Wallingford Adult Education celebrated its 40th graduating class at its annual commencement exercises on June 1, 2017. The Wallingford Adult Education community is very proud of the 18 members of the Class of 2017 who completed one of three high school diploma programs.

Adult High School Credit Diploma (AHSCD):

The AHSCD program provides a rigorous course of study that requires students to meet the minimum credit standards in academic and elective areas (Math, English, Social Studies & Sciences) as outlined in Connecticut State Statutes.

National External Diploma Program (NEDP):

This program is designed for adults who have gained skills through life experiences and who have demonstrated competence in a particular job, talent or academic area. Student portfolios are assessed and are aligned with College and Career Readiness Standards. Students also have to demonstrate digital literacy.

GED & CT State High School Diploma:

Adults demonstrate, through a four part examination (Language Arts, Math, Science & Social Studies) the attainment of academic skills and concepts normally acquired through completion of a high school program. Applicants for this examination must be at least 17 years of age and officially withdrawn from school for at least 6 months. Individuals who pass the GED are awarded a Connecticut State High School Diploma. Congratulations to our graduates! And, thank you to the Adult Education Program staff who work tirelessly to meet the unique needs of our adult learners.

For two days in April, the Wallingford HUBCAP, the district's business and entrepreneurial incubator, was transformed into an Asian fusion "Pop Up" restaurant. It was led by Lyman Hall students who designed and implemented this interactive dining experience as part of the school's Hospitality and Culinary Arts Management program. The interactive experience allowed restaurant goers to pick their ingredients and then watch as the students prepared their stir fry meal.

Superintendent's Message

Dear Wallingford Community,

Wallingford Public School Vision Statement

Wallingford Public Schools, in partnership with our families and community, will provide a safe, healthy, and supportive environment that ignites an enduring passion for excellence in every learner, so that each becomes a lifelong contributor to the local, national and global communities.

This year, the vision of the Wallingford Public School District was achieved through numerous curricular and extracurricular experiences for students. Our dedicated teachers, support staff, and administrators worked collaboratively with students and families to make 2017 an incredible year for education in Wallingford.

There are far too many student and staff accomplishments to list individually, but I do want to share a few program highlights with everyone.

Elementary Highlights

This year, our district was able to implement two additional full-day preschool programs. This achievement capped off a two-year plan to provide preschool at each PreK-2 school in our community. By doing so, we opened the doors to all neighborhoods within Wallingford to free public preschool. In addition, we maintained full-day kindergarten at each school. These noteworthy accomplishments complete the last pieces of the district's transition to a PreK-2 and 3-5 elementary education system. Without reconfiguration, these program expansions would not have been possible due to space and cost constraints. I am grateful for everyone's hard work and commitment to seeing these endeavors come to fruition for our students and families.

At the grade 3-5 levels, we were able to implement Capstone experiences in Makerspaces utilizing the district-developed 3D Learning Program. The hard work of our library media specialists and teachers made this an engaging and enjoyable experience for students. The spaces will continue to be used at an increasing level through the gradual implementation of the Next Generation Science Standards. We are very grateful to everyone's hard work and commitment to authentically infusing design thinking into science through the Makerspace model.

In addition, students experienced incredible success through their participation in the Invention Convention, musical events, and artistic opportunities. From school talent shows to the performance of The Lion King, our students were in the spotlight throughout the year!

Middle School Highlights

Middle school students were an active bunch exhibiting incredible talent in and outside the classroom. From undefeated sports seasons to incredible musical performances, our students certainly demonstrated their talent in a wide range of interest areas.

In addition, the middle school Capstone program was implemented with great success. We look forward to seeing the continued growth and expansion of this program.

The middle schools continue to see a high level of enrollment. This coming year, additional student sections have been added at both Dag Hammarskjold Middle School and Moran Middle School to address class size concerns.

In the fall, middle school students and staff will embark on a new schedule to provide students with access to longer class periods similar to those that they have experienced at the elementary level. This will help them transition to the middle school experience while preparing them to meet the demands of the longer instructional periods present in high school. Building-level administration will work closely with staff to monitor the implementation for the greatest level of success.

High School Highlights

From state recognized scholar athletes to Broadway-worthy productions, students excelled at Lyman Hall and Sheehan High Schools. With challenging programs offering rich experiences across all curricular areas, student success was evident from Algebra to technology education.

Students at both high schools experienced new and enhanced programming. At Sheehan High School, students participated in a new Advanced Manufacturing/Pre-engineering Course. The district Certified Nursing Assistant Program (CNA) program took up permanent residence at Sheehan High School in its new state-of-the-art space. And, at Lyman Hall High School, a Foods 3 Course was developed to further develop students' skills in hospitality through the expanded use of the food truck, the grab and go café, and a pop-up restaurant at HUBCAP Wallingford.

In addition, both high schools made great strides in implementing a new special education delivery model to respond to recommendations of the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC). Additional special education staffing was provided through the 2016-2017 budget. District-wide training was offered focusing on Individual Education Plan development and implementation to support this endeavor and to more fully align with the District Focused Monitoring Plan required by the State of Connecticut. We are very proud of all of our staff for their commitment to these opportunities to increase the academic achievement of our students. I truly believe that students and staff have met the challenge of the district vision this year. I look forward to seeing where our journey takes our community of learners next year. I also encourage you to read the curriculum update from Assistant Superintendent, Carrie LaTorre. I wish everyone a happy, healthy, and safe summer! May the Yankees still be in playoff contention come the new school year!

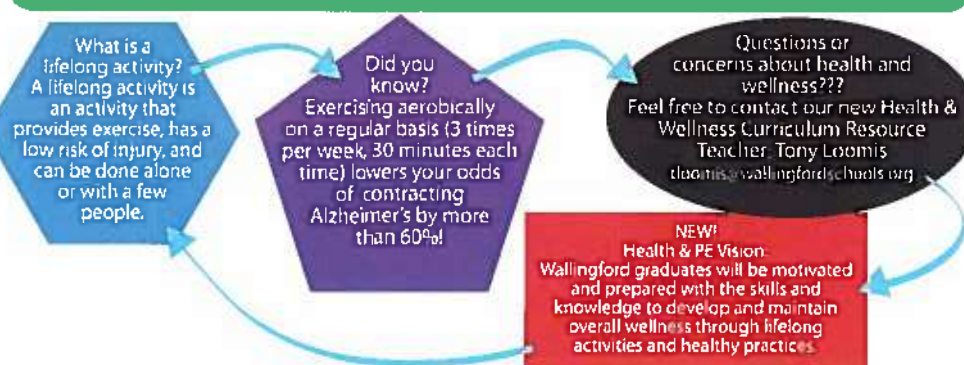

Wallingford Students Excel at National Invention Convention!

On June 1-3, five Wallingford students had the opportunity to represent their community at the second annual National Invention Convention in Washington, DC. Audrey Larson, 8th grade at Dag Hammarskjöld, Drew Biller, 6th grade at Dag Hammarskjöld, and Pranav Parikh and Ellie DiMatteo both 4th grade at Rock Hill all represented Wallingford this year. They were accompanied by former Rock Hill student Manav Parikh, who now attends the Foote School in Hamden. Jonathan Porier, 5th grade at Pond Hill, was also selected for the National convention but opted not to attend.

Each of the students had to first pass through multiple levels of competition in order to reach the National level. They began with a local convention held at Oakdale Theater, then progressed to a Regional Convention. From there, they were selected to compete at the State Invention Convention where they were all multiple award winners. There were over 660 students competing at the State Invention Convention and only 100 students were chosen to compete in Washington, DC. It is quite an honor to be selected for national competition as these students were identified for their excellence in innovation, creativity, and impact their invention could have on the world.

Each of the students selected to represent Wallingford had ideas that could potentially improve the quality of life for individuals or the greater societal community. Drew and Ellie's inventions can potentially save lives through their fire safety innovations. Using Bluetooth technology, they both created devices designed to help children and adults escape from fires in the home. Pranav and Jonathan set out to make the lives of the disabled and elderly more comfortable and efficient with their inventions. Manav had his sights on keeping those with severe life threatening allergies to food safe while out at a restaurant and Audrey's invention was world changing. She worked on an invention that would convert automobile emissions back into usable, breathable air!

In Washington, the competition was fierce. As you can imagine, the best of the best were in attendance. 300 students from 20 states, grades Kindergarten to 12, came to compete at the Patent and Trademark Building, a fitting setting for such a historic event. Only three winners were selected from among dozens of students in each grade/level. Drew Biller won a 2nd place for 6th grade and Audrey Larson won 2nd place for the 7th and 8th grade category.

However, the most amazing awards were yet to come for our students. At the end of a long list of special awards given out by sponsors such as Microsoft, Adobe, and a long list of others, the Best in Show awards were finally announced. These included some of the most prestigious and coveted awards of the event, including the Cantor Colburn Patent Award. How excited and delighted was the contingent from Wallingford to discover that three of the students from our community would be bringing home three of the seven Best in Show awards! Drew Biller was awarded the Best Automation and Robotics Award for her Fire Fighting Buddy. Manav won the best App Award for his Food Allergy Alerter and Audrey Larson won the Cantor Colburn Patent Search Award for C.A.N.O.P.E. — Carbon Abatement Naturally Over Paved Environments. This award will provide her with access to a patent lawyer to help secure her idea and get a patent while she proceeds through research and design in the future.

A message from Carrie LaTorre Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum

As we all enter our summer vacation, I wanted to give our community an update on our progress in moving forward components of the Mastery Based Learning initiative.

As you may recall, the goals for this year centered on the following:

- continued creation, reflection, and revision of standards, performance indicators, and scoring criteria for all content areas;
- communication of Habits of Work in the areas of preparation for learning, engagement with learning, and interaction with adults and peers for all students;
- implementation of Redo/Retake guidelines for all students in grades 6-12.

Graduation Standards and Performance Indicators

Throughout the course of the school year, the teachers, along with the Curriculum Department, participated in the creation and revision of standards and performance indicators in all content areas. This work was very valuable in providing district personnel with clear and consistent expectations of specific content, as well as how the big ideas progressed from one grade level to the next. English Language Arts, Mathematics, and Health/PE standards and indicators have been thoroughly vetted through the various district level committees prior to receiving Board of Education approval this spring.

Habits of Work

For our elementary students, the revised Habits of Work (HOW) appeared on the report cards and were communicated to parents three times a year. At the middle and high school, parents viewed the habits of work scores in PowerSchool. The scores provided insight into students' preparation for learning, interactions with peers and adults, as well as engagement in learning.

Redo/Retake Guidelines

At the end of January, the Board of Education approved redo/retake guidelines for all grade 6-12 students. All middle school and high school teachers met and collaborated on consistent opportunities allowable for redo/retake as well as a common form to be used by students. Students were able to request opportunities for redo/retake on various assignments and were able to successfully reflect on their learning in order to strengthen their understanding of content.

As a district, we have made wonderful gains in our progression towards mastery based learning. We could not accomplish this without the time and dedication of our faculty and staff who provide valuable feedback and insight as well as the support of our students and families.

We look forward to another year of continued success for our students and wish all of our families a peaceful and restful summer break.
