A LITTLE BIT ABOUT US CONTINUED

- The number of English Learners since 2013 has grown from 53 to 217 in 2018.
- Fifty-five percent of the students are eligible for free or reduced meals. Five years ago 46% of our students were eligible for free or reduced meals.
- There are 401 students currently receiving special education (non-gifted) services as defined by the Alabama State Code.
- The system currently has 150 students eligible for gifted services

WORKING ON THE WORK: WHAT HAVE WE BEEN DOING FOR THE PAST 5 YEARS?

Streamlined lesson plans to provide more consistent planning within each building and across the district.

Increased our technical and vocational offerings. We have added the following:

- Hospitably and Tourism Pathway, Culinary Arts, Culinary Arts I, Culinary Arts II, and Event Planning
- Manufacturing Pathway—Precision Machining, Into to Manual Mill and Surface Grinder, Intermediate to Manual Mill and Surface Grinder, Intro to Lathe and Benchwork, Intro to CNC, Intermediate to CNC
- Business Management and Administration—courses added to existing pathway—Business Technology Applications, Advanced Business Technology Applications, Multimedia Publications, Multimedia Design
- Health Science—courses added within existing pathway—Sports Medicine, Health Science Internship
- JROTC—serving a number of Walker County students
- Credentialing –we have increased the number of students Credentialing from 23 in 2015 to 140 last year
- Work study—the number has grown in the past five years from 46 students to 60. Over the past three years we have seen growth in the amount of wages earned within \$276,914.80. The economic impact total is \$1.9 million dollars over the last three years.
- Increased the number of students taking CTE courses over the past four years from 402 to 586

WORKING ON THE WORK: WHAT WE'VE BEEN DOING

- Increased academic offerings at the secondary level in:
 - Dual Enrollment—the average number of students taking Dual Enrollment courses is 23 over the past three years, as compared to 0 five years ago.
 - ACCESS course The number of students taking ACCESS courses over the past five years, has increased from 70 students to 99 students.
- Increased STEM activities at all schools
- Implemented Project Lead the Way –Robotics, Space and Flight, Medical Detectives
- Re-evaluated our technology usage options
 - Moved to a K-5 iPad and 6-12 laptop usage (from a K-2 iPod, and 3-12 iPad)
- Increased safety measures
 - Added another SRO
 - Implemented Crisis Go
 - Implemented Bertha---Behavioral Threat Assessment Plan
 - Added GPS to all buses
 - Added cameras to all buses
 - Clear or mesh back packs
