Project Wisdom

Last year we expanded our curriculum to include an exciting character education initiative as part of each school day with the implementation of a program called Project Wisdom. In a world where many students routinely face challenging situations that require practical social skills and strength of character, trends in education are supporting programs like Project Wisdom that teach concepts such as integrity, respect, confidence, courage, honesty and diligence.

In fact, schools across the country are now routinely covering these topics along with the traditional cornerstones of education: reading, writing and arithmetic. According to the U.S. Department of Education, a total of 136 state and local education agencies have received as much as \$24 million in character education grants since 1994. More important, emerging data now indicates that effective character education improves academic achievement.

Cook Hill is proud to be one of over 14,000 schools nationwide utilizing this collection of daily words of wisdom which set a positive tone each day for everyone in our school. Project Wisdom's messages not only impart new knowledge to the students, but also work to develop responsible and caring individuals. The verses are rich in history, culture, and literature. They inspire, teach and encourage students to reflect upon the larger issues of life.

Each day, students listen to a short message containing a quotation from an historic figure, celebrity, modern hero. Project Wisdom's research shows that the program reduces incidents of disruptive behavior such as bullying and teasing, helps develop a more positive school climate and creates benefits that are perceived to be immediate and don't dissipate with time.

Ideas for Reading at Home What can parents do?

Have you ever wondered if you're doing all that you can to encourage your child to be

a good reader? Here is a simple checklist of ideas to consider when reading with your child at home.

What can parents do?

- Read to your child everyday! Make reading aloud to your child for 20 to 30 minutes a treasured time together. Read smoothly and with expression, so your child hears what good reading should sound like.
- Read together in a peaceful, quiet spot free of distractions. Turn off the TV, dishwasher, telephones, and iPods.
- Create loving associations with books talk about them, laugh about them, share them with other family members and friends. You never know what a child is thinking

- about a book (or anything else for that matter) until you ask! Sometimes their answers are very surprising!
- Listen to your child read side-by-side. Ask questions and talk about what they are reading to you. Have them predict what they think will happen next or how a story will end. Book talks with children should sound very similar to how you would suggest a good book to a friend. Ask your child to tell you in their own words what happened in the story.
- Let your child see you read. When children see you read for information, study or pleasure, they see that reading is important – to you!
- Set up a special reading spot in your home where your child can read and write freely. A book basket holding their favorite, high interest books encourages lots of rereading. Pencil and paper encourages writing. Practice makes perfect!
- Different children like different kinds of books. Boys are often surveyed and found to prefer action stories and non-fiction books. Go to the public library to search for books of high interest to borrow rather than buy. Librarians always seem to know highly sought after children's' books.
- If you think you don't have time to listen to your child read... think outside the box! Children can sit on the kitchen counter and read to you while you cook dinner; or they can keep a basket of favorite books in the car and read to you while you drive to errands. There is always time to listen!
