Story Summary

Critical Thinking Questions (responses of at least 2-3 sentences)

- 1. In paragraphs 5-9, how do the details about the natural setting outside of Mrs. Mallard's room relate to her emotional state? What do you think the outside world might symbolize in Mrs. Mallard's life?
- 2. At the beginning of the 9th paragraph, Mrs. Mallard senses "something coming to her." What is it? What effect physically does it have on her?
- 3. Reread paragraphs 9-12. A **paradox** is a statement that seems contradictory but conveys a deeper truth. What do you think the paradox "monstrous joy" in paragraph 12 refers to? Explain the meaning of "monstrous joy."
- 4. Reread paragraphs 13-15. What kind of relationship do you think the Mallards had? Was it the kind of relationship that would justify Mrs. Mallard's response? If not, what reasons might Mrs. Mallard have to respond the way she did?
- 5. How is the last line of the story an example of **dramatic irony** (the audience knows something that the characters in the story do not know)? How does Mrs. Mallard's response to the news of her husband's death differ from the perceptions of her response by the people around her? What does this difference reflect about the attitudes regarding a woman's place in society at the time the story was written?
