

Work Citation Guidelines
WALLINGFORD PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Background Information

The National standards for “Information Literacy” emphasize a student’s ethical responsibility with regard to information use. Schools should require that a student learn to be both effective and efficient in information access, evaluation and use.

We believe

- Students should be taught at an early age to cite sources (avoid plagiarism) as well as the importance of evaluating and using a wide variety of resources
- The concept of citing sources should not be held in isolation. Once introduced to the concept of giving credit for information obtained from outside sources, the student will include such information with all projects completed throughout the year
- Students should know that there are several formats for “works cited” (American Psychological Association, Modern Language Association, Chicago, Turabien)

Guidelines

1. In order to provide for consistency and clarity, **all papers that require citations** should follow the MLA (Modern Language Association) format. (this format is available on www.mla.org)
2. To prepare students to create a “Works Cited” page following MLA format in the 8th, students need to begin to record information about sources that they have used beginning in first grade. The amount of information recorded needs to be appropriate for the developmental level of the students. Each successive grade builds upon previous knowledge.

Kindergarten: recognize the author, title, and illustrator of a book, from the cover and title page

1st grade: copy the author and title of a book from the title page

2nd grade: - copy the author and title of a book from the title page
- select a source of information by its media format: computer, reference book, non-fiction book, magazine/newspaper, video, or other (interview, television, radio, etc.)

3rd grade: - identify copyright page
- use the “last name first” order for writing the author’s name
- collect author and title, information from each source used to gather information on a prepared form
- arrange forms alphabetically by author/title or title if there is not author

4th grade: - collect author, title, and copyright information from each source used to gather information onto a prepared form
- create a written list of sources arranged alphabetically
- underline the title

- 5th grade:
- collect author, title, publisher information and copyright information from each source used to gather information using a prepared form
 - create a written list of sources arranged alphabetically by author/title or title if there is no author
 - underline the title of the book
- 6th grade:
- create an alphabetical list of sources used, that includes all components of the MLA “works cited” format, as appropriate to the format of the information resource (a model is provided)
- 7th grade:
- use MLA guidelines to independently create a “Works Cited” page when completing any project
 - explain internal citation when seen in works created by others
- 8th grade:
- use internal citation for all research assignments and when supporting opinions with evidence
 - include a “Works Cited” page
- 9th-12th grades:
- include a “Works Cited” page and use internal citation following MLA guidelines for all research and analytical “products”

Note: The committee has developed worksheets to facilitate collection of citation information for grades 2 through 5. They have also produced “A Quick Guide to Citing Sources” for grades 6 and above.

3. All teachers grade 6 and above should have a copy of *A Guide to MLA Documentation*.

or **Book title**. Publication information for
any printed version. Or subject line of
forum or discussion group. Indication
of online posting or home page. Title of
electron journal. Date of electronic

numbers of paragraphs or sections.
Name of institution or organization
sponsoring Web site. Date of access to
the source <electronic address or DRL>

In general: (indent 5 spaces, all lines but the 1st)

Author's last name, first name, Book title.
Additional information. City of publication:
Publisher, publication date.

One author:

Boorstin, Daniel J. The Creators: A History of the Heroes of the Imagination.
New York: Random, 1992.

2+ authors: (separate with commas and "and").
(Only the first name is last name first order).

Vare, Ethlie Ann, and Greg Placek. Mothers of Invention: From the Bra to the Bomb: Forgotten Women and their Unforgettable Ideas. New York: Dell, 1979

Editor: use the editor's name, last name first
Order followed by "ed."

Hall, Donald, ed. The Oxford Book of American Literary Anecdotes.
New York: Oxford UP, 1981.

Multivolume work

2 vols. New York: Random, 1974

An edition other than the first

Author's last name, first name, "Article title of printed source." Periodical title of printed source Date: inclusive pages.
Title of database. CD-ROM. Name of Vendor of computer service. Electronic publication date or date of access.
