

Lawrence County School District Annual Report to the Public 2018

District Mission Statement

It is the mission of the Lawrence County School District to develop the ability of all students by motivating, challenging, and fostering independent education. To accomplish this mission, the Lawrence County School District will ensure a positive educational environment that enhances learning, fosters growth, and provides opportunities for all students and faculty to exceed and excel beyond the educational setting.

Schools

The Lawrence County School District is home to 885 students and 131 staff members. The Walnut Ridge Elementary serves students in grades kindergarten through the sixth grade. Walnut Ridge High serves students in grades seven through twelve. The Lawrence County School District strives to support the schools in administering academic and extracurricular programs that aim at benefiting all students. District personnel accept the responsibility that ALL students can learn and the faculty and staff will continue to work diligently to accomplish that endeavor in order to develop future productive citizens of our communities.

Arkansas schools continue to ensure high quality instruction and instructional leadership through the implementation of the [Teacher Excellence and Support System](#) (TESS) that defines a system to support high quality classroom instruction and effective teaching and leading in Arkansas's schools. The teacher evaluation system provides school districts a transparent and consistent teacher evaluation system that ensures effective teaching and promotes professional learning.

Annual Public Meeting

The Lawrence County School District held a public meeting on October 9, 2018 at 6:30p.m. in the Middle level building library.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss progress toward accomplishing district program goals, creating opportunities for excellence, accreditation standards, and school objectives for the 2019-2020 school year. Principals gave an overview of programs in each school. All parents and patrons were encouraged to attend.

Walnut Ridge Elementary School 2018 Public Report

The Walnut Ridge Elementary School accredited by ADVANCED-ED is in full compliance with the state standards. The faculty and staff remain committed to the school mission while developing the abilities of each student through the implementation of motivating, challenging, and independent learning within a safe and positive school environment. New personnel for the 2018-2019 school year include Andrea Roark, counselor; Vanessa Hufstедler, business; Terrie Ponder, resource; Jennifer Jean, resource aide; and Jason Belcher, detention.

The elementary school consists of Kindergarten through Sixth Grade. Grades K-4 is located in the Ben R. Bush building along with an ABC program. Grades 5-6 location is in the Middle School building. There are 344 students enrolled in K-4 and 138 at the middle school totaling 482 students in the elementary school. The total enrollment for preschool is 54. Fifty six percent of the students qualify for the federal food program.

Third through sixth grade students have the opportunity to participate in intramural basketball. Fourth grade through sixth grade students may participate in football, and fourth through sixth grade girls may participate in volleyball. All of these sports are part of the Walnut Ridge Elementary Booster Club's program under the direction of the school's Athletic Director. Learning extends at WRES through a variety of additional activities available to students. The Lawrence

County Spelling Bee, Chess Tournaments, Quiz Bowl, Elementary Field Day, and Odyssey of the Mind are some of the opportunities. Our K-4th graders participated in the One School, One Book program again this past year. One School, One Book provides excellent involvement between the school, parents, and community. We received positive feedback on the program and will continue it again this year.

The Walnut Ridge Elementary Before and After School Program remains a growing part of the elementary school. There are currently seventy-five students enrolled in this program. The Walnut Ridge Elementary Summer Program met the essentials of over eighty students. The average daily attendance is between 30-50 students. Our school is committed to serving the needs of our parents and community.

There are two Parent-Teacher conferences scheduled for the 2018-19 school year. The first parent-teacher conference occurs at the end of the first nine weeks' period. The second conference follows at the end of the third nine weeks. Mid-term progress reports goes to parents each five weeks during the four quarters. Scheduling of individual conferences transpire as deemed necessary.

Student Recognition is a very important part of Walnut Ridge Elementary. Students receive quarterly awards for Honor Roll, Perfect Attendance, Good Work, Birthday, Principal's Award, Super Star, Extra Effort, Awesome Attitude and Most Improved. End of year awards will be presented fourth quarter. Students receive Bobcat Bucks and Catch Me Doing Good certificates for exhibiting exceptional behavior and work ethics. Mrs. Andrea Roark, WRES Counselor, focuses on character education through the incorporation of the quarterly character award and the monthly VIP award.

The Walnut Ridge School implements PLC learning communities meeting school wide with expectations that all students learn at high levels. The administration and faculty works diligently to obtain professional development that will foster student growth and provide an enhanced learning environment. All professional development alignment coincides with the district ACSIP Plan and meets the requirements mandated by the state. Teachers continue to grow professionally through active involvement in professional organizations and the state mandated TESS evaluation system. Professional Development will focus on Literacy, Data, and Classroom Management. The Walnut Ridge Elementary certified teaching staff receives 60 hours of staff development during the 2018-2019 school year.

Students at Walnut Ridge Elementary take the state required assessments annually. This includes the I Station Assessment for grades K-2, and the ACT Aspire Assessment for grades third through sixth. Students with academic deficiencies obtain multiple opportunities for improvement inclusive of; small pullout booster groups, Reading Recovery, mathematics push-in programs, and academic prescriptions supplied through the Parent Center. We also offer After School Tutoring, In School Tutoring through the remediation/enrichment period in 5th and 6th grades, and one-on-one time with instructional aides are programs in place for students who need additional academic instruction. Our reading staff assists teachers through the implementation of small intervention groups for students in grades K-4.

Walnut Ridge Elementary faculty and staff will continue to work with the students, parents, and community to meet the needs of all students. Walnut Ridge Elementary strives to make our school a true learning environment that promotes the belief that all students can learn. Researched base teaching strategies and techniques help support fundamental growth for our students. Administrators, teachers, and parents working together can make a positive difference in student achievement and educational quality, thereby initiating a "School of Choice".

Walnut Ridge High School 2018 Public Report

Walnut Ridge High School meets the Standards for Accreditation as established and set forth by the Arkansas Department of Education. Walnut Ridge High School is also a fully accredited member of the North Central Association.

The faculty and administration are involved in an ongoing effort to accomplish goals of the school's mission statement. Workshops and training to obtain the highest level of services for our students and faculty are provided. The professional development hours are based on the requirements found within the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) State Rules, Board policies, student achievement data, and local ACSIP plans. Specifically, professional development activities are designed to increase student academic performance. Two key focuses of professional development at WRHS include the enhanced emphasis on career education and the continued development of a Professional Learning Community.

At Walnut Ridge High School, 28 faculty members provide instruction in a broad spectrum of subjects ranging from special education and basic skills to Advanced Placement courses. WRHS offers nine Advanced Placement courses. A smart core curriculum and a core curriculum are offered that benefit both the college bound student and those students who will be entering the workforce after graduation. Students may also become a "Completer" by completing a course of study in one of four career and technical pathways at WRHS: Agriculture, Business, Jr. Firefighter, and Family & Consumer Science. Students are allowed to pursue a course of study that will enable them to attend the Northeast Arkansas Career and Technical Center in Jonesboro which offers 13

technical programs, many of which provide concurrent credit through ASU-Jonesboro. Walnut Ridge High School also offers courses in six academic subjects totaling twenty-seven concurrent credit hours through Black River Technical College that allows students who qualify academically to receive college credit in those courses for a reduced rate of tuition. BRTC has also allowed our students to take online courses through their campus at the reduced rate for any course not offered on our campus.

In the 2017-18 school year, Walnut Ridge High School has added additional course offerings and opportunities for students in the field of career education. WRHS received a grant to start a Fire Science program, one of only two programs in the state of Arkansas. This program is partnered with Black River Technical College to provide fire science instruction and allow students to receive firefighter and first responder certifications. Also, WRHS partnered with BRTC on the Technical Opportunities for Secondary Students (TOPSS) program. This program allows students to attend BRTC for half of the day during their junior and senior years and receive training and certifications in welding, advanced manufacturing, or medical professions (nursing). This program is grant-funded and is of no charge to the students. In 2018-19 WRHS added an EAST (Education Accelerated through Service and Technology) program. The EAST Initiative is a high tech project-based program that requires students to problem solve and create while encouraging them to be active in the community.

Walnut Ridge High School students participate in a variety of nationally sponsored activities that include FFA, FCCLA, FBLA, Key Club, National Honor Society, Student Council, and a number of school sponsored clubs. WRHS students have excelled both at the state and national level in such competitions as Quiz Bowl and Odyssey of the Mind. Students are also involved in community activities with Key Club, Ralph Joseph Leadership, and Red Cross. Walnut Ridge High School students attended Boys and Girls State sponsored by the American Legion.

Students are given the opportunity to attend an ACT summer program hosted by Walnut Ridge High. The preparation course offered during the summer months gives many students a significant increase in scores as a result of their participation. ACT help sessions are also sponsored throughout the school year in the week before a scheduled test.

Students may participate in a host of extracurricular activities that enhance the learning process. Athletic programs include football, volleyball, basketball, baseball, softball, track and field, golf, the “Alleycats” dance team, and trap shooting team. An active cheerleading squad, band, and choir compete in a host of local, state, and national events. Individual clubs and organizations meet a diverse range of student needs.

Alternative Education is located on the Walnut Ridge High School campus and serves students in grades 9-12. This program serves students for behavioral issues, attendance issues and academic issues. These students may earn credits in English, Social Science, Science, Math and various electives taught through Virtual Arkansas, a live-streaming simulcast taught by highly qualified teachers across the state and facilitated by WRHS teachers and some courses taught by WRHS certified teachers in the field. Students may also take electives in their field of interest or attend the Jonesboro Career and Technical Center to learn skills for specific trades.

Technology continues to be an important component of the educational process. Every classroom has Internet accessibility and the high school library has sixteen computers available for student research and projects. The high school has three computer labs. One of the labs is used for classroom instruction in the business department. One lab is utilized as a remediation center to remediate students who scored below proficient on state-mandated exams or to earn lost credits through Credit Recovery, and the other is a general lab adjacent to the Library used for a variety of educational needs. WRHS also has three carts containing 25 laptop computers each which are assessable to all classrooms throughout the building. The laptops will also be used for ACT Aspire testing in the spring. The entire high school building has Wi-Fi access.

Since Walnut Ridge High School received the Farm to School Grant in 2014-15, students have been growing food on the school campus and distributing that food to the school cafeteria to be served to the student body. As a result of this grant, a fully functional greenhouse and growing structure was constructed adjacent to the Agriculture building. Also, two new courses were added to the WRHS Agriculture curriculum to support the program.

Students at Walnut Ridge High take the state-required assessments annually. ACT Aspire became the state-mandated test for grades 3-10 in 2015-16. The chart below describes the results of the ACT Aspire test:

Walnut Ridge High School is committed to excellence in education. The mission of Walnut Ridge High School is to enable all students and faculty an opportunity to exceed and excel. We recognize that the responsibility of a solid educational foundation lies with the students, teachers, school leaders, parents, and community. Our mission is to develop the abilities of each student by maintaining an educational setting that enhances learning, fosters growth, and ensures development.

Alternative Learning Environment

The Lawrence County School District continues to advance its Alternative Learning Environment program. The CATS (Creating A Thriving Student) Program is located in the Walnut Ridge High School and serves students 9-12. This program serves students who are at risk for not graduating, who have behavioral issues, and who have attendance issues. Students may earn credits in English, Social Science, Science, Math and various electives. Core courses in English, Math and Social Science are taught by accredited on-campus faculty, and core Science courses are taught via Virtual Arkansas, a live-streaming simulcast taught by highly qualified teachers across the state and facilitated by WRHS faculty. For electives, students may take on-campus electives and Completer courses in Agriculture, Business or Consumer Science, or may choose electives taught via Virtual Arkansas. Students who meet the proper criteria may also attend the Jonesboro Service Center to learn skills for vocational trades.

Parent Center

The Walnut Ridge School Parent Center is committed to providing materials and services to assist parents in improving their child's academic achievement. We continue to encourage and support active parental involvement in a variety of ways including but not limited to volunteering.

Informational packets are prepared in the center and will be distributed during parent/teacher conferences. Packets consist of useful information including but not limited to school calendar, contact information, parental involvement plan, volunteer opportunities, parenting tips in areas such as homework, health or nutrition, and projected parent involvement activities planned for the school year.

Newsletters are created monthly in the parent center to provide communication between the school and parents in a regular and meaningful manner for the elementary school. Newsletters are posted on the school website, and are available in paper form. The school website is another method for parents to communicate or be informed in a regular and meaningful manner. Parents are encouraged to visit the website at www.bobcats.k12.ar.us to check their child's progress, assignments, and activities.

Parent Center surveys will be sent home annually and are available to download on the parent center page on the school website. Results from the surveys will be used to better understand the

needs of the parents. Parent meeting topics and material suggestions are also compiled from the surveys.

Volunteerism is supported and encouraged at Walnut Ridge School. Volunteer surveys are sent home annually and are also available to download on the school website. Instructional volunteers are trained through the center each year. Faculty members receive a volunteer resource book which is updated yearly from the survey results. Teachers are encouraged to take advantage of this useful resource.

The parent center provides resources and materials free of charge. The center is available daily and is located near the middle level building. It is coordinated by Lindsey Romine and facilitated by Dyan Heard. Mrs. Romine may be reached at 870-819-0443 and Mrs. Heard at 870-819-0441 or both at www.bobcats.k12.ar.us. The Walnut Ridge Elementary School encourages all parents to utilize this valuable asset.

Gifted, Talented and Creative Program

The Lawrence County School District's gifted and talented program provides students with various program options such as Whole Group Enrichment, Resource Room, Pre-Advanced Placement, and Advanced Placement Courses.

Kindergarten through second grade are served through Whole Group Enrichment by the GT coordinator for 30 minutes per week.

Students in the third through sixth grade are provided services in the resource room for 150 minutes per week by the GT coordinator.

Students in the fifth through tenth grade are served through Pre-Advanced Placement courses such as Civics, English, Economics, Math, Physical Science, Biology, and Algebra II, by a certified teacher for 250 minutes per week.

Students in the tenth, eleventh, and twelfth grade are provided services through Advanced Placement courses such as Biology, Calculus, Music Theory, U.S. History, World History, American Government, English Language, and English Literature and Composition by a certified teacher for 250 minutes per week.

All seventh through twelfth grade students have the opportunity to meet with the GT coordinator on the third Monday of the month from 8:00 a.m. until 8:45 a.m.

Identified students also have the opportunity to participate in outside learning opportunities such as Odyssey of the Mind, quiz bowl, chess competitions, NEAC Business Expo, U.S. Space Camp, Story Store, Bioscience Institute, Stock Market Game, and Project Fair. Additional field trips are arranged when appropriate.

District Technology

Approximately 230 Apple iPads and 10 new storage carts were purchased for Kindergarten through 2nd grade. This gives us enough devices for 1-to-1 for classroom use and testing as well as being able to move the existing laptops up to 3rd and 4th grade also making them now 1-to-1. We have implemented a control system that allows the teachers to monitor the student's use of the iPads as well as limit them to the task at hand. This gives the teachers more flexibility and greater control in using them for classroom instruction.

12 new Smart Boards were purchased for all of the English classrooms on campus. These replaced the older Smart Panel / projector setups that they were using.

50 new document cameras were purchased to replace the older generation of cameras that had been used in our classrooms for the last several years.

Server interconnections are in the process of being upgraded to allow for the greater bandwidth required as our data usage grows with new technologies. Tape backup systems, network storage and battery backup systems have also been upgraded.

New security cameras have been added to our campus to improve the safety of our students.

A new AC system was installed in our IT office and has allowed us to finish migrating our servers from their old location. Doing this made way for the new EAST Lab that was installed this summer, bringing new technology opportunities to our students.

Desktop student-use computers in all 3 campus libraries have been replaced with new ones.

Our Shoretel phone system has been upgraded to give us failover capability so in the event of a hardware failure, our phone system can remain operational.

Our tech department has added a service truck to help us more efficiently maintain our campus systems.

Federal and State Categorical Funding

The Lawrence County School District receives federal monies and state categorical monies to supplement educational programs. The District receives Title I, Title II-A, Title IV-A, Title V (state), Carl Perkins, National School Lunch Act (NSL) English Language Learners (ELL), Professional Development (PD), and Alternative Learning Environment (ALE) funding. All funds (except Carl Perkins) are administered through the schools' Arkansas Consolidated School Improvement Plans.

Title I funds are utilized for Walnut Ridge Elementary. Funds are used to provide additional academic support and learning opportunities for teachers and students. Literacy, math, and science are targeted areas of improvement. The Parent Center is funded using Title I funds.

Title II-A funds are used to help with professional development in the elementary grades. Currently, Brooke Bramlett's salary as Literacy Coach is partially funded by Title II-A funds.

Title IV – A funds are transferred to Title I to help with expenses in the Title I budget.

Title VI (state) funds are used to help provide a security officer for the district.

Carl Perkins funds are specifically used in the Vocational Department. Business, Agriculture, and Family and Consumer Science classes provide supplemental activities with Carl Perkins funds. Funds are also used to provide teachers with professional development opportunities and travel expenses.

National School Lunch Act (NSL) funds are geared at increasing student academic performance in math, literacy, science, and social studies. Positions paid with NSL funds: School Nurse, Security Officer, MS Guidance Counselor, Technology Lab aide in HS, Librarian in ES, Before and After School Tutoring, Summer School at the high school, and others. NSL monies are used for software and materials and supplies for math, literacy, science, and social studies.

Professional Development funds allow teachers to attend various trainings throughout the year. Teachers are also afforded the opportunity to attend meetings that address best practices in their respective academic field and that pertain to their Professional Growth Plan.

Alternative Learning Environment (ALE) funds assist in the establishment of the Alternative School located on the Walnut Ridge campus. Part of the salary of the ALE Coordinator is paid with ALE funds.

The Lawrence County School District does not have a soda contract.
