I thought the congressman answered them very, very well," said Bowen Colby, an 8th grade student who asked McKeon what he was doing to stop sequestration.

"At Westside, it is important to us that we build community-minded citizens to ensure the future of the Antelope Valley is in good hands," said Westside Union School District Superintendent Regina Rossall. "It was an honor to have Congressman Buck McKeon help our students realize how vital they are to the future of their country."

Mayor Ledford Joins Gregg Anderson Academy Students in Celebrating Read Across America Day

At the beginning of March, students all over the country celebrate the birthday of Dr. Seuss with Read Across America Week. Gregg Anderson Academy was honored to welcome guest reader, Mayor Jim Ledford to the school in celebration of this special week of reading. The mayor of Palmdale read several Dr. Seuss books to the students and discussed with them the importance of reading often and reading well.

"I have lots of books in my office," Ledford said when asked by a student how many books he had. "I couldn't do my job if I wasn't a good reader."

Ledford encouraged students to increase their imagination by choosing books over movies or television.

"Reading is so important because it unlocks your imagination," he said. "You can watch a movie on TV, and that will entertain you, but it won't entertain your imagination like a book will. That's when you really start to grow."

Mayor Ledford also held a question and answer period in which he answered student questions ranging from what his office looked like to why it is so important to read books. Ledford's ultimate message to students was that reading and education are vital to living a happy life. He told students getting their education would lead to finding a job they enjoy.

"If you love what you do, it's not work. You like it," Ledford advised.
"When you get older you want to pretend like you're playing when you work and when you love what you do, you're actually playing and getting paid."
